A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on October 1, 2019. Chair Randy Maluchnik convened the session at 9:05 a.m.

Members present: Randy Maluchnik, Chair, James Ische, Vice Chair, Gayle Degler, Tim Lynch and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Degler moved, Workman seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Lynch moved, Ische seconded, to approve the minutes of the September 17, 2019, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Degler seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Approved a land purchase agreement with Pattison Sand Company for the Highway 212 project-Benton Township and authorized the Chair and Administrator to sign the agreement.

Resolution #73-19, To Approve the Local Water Management Plans for the City of Victoria.

Adopted Findings of Fact and to issue Order #PZ20190045 for the issuance of an interim use permit, Thomas Derner, Watertown Township.

Resolution #74-19, Approving the Preliminary Plat of Kindred Prairie.

Approved the elimination of a .8 FTE crisis therapist position and creation of two .5 FTE crisis therapist positions and related HH&S budget amendment.

Resolution #75-19, Authorizing Execution of Agreement TZD Toward Zero Deaths Grant 2020.

Authorized the County Engineer, or his designee, to approve supplemental agreement #27 for \$29,000 for the Flying Cloud Drive Reconstruction Project.

Resolution #76-19, Carver County Right of Way Plat No. 29.

Approved the application for renewal of the on and off sale liquor license including Sunday for Hollywood Sports LLC dba Hollywood Sports Complex.

Authorized HH&S acceptance of donations for Encore Adult Day Services.

Reviewed September 24, 2019, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in

Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Degler seconded, to open the public hearing on the draft 2019-2010 CCWMO Water Management Plan update. Motion carried unanimously.

Paul Moline, Planning and Water Management, explained they are asking the Board to approve submittal of the Water Management Plan to the Board of Water Resources for final review. He noted the discussion last week on water quality and what the County would be doing within the next ten years. Moline entered into the record the Affidavit of Publication for the public hearing; updated draft WMO Water Management Plan and the comments received during the public/agency review and response to comments.

Kristen Larson, Water Management, explained the plan is required to be updated every ten years; aligns the plan with the comp plan process and state grant funding favors projects included in an updated plan. She reviewed the planning process that began in 2018. She summarized the contents of the six chapters.

Larson stated the major changes from the 2010 plan included prioritizing waterbodies, high priority wetland restoration sites and untreated urban areas. She pointed out the updated project list and noted they would continue to update the list every two years. Larson added the updated plan focuses on regular evaluation of processes, programs and projects.

She stated the plan was distributed to city staff and engineers and meetings were held with townships. Larson indicated 45 comments were received and as a result, multiple minor changes were made, additional short- and long-term metrics were added to goals and more specific water quality goals were added. She stated the next step was to submit the plan to BWSR for their final review, followed by the County Board adoption in January.

No public testimony was received.

Lynch moved, Ische seconded, to close the public hearing. Motion carried unanimously.

Lynch moved, Ische seconded to submit the draft 2019-2029 update of the CCWMO Water Management Plan to the Minnesota Board of Soil and Water Resources for review and approval. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 9:29 a.m. and go into a work session/tour of CDA properties. Motion carried unanimously.

Resolution Authorizing Settlement of Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interests Needed for the Highway 50-Bevens Creek Area Project and Highway 50 Bridge Project

- WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Carver County is the official governing body of Carver County ("County"); and
- WHEREAS, the County, acting by and through its Board of Commissioners, is authorized by law, and pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, § 163.02, subd. 2; §117.012; and § 117.042, to acquire land and other real property interests in Carver County which the County needs for a public use or public purpose; and
- WHEREAS, the County proposes to construct highway and related improvements in Carver County for shoulder widening and bridge reconstruction as part of the Highway 50-Bevens Creek Area Project ("Project"); and
- WHEREAS, to complete the Project, the County must acquire the real property interests described in Exhibit A, attached hereto, from the Owners of the real property interests identified in said Exhibit A; and
- WHEREAS, the County obtained either an appraisal(s) from a licensed real estate appraiser when the estimate of the damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A exceeds \$25,000, or the County obtained a minimum damage acquisition report from a qualified person with appraisal knowledge, in lieu of an appraisal, when the estimate of the damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A is under \$25,000; and
- WHEREAS, County must determine and submit an initial written offer of just compensation to the Owners of said needed real property interests covering the full amount of damages caused by the County's proposed acquisitions; and
- WHEREAS, the Owners of said real property interests may obtain an independent appraisal by a qualified appraiser of the real property interests which the County proposes to acquire for the Project; and
- WHEREAS, the Owners of said real property interests are entitled to reimbursement for the reasonable costs of the appraisal from the County up to a maximum of the limits stated in Minn. Stat. §117.036, provided the Owner submits to County the information necessary for reimbursement; and
- WHEREAS, the Carver County Board of Commissioners authorized the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, to make initial written offers of just compensation to the Owners within the Project from whom property interests are required; and

- WHEREAS, the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, have negotiated settlement(s) with the Owners impacted by the Project as described in said Exhibit A.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that County's acquisition of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A and the construction of highway and related improvements of shoulder widening and bridge reconstruction as part of the Highway 50-Bevens Creek Area Project constitute a valid public use or public purpose; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that based upon the estimate of damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A which the County obtained either from an appraisal(s) or a minimum damage acquisition report(s) and the negotiations between said Owner(s) and the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, County shall make a payment of compensation to the Owners within the Project from whom the County must acquire needed real property interests, in the amounts as described in said Exhibit A; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Carver County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes and directs the Carver County Board Chairman and Carver County Administrator to enter into Stipulation of Settlement Agreement with said property owner(s), in the name of the County of Carver for the Project.

Through annual bridge safety inspections it has been made apparent the south east wingwall is moving and in need of repair. Carver County Public Works staff has been monitoring the movement monthly for the last year and has determined immediate repairs are necessary to keep the road open. Carver County Public Works recieved quotes on October 2, 2019. A total of 3 quotes were recieved. Meyer Contracting \$137,555.00, Veit \$76,075, and Atlas Foundations \$41,925. Staff is recomending the award of the project to the low responsible bidder. TC&W Railroad has concurred in the award to Atlas Foundations and will be paying for half of the cost since Carver County and TC&W Railroad jointly own the bridge crossing. 

Thank you for providing this office with a copy of the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the above-referenced project.

According to documentation provided in the EAW, the proposed project calls for the expansion of an existing sand and gravel mine in Dahlgren Township, Carver County.

According to our records, the proposed mine expansion is located to the east of King Oscar's Settlement, a historic property which is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. This property is a complex of church and parish buildings established in 1853 which are associated with early Swedish Lutheran settlement in Minneosta. Provided that the expanded mining activities are confined to the areas as shown in the EAW, we have determined that the proposed mine expansion will have have no adverse impacts on the historic property.

However, due to the nature and location of the proposed project, we recommend that a Phase I archaeological survey be completed. The survey must meet the requirements of the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Identification and Evaluation, and should include an evaluation of National Register eligibility for any properties that are identified. For a list of consultants who have expressed an interest in undertaking such surveys, please visit the website **preservationdirectory.mnhs.org**, and select "Archaeologists" in the "Search by Specialties" box.

We will reconsider the need for survey if the project area can be documented as previously surveyed or disturbed. Archaeological sites can remain intact beneath the plow zone and in undisturbed portions of the right-of-way.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has reviewed the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the Lundquist Mine Expansion, located in Dahlgren Township, Carver County. Regarding matters for which the DNR has regulatory responsibility or other interests, we offer the following comments for your consideration.

- Water Appropriations: As noted in the EAW, a DNR Water Appropriation Permit will be required. Such a permit will need to be acquired for the appropriation of water, including wash water, in the Lundquist Mine. The actual mining of the pit using a backhoe will not require a DNR Water Appropriation Permit. DNR Water Appropriation Permits are required whenever more than 10,000 gallons of water per day, or one million gallons of water per year, are pumped from a Water of the State. The proposed volume for the new DNR Water Appropriation Permit should be for the entire volume of water that is pumped (not the estimated volume of water consumed). This equates to approximately 1.1 million gallons of water per day (page 15). Any questions related to water appropriations permitting, please contact DNR Appropriation Hydrologist Joe Richter (joe.richter@state.mn.us).
- **Unknown wells**: It is possible that unknown wells exist on the site. Unknown wells should be sealed in accordance with the Rules of the Minnesota Department of Health.
- Fish, wildlife, rare resources: We appreciate the commitment to using wildlife friendly erosion control in order to minimize potential impacts to gophersnakes and other small wildlife. If any gopher snakes are observed, please report the observations to the DNR non-game specialist (https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/eco/nongame/central.html).

We recommend that any berms, or any temporarily vegetated areas are planted with a seed mix that is comprised of native species that includes a diverse mix of blooming species that can benefit pollinators and other wildlife. For any areas that are not returned to agricultural production after reclamation, we recommend that that native, pollinator seed mixes be utilized in these areas as well. This can not only provide habitat for wildlife, but help stabilize soil, and create a visual buffer for the project. The Board of Soil and Water Resources website has helpful information on this topic and local seed companies can assist in developing an appropriate pollinator seed mix for the area.



This letter is in response to the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the Lundquist Mine Expansion. This letter contains our initial comments on this project for your consideration. The purpose of this letter is to inform you that based on the EAW for the project referenced above a Department of the Army (DA) permit may be required for your proposed activity. In lieu of a specific response, please consider the following general information concerning our regulatory program that may apply to the proposed project.

If the proposal involves activity in navigable waters of the United States, it may be subject to the Corps of Engineers' jurisdiction under Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (Section 10). Section 10 prohibits the construction, excavation, or deposition of materials in, over, or under navigable waters of the United States, or any work that would affect the course, location, condition, or capacity of those waters, unless the work has been authorized by a Department of the Army permit.

If the proposal involves discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States, it may be subject to the Corps of Engineers' jurisdiction under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (CWA Section 404). Waters of the United States include navigable waters, their tributaries, and adjacent wetlands (33 CFR § 328.3). CWA Section 301(a) prohibits discharges of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States, unless the work has been authorized by a Department of the Army permit under Section 404. Information about the Corps permitting process can be obtained online at http://www.mvp.usace.army.mil/regulatory.

The Corps evaluation of a Section 10 and/or a Section 404 permit application involves multiple analyses, including (1) evaluating the proposal's impacts in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) (33 CFR part 325), (2) determining whether the proposal is contrary to the public interest (33 CFR § 320.4), and (3) in the case of a Section 404 permit, determining whether the proposal complies with the Section 404(b)(1) Guidelines (Guidelines) (40 CFR part 230).

If the proposal requires a Section 404 permit application, the Guidelines specifically require that "no discharge of dredged or fill material shall be permitted if there is a practicable alternative to the proposed discharge which would have less adverse impact on the aquatic ecosystem, so long as the alternative does not have other significant adverse environmental consequences" (40 CFR § 230.10(a)). Time and money spent on the proposal prior to applying for a Section 404 permit cannot be factored into the Corps' decision whether there is a less damaging practicable alternative to the proposal.

If an application for a Corps permit has not yet been submitted, the project proposer may request a pre-application consultation meeting with the Corps to obtain information regarding the data, studies or other information that will be necessary for the permit evaluation process. A pre-application consultation meeting is strongly recommended if the proposal has substantial impacts to waters of the United States, or if it is a large or controversial project.

For any areas that are not returned to agricultural production after reclamation, we recommend that that native, pollinator seed mixes be utilized in these areas as well. This can not only provide habitat for wildlife, but help stabilize soil, and create a visual buffer for the project. The Board of Soil and Water Resources website has helpful information on this topic and local seed companies can assist in developing an appropriate pollinator seed mix for the area.

<u>8b-4 Response</u>: The proposer will work with the Carver County Water Management Organization with respect to temporary seed mixes and those used in areas of the Site that are not returned to agricultural production as part of the erosion control and stormwater permit required for the Project. Reclaimed areas not returned to agricultural production will be planted with a native seed mix. The seed mix will contain both grasses and forbes.

Metropolitan Council

8c-1 Comment: Item 9 – Land Use

The EAW is consistent with the City of Carver's proposed 2040 Comprehensive Plan future land use. The site is within City of Carver's identified growth area within the orderly annexation area of Dahlgren Township. The proposed 2040 Plan designates the area as Low Density Residential. Both the Carver County and City of Carver's 2040 Comprehensive Plans are currently under review by the Metropolitan Council, which is acknowledged in the EAW. Please note that as long as the Council has not yet found the City of Carver's 2040 Plan complete for review, the future land use of this site can change. Council staff encourage the RGU to continue to coordinate with the City of Carver.

8c-1 Response: Comment noted.

<u>8c-2 Comment:</u> There are no existing regional park or trail units in the vicinity of the project site. The Minnesota River Bluffs LRT Extension Regional Trail Search Corridor is approximately 1.0 mile to the east of the project site. Council staff do not foresee the proposed project as having and adverse impact on the Regional Park System.

8c-2 Response: Comment noted.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE)

<u>8d-1 Comment:</u> The ACOE provided general information regarding their regulatory program and noted that a permit may be needed if the project includes activity in, over, or under navigable waters of the United States, or any work that would affect the course, location, condition, or capacity of those waters, unless the work has been authorized by a Department of the Army permit.

<u>8d-1 Response:</u> The Project does not involve activity (construction, excavation, or deposition of materials) in, over, or under navigable waters of the United States, or any work that would affect the course, location, condition, or capacity of those waters.

<u>8d-2 Comment:</u> If the proposal involves discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States, it may be subject to the Corps of Engineers' jurisdiction under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (CWA Section 404). Waters of the United States include navigable waters, their tributaries, and adjacent wetlands (33 CFR § 328.3). CWA Section 301(a) prohibits discharges of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States, unless the work has been authorized by a Department of the Army permit under Section 404. Information about the Corps permitting process can be obtained online at http://www.mvp.usace.army.mil/regulatory.

8d-2 Response: The Project does not involve discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States.

 - A. Minnesota Pollution Control Agency: NPDES General Permit for Nonmetallic Mineral Mining and Associated Activities (Stormwater)

- B. Minnesota Pollution Control Agency: Nonmetallic General Processing Air Permit

- D. Carver County: Chapter 152 Zoning Code Interim Use Permit (Mining)
- E. Carver County Water Management Organization (CCWMO): Erosion Control and Stormwater Permit
- 10. Carver County evaluated the project's potential for significant environmental effects and the need for an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) based on the criteria for evaluation included in MN Rule 4410.1700, Subpart 7:
 - A. Type, extent, and reversibility of environmental effects.
 - B. Cumulative potential effects of related or anticipated future projects.
 - C. The extent to which environmental effects are subject to mitigation by ongoing public regulatory authority; and
 - D. The extent to which environmental effects can be anticipated and controlled as a result of other available environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the project proposer, including other EISs.
- 11. The County finds the following for each of the criteria:
 - A. The EAW and agency comments have identified the potential environmental effects of the project.
 - B. The EAW included an analysis of the cumulative potential effects of related and anticipated future projects.
 - C. The potential environmental effects of the project are subject to mitigation by ongoing public regulatory authority, including the permits required for the project listed in item 9, and the conditions that may be required by the County's Interim Use Permit.
 - D. Item D. is not applicable to this project.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. Carver County has fulfilled all applicable procedural requirements of law and rule regarding the determination of need for an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for William Mueller and Sons proposed Lundquist Mine Expansion, Dahlgren Township, Carver County Minnesota.
- 2. Pursuant to Minnesota Rules Part 4410.1700, Subparts 6 and 7, the proposed project has been evaluated by the public, agencies, and Carver County (RGU) to determine potential environmental effects. Based on the findings and record in this matter, the Carver County Board finds that the proposed Lundquist Mine Expansion does not have the potential for significant environmental effects. The Carver County Boards Resolution No. _______ declaring a negative need for an Environmental Impact Statement is ATTACHED to this Record of Decision.
- 3. Authorize staff to resubmit Carver County's 2040 Comprehensive Plan to the Metropolitan Council for review.

Background

On May 30, 2019 staff submitted Carver County's 2040 Comprehensive Plan (plan) to the Metropolitan Council for review. Staff have since received a letter from the Metropolitan Council stating that the plan is incomplete and outlining revisions or additions which are required for the plan to be deemed complete. County staff anticipated receiving an incomplete letter, as most local governments have received one or more.

Required Changes/Additions

Several sections of the plan were found to be incomplete, but most only required small additions or changes. Below is an overview of the required changes/additions:

Laketown Township

- Wastewater additional information about Laketown Township's sanitary sewer system and community septic sewer system was added. This included information about inflow and infiltration (I/I) in the township and private sanitary sewer systems.
 Forecasts for the township were also broken down into areas served by the Metropolitan Disposal System, and Community and Subsurface Sewage Treatment Systems.
- **Forecasts** Previously the Metropolitan Council's population forecast for Laketown Township in 2040 was 0. However, they have updated their forecasts for the township to better reflect current annexation timelines of the adjacent cities. As a result, forecasts throughout the plan were updated to include these new estimates for Laketown Township.

Land Use

- Growth areas on various maps were updated to be consistent with the most recent versions of the cities' 2040 Comprehensive Plans.
- Minor wording updates to align with the Metropolitan Council's community designations.
- Addition of another use table which matches the existing land use map. The previous table matched only the future land use map.

• Surface Water Management

- Draft CCWMO Watershed Plan added as an appendix.
- Language in the Township Chapters about adopting the CCWMO Watershed Plan clarified to more clearly identify what version of the Watershed Plan is being referred to, and that the Carver County Board of Commissioners adopts the plan.

Regional Parks and Trails

 Minor updates to language and maps to be consistent with the 2040 Regional Parks Policy Plan.

Transportation

- Updated Laketown Township socioeconomic projections were added to the Traffic Analysis Zone (TAZ) Socioeconomic Tables. Various transportation maps were updated with these new projections. This change facilitates socioeconomic data shifts from the City of Waconia to include Laketown Townships' existence in 2040.
- Future Network Changes with Potential Jurisdictional Transfers map was updated. A
 segment of existing County State-Aid Highway (CSAH) 24 between CSAH 10 and the
 future arterial connection between CSAH 24 and CSAH 20 were added to Future
 City/Township designation for Future Network Changes. This jurisdictional transfer would
 be dependent on construction of a new north-south bypass connection from CSAH 10 to
 CSAH 20 also depicted in this figure.
- On the Existing and Planned On or Off-Road Bike Facilities map shoulder widening project data content and regional trail designations data content we updated. The Existing Destination State Trail category was added.

Copies of the updated 2040 Comprehensive Plan are available to view online at www.co.carver.mn.us/2040plan.

Next Steps

If authorized to do so by the County Board of Commissioners, staff will submit the revised 2040 Comprehensive Plan to the Metropolitan Council for review. The Metropolitan Council has 15 business days to determine completeness, and 120 calendar days to complete their review. After the Plan is approved by the Metropolitan Council staff will bring it back to the County Board of Commissioners for adoption.
