A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on October 8, 2019. Chair Randy Maluchnik convened the session at 9:01 a.m.

Members present: Randy Maluchnik, Chair, James Ische, Vice Chair, Gayle Degler, Tim Lynch and Tom Workman.

Absent: None.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Ische seconded, to approve the minutes of the October 1, 2019, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Degler seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Resolution #77-19, Authorizing Settlement of Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interests Needed for the Highway 50-Bevens Creek Area Project and Highway 50 Bridge Project.

Approved Veterans Court grant agreement with the First Judicial District.

Authorized Sheriff's Office to receive and utilize ATV-DNR grant funds 2019-2021 awarded to their office.

Agreement with TC&W Railroad Company for the Highway 36 railroad project, pending finalization of the contract review process.

Resolution #78-19, Awarding of the Highway 36 Bridge Repair Project, Carver County Contract 19-428.

Created a 1.0 FTE Environmental Services Government Center supervisor position; eliminated a 1.0 FTE Senior Environmentalist position and related Public Services budget amendment.

Approved limiting business hours in non 24/7 facilities on December 24, 2019, to 8:00 a.m.-Noon, and allow employees to use PTO, comp time, flex time or voluntary unpaid leave to fill the day; and in specific situations, allow greater flexibility of work hours within the same work week to accommodate the reduction of regular business hours on the 24th.

Authorized the Sheriff's Office acceptance of citizen monetary donation.

Reviewed October 8, 2019, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$285,884.77.

Motion carried unanimously.

Jason Mielke, Land Management, requested the Board adopt a Resolution providing a negative declaration regarding the need for an Environmental Impact Statement, Wm. Mueller & Sons gravel pit expansion. In August, the Board authorized staff to distribute the EAW to begin the 30-day comment period regarding the expansion. Mielke explained the comment period has ended and a decision is required in order to determine whether an Environmental Impact Statement is needed. He stated the County must decide whether the project has the potential for significant environmental effects.

He indicated the EAW was distributed to 18 different government agencies and they received six comments. Mielke stated the applicant's consultant provided assistance in putting together additional information for the comments and responses. He reviewed the comment letters received from the offices of the State Archaeologist and Minnesota State Historic Preservation. He indicated a Phase 1 archeological survey would be conducted over the site and conditions could be included in the interim use permit. He added the other comment letters did not have any specific concerns. Based on the documents received, it did not appear an EIS was warranted in this situation.

Ische offered the following Resolution, seconded by Lynch:

Resolution #79-19

For a Negative Declaration Regarding the Need for an Environmental Impact Statement For the Proposed Expansion of the Existing WM. Mueller & Sons, Inc.,

Mining Operation – Lundquist Mine

On vote taken, all vote aye.

Paul Moline, Planning & Water Management, requested the Board authorize staff to submit the revised 2040 Comprehensive Plan to the Met Council.

Adriana Atcheson, Planning & Water Management, reviewed the approval process to date. She pointed out changes made to the 2040 growth area and indicated the County's watershed management plan was added as an appendix. Atcheson stated Laketown Township's changes related to wastewater and forecasts. She indicated the Met Council provided updated forecasts for the township and all the cities.

She explained the next step is to resubmit the plan to the Met Council and they have 120 days to complete their review. Once the plan is approved by the Council, it will be brought back to the Board for adoption.

Moline clarified the Plan can be amended after it is adopted and the townships can request the County amend their chapter.

Workman moved, Ische seconded, to authorize staff to submit the revised Carver County 2040 Comprehensive Plan to the Metropolitan Council for review. Motion carried unanimously.

Lynch moved, Degler seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 9:27 a.m. Motion carried unanimously.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

The Shores of Waconia Development is a 50 acre single-family housing development proposed on the southeast side of Lake Waconia and adjacent to the northern boundary of Lake Waconia Regional Park, on land formerly known as the Anderson property.

The development project plans to connect a future recreational trail from the park through the housing development, and ultimately with the regional trail along County Road 92.

Lot 1 of the housing development is located along Lake Waconia and is adjacent to the northern boundary of the park. Lot 1 also is near the planned trail connection in the park.

Rather than constructing a retaining wall on private property to physically demarcate the boundary between the park and the housing development, the developer offered October 4, of 2019 to construct a natural looking embankment at no cost to the County.

The proposed embankment would be located on private property at the rear of Lot 1 and extend 30 feet onto park property. The embankment would change the elevation on park property from 965' to 974', be approximately 9 feet high, and have a V:H slope ratio of approximately 3.5' to 1'. The embankment would be naturally landscaped.


The Shores of Waconia Development proposal benefits Lake Waconia Regional Park and the single-family housing development. Those benefits include:

- 1) A natural embankment will eliminate the need for the developer to install a retaining wall between the boundary of the park property and the housing development. Maintenance of a retaining wall likely would have required maintenance workers to obtain access to the park. The proposed grading and landscaping of the embankment eliminates a need for maintenance workers to access the park.
- 2) The proposed grading and landscaping of the embankment will provide park users with a natural physical transition between the park property and the adjacent housing development, and will maximize the aesthetics of the park by eliminating the view of a man-made retaining wall.
- 3) A natural embankment will visually buffer the publics' views of Lot 1 from the park, and will provide a natural visual screening of activities occurring within the park.
- 4) Additionally, the embankment will physically guide future recreational trail users to the trail entrance point near Lot 1, and into the development. Trail users will be less likely to climb the embankment or follow the shoreline to access the trail in the development.

) The embankment will provide a natural physical boundary between the park property and the housing development, and lso may eliminate the public's general encroachment into park property there.									
7) The proposed grading and landscaping work on park property directly benefits the public as the County will not incur any costs now or in the future to make similar improvements, including the installation of a retaining wall or fence when the Lot 1 becomes occupied.

The Planning Commission recommended approval of Scott and Kathryn Bakkelund's Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a Contractor's Yard (Bakkelund Tree & Landscape Service), on their 5.5-acre parcel located in Section 17, Dahlgren Township. The hours of operation would typically be 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Occasionally, vehicles may enter and leave the site outside of the normal business hours due to snow plowing and 24-hour emergency services the business provides. Approximately three full-time employees would report to the site, with an estimated four to eight vehicle trips to and from the site each day. The business would utilize five commercial vehicles. The applicants have proposed a 60'x120' structure which would store vehicles, equipment, and supplies as well as some personal items. The Dahlgren Town Board has recommended approval of the request with the conditions of screening on the west and north side of the property, dust coating in front of the subject property and the three homes immediately west of the Bakkelunds', and trees/wood from the commercial business activity shall not be brought back to the property except for personal use.

WHEREAS, said application was duly considered at a public hearing held by the Carver County Planning Commission at its regular meeting of October 15, 2019; and,

WHEREAS, the Carver County Planning Commission finds as follows:

- 1. Mr. & Mrs. Bakkelund own a 5.50-acre parcel in the Southwest Quarter (SW¼) of the Northeast Quarter (NE¼) in Section 17, Dahlgren Township. The parcel is improved with a house with an attached garage and is located in the Agricultural Zoning District and the CCWMO (Bevens and Carver Creek watershed).
- 2. The applicants are requesting a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to operate a Contractor's Yard pursuant to Section 152.079 C10 of the Carver County Zoning Code.
- 3. The Bakkelunds are requesting to use the subject property for a Contractor's Yard (i.e. Bakkelund Tree & Landscape Service). Hours of operation would generally be from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Occasionally, vehicles may enter and leave the site outside of the normal business hours due to snow plowing and 24-hour emergency services the business provides. Approximately three full time employees would report to the site daily with approximately four to eight trips to and from the site daily. Five vehicles would be associated with the business. All business vehicles would access the property via County Road 41 to 130th Street. Additionally, the applicant has indicated that he would be willing to dust coat the road between County Road 41 and their property. The applicant appears to meet the minimum standards for a Contractor's Yard CUP.
- 4. Proposed outside storage would consist of surplus materials from jobs such as boulders or retaining wall blocks. These materials would be stored temporarily until needed at a future job. The outside storage would be kept in a 20'x20' area screened from neighboring properties. The applicant would not store trees or wood for business use.
- 5. The applicants' proposal includes construction of a 60'x120' accessory pole building that would be used to store the business's equipment and vehicles as well as personal storage. About a quarter of the building would be used for personal items such as a boat, etc. The property near the structure would be graded so that water is diverted away from the western property. Additional gutters could be installed if needed as well as drain tile to further direct water away from the western property.
- 6. The building would be screened on the north and west sides of the property with a double staggered row of spruce trees placed approximately every 15 feet as indicated on the aerial. The building would be accessed from the south and east sides.
- 7. The applicants are not proposing any signage at this time, although if signage is proposed in the future, it would be

required to meet the standards of Chapter 154 of the County Code; not to exceed 32 square feet of surface area. The size of a two-sided sign shall be calculated based on the surface area of only one of the sides, provided the sign surfaces are completely flush.

- 8. The Conditional Use Permit operational plan submitted by the applicant proposed water and a restroom in the building. If the Permittee decides to pursue the water and restroom option, a Subsurface Sewage Treatment System (SSTS) design would need to be submitted, reviewed and approved by the Carver County Environmental Services Department to verify that it meets all requirements of MN Rule 7080-7083 and Chapter 52 of the Carver County Code of Ordinances.
- 9. The Land Management Department received a letter on October 15, 2019, prior to the Planning Commission meeting from the Lueck family (8500 130th Street Cologne, MN 55322) with photos of materials on the Bakkelund property and road condition of 130th Street. The letter also noted concerns with dumping, vehicle weight on the road, size of the business and Dahlgren Township's recommendation of approval in relation to the application. All points were addressed by the Bakkelunds and Mark Willems of the town board and Planning Commission during the meeting.
- 10. During the Planning Commission meeting, Lauren Schnobrich from Burns & Hansen Attorneys at Law representing Nicholas and Nancy Schultz, explained the Schultzs' concerns with issuance of the CUP prior to the resolution of the property dispute. Additionally, Ms. Schnobrich described that the location of the accessory building and approval of the CUP negates findings in Section 152.251 (B), (C), (D), (G) and (I). Lastly Ms. Schnobrich described the variables of lighting, stormwater, light and tree concerns associated with the application. Ms. Schnobrich submitted a letter dated October 15, 2019, to be entered into the record summarizing what she presented during the meeting.
- 11. Also during the October 15, 2019, Planning Commission meeting, Nicholas Schultz (neighboring landowner at 8410 130th Street Cologne, MN 55322) discussed concerns with the condition and maintenance of the township road, lighting, drainage and screening. Additionally, Mr. Schultz explained the ongoing property line dispute between his property and the subject parcel.
- 12. Lee Wickenhauser (13010 Kelley Avenue Chaska, MN 55318) commented during the public hearing emphasizing the importance of property rights in the Planning Commission's consideration of the application.
- 13. The Dahlgren Town Board reviewed the request at their August 12, 2019 and September 9, 2019, Town Board meetings and recommended approval during their September meeting. The township has requested screening on the west and north side, dust coating in front of the subject property and the three homes immediately west of the Bakkelund's and that trees are not brought to the property excluding personal use wood.
- 14. The Planning Commission has considered all the factors required by Section 152.251 of the Carver County Code and finds that all are either true in this case or can be mitigated by conditions placed on the permit.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the Carver County Planning Commission hereby recommends the issuance of Conditional Use Permit #PZ20190049, for a Contractors Yard on the land described in Exhibit "A" of the permit application. The Planning Commission further recommends that the following conditions be attached to the permit:

- The permit is subject to administrative review. The Permittee shall maintain homestead status on the property. A
 change in ownership, operations or operator shall be cause for the permit to be reviewed by Land Management for a
 determination as to whether an application for an amendment or similar consideration is necessary. Proposed owners
 and/or operators are encouraged to contact Land Management as early on in the timeline of the proposed change as
 possible.
- 2. The operation shall be substantially in accordance with the submitted operational & site plans (dated: 8/27/2019). These plans shall be requirements of this permit.
- 3. The permittee shall obtain the appropriate building permit(s) prior to the construction of the structure. All work shall be done in accordance with the submitted plan.


- 4. Any future remodeling or improvements to existing structures shall require Carver County Building Official review and permit approval if applicable. Future construction of any new structure to be utilized as part of the business, shall require the issuance of a new Conditional Use Permit and the issuance of applicable building permits prior to construction.
- 5. The Contractor's Yard must comply with the Subsurface Sewage Treatment System requirements of MN Rule 7080-7083 and Chapter 52 of the Carver County Code of Ordinances.
- 6. Permittee shall comply with all road authority (Dahlgren Township) requirements which may include but is not limited to screening on the west and north side, dust coating in front of the subject property and the three homes immediately west of the Bakkelunds' as well as a restriction that trees are not brought to the property excluding personal use wood.
- 7. A maximum of nine (9) business vehicles (including, but not limited to: pickups and commercial trucks utilized to supply the service) may be stored and/or permitted on the site.
- 8. All outside storage shall be screened from neighboring properties and the public road and all business-related trucks, equipment and supplies shall be stored within existing structures and/or the approved 20'x20' area.
- 9. The permittee shall obtain and maintain a Non-generator's Certificate or contact the Environmental Services Department to obtain a Hazardous Waste Generator's License, if required.
- 10. The permittee shall submit a Certificate of Workers' Compensation Insurance and/or proper affidavit to the Land Management Department.

SUBJECT: 2020 Regional Solicitation Public Comments

Dear Chair Hovland and TAB Members,

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the 2020 Regional Solicitation application language and funding guidance for the distribution of federal transportation funds to local initiated projects for regional transportation needs. Carver County recognizes and appreciates the work put in by the members of the Policy Work Group, the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), the TAC Funding and Programming Committee, and the Metropolitan Council staff in this important area.

Carver County reviewed the proposed major changes, recognizes the potential critical impact of these changes on future funding awards, and respectfully requests consideration of the following for incorporation into the 2020 Regional Solicitation application language and funding guidance:

- 1. Maintain the mid-point funding ranges for the Road & Bridge Category and Bicycle and Pedestrian Category instead of decreasing the ranges for these categories by \$4 million and \$1 million, respectively. Needs in all transportation funding categories are increasing, and this change will likely eliminate funding for at least one project from each of the aforementioned categories.
- 2. Eliminate the 2.5% setaside for the Unique Project category. The Unique Project category bypasses the technical standards and regional vetting process developed and required as part of the regular Regional Solicitation process based on Transportation Policy Plan guidance.
- 3. Revise the new two-part and bonus point scoring system added to Criterion 4A. Deficiencies and Safety for the Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities Category. Remove Part 2: Regional Bicycle Barrier Crossing Improvements and Major River Bicycle Barrier Crossings scoring and bonus point option. Review and consider the recommendation from the Regional Bicycle Barrier Study work group and TAC Funding & Programming.

4. Revise and redistribute the allocation of 50 additional points to Criterion 2A. Potential Usage – Existing population and employment within 1-mile in the Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities Category. This measure does not accurately capture facility usage in Rural or Rural Center communities or for bicycle and pedestrian facilities that serve as the primary connection between communities. Allocating additional points to this category further disadvantages applicants outside Urban Center communities.

2019 Carver County Public Health Community Health Assessment Executive Summary

Introduction

In 2019 the Carver County Public Health Department, in partnership with the Carver County Public Health Advisory Council, completed a community health assessment (CHA) to obtain a current picture and an understanding of the story behind the health of county residents. This includes the relationships, policies, community conditions, and decisions that affect people's ability to live healthy.

The results from the assessment are summarized within four categories:

- People: describes who lives in Carver County, and who will be living here in the future.
- **Opportunity:** the opportunities which people have throughout their lives.
- **Belonging:** social inclusion or exclusion, as well as community connections, throughout one's life.
- Nature: connections and interactions with the natural environment; including water, land, and air.

The primary themes identified across the assessments include:

- **Affordability:** adequate finances available to fulfill needs; including physical and mental healthcare for self and family, as well as other needs that impact health like food, housing, childcare, etc.
- **Transportation:** by all modes and for many purposes; including personal vehicles, mass transit, ride share, walking, and biking. The inability to travel to meet one's needs for work, healthcare, shopping, recreation, and more impacts health.
- **Housing:** that meets a broad range of needs, which can change over one's lifespan. Having safe, stable housing which both meets a person's needs and is affordable for them, is foundational to their opportunity to be healthy.
- **Communicating:** encompassing awareness, enlightenment, and understanding. Are people and organizations knowledgeable about available resources? Have we learned about our differences and our similarities? If miscommunication is occurring, it may be a barrier to health.
- **Mental and Physical Well-being:** carrying out one's daily activities, having fulfilling relationships, contributing, and being resilient. Opportunities for these to occur impacts health.

Themes can overlap each other – both within and across the categories – resulting in complimentary opportunities that optimize health, or compounding challenges that inhibit health.

People

In 2017, 102,858 people lived in Carver County, making it the 12th most populous and second fastest growing county in Minnesota. Located at the southwestern edge of the Twin Cities metropolitan area, Carver is comprised of eleven cities and ten townships. Despite being designated an urban county as part of the seven-county metro, Carver is considered a mix of suburban edge, emerging suburban edge, rural center, diversified rural, and agricultural. According to the Minnesota State

Demographic Center, Carver's total population is estimated to increase by 32 percent between 2015 and 2050. The percent of Carver's nonwhite or Latino population will likely grow from 12 percent in 2015 to 18.6 percent in 2035, with the largest minority group being Hispanic or Latino.

In 2017 just over three percent of Carver children were in families with incomes below the threshold of 100 percent of the federal

poverty level (FPL); a household income of about \$24,000 for a family of four, which equals about 1,000 children. Carver County has one of the lowest poverty rates in the state. However, nine percent of black children and twelve percent of Hispanic children are in poverty, compared to just three percent of white children.

There are higher concentrations of people age 65 and older in the western side of Carver County, and this age group is the fastest growing across the county. Aging presents new challenges to health, including increasing levels of disability. Nearly 30 percent of Carver residents at 65 years and older are disabled.

Opportunity

Opportunity means having the chance to experience success at every stage of life. Issues of opportunity related to health include education, income, employment and benefits, housing, and transportation. Our opportunities are interconnected.

Income

Income shapes many areas of our lives: where we live as well as the stability and condition of our living arrangements, the kinds of recreation we can take part in, the kinds of food we eat, and more. Despite having one of the highest median incomes in the state (\$93,000 for Carver County in 2017), Black and Hispanic households in Carver have lower median household incomes than white households.

Transportation

Transportation is key to many daily activities, including access to food, health care, and employment, as well as connections to family, friends, and faith communities. Equitable transportation supports the health of communities by ensuring that everyone can get where they need to go.


We heard opportunities for safe, reliable and efficient transportation options that meet a variety of needs is lacking for a significant number of residents. This is more common for adults who do not or cannot drive a vehicle, so they require some type of ride share or mass transit service to get their transportation needs met. These types of services are very limited in many communities, especially in Western Carver.

Housing

We all need a safe place to live which allows us to also afford other necessities. Stable housing provides a critical foundation for daily living and health. When such housing is out of reach, we may end up living in places that do not meet basic health and safety standards. In addition

In addition to finding available housing that is affordable, we heard from people who encountered other in the west. Not enough affordable housing, transportation, childcare to support new positions."


Many people cannot find the type of housing they need in the community where they prefer to live. This included young adults, families, senior adults, and those with physical disabilities. Many want to live close to where they work; however, these opportunities are very limited if they also want a place that both meets their needs and is

affordable for them. Nearly 90 families in Carver County are experiencing short-term or long-term homelessness because conditions are not providing them the opportunity to have stable housing.²

Many people in Carver County, especially renters, are burdened by housing costs that exceed 30 percent of their income, leaving less money to cover other necessities, like food and medical care. Vacancy rates are low, especially for rental units, and both average rent and average home costs have increased, making housing that is affordable increasingly difficult to find. The high cost of renting makes it more difficult to save for a down payment on a house.

Health insurance and access to affordable care

Carver County has higher health insurance coverage (97%) compared to Minnesota overall (95.5%) in part due to a higher overall employment rate. ³ For most people insurance is tied to full-time employment. People with part-time, contract, or low-paying jobs may not have access to health insurance or may lack adequate coverage, causing difficulties for them or their families to get needed care. People who are uninsured or underinsured tend to get sicker before seeing a doctor, and have a harder time recovering. Even though the rate of uninsurance is low in the county (3%), there are disparities by income. In Carver, those that are below 138 percent of the federal poverty level are nine times more likely to be uninsured than those above 400 percent FPL.

Residents with limited income stated that they could not afford necessities like healthcare for both their mental and physical conditions; including prescriptions, dental care, and vision care. In some cases it was due to a lack of insurance because of premium costs, and in others it was because of very high deductibles and copayments with their insurance coverage.

Even with insurance, many people do not get the care they need because it is too expensive. In 2013, 31 percent of private-sector employees in Minnesota were enrolled in high deductible insurance, which often carry a deductible of at least \$1,500. In 2017, the number of high deductible insurance plans nearly doubled to 60 percent.⁴

Carver County has a shortage of mental health providers, with 770 residents per one provider. Minnesota's overall ratio is 430 residents to one provider. 15 percent of the county reported delaying mental health care, reporting their issue wasn't serious enough, they didn't know where to go, or they were too nervous or afraid. Lack of insurance was not a large barrier for residents when accessing mental health care.

Nature

How we understand and feel about nature, how we treat our surroundings, and our access to natural spaces are shaped by our families, jobs, culture, and society. Our CHA findings indicated that people in Carver County value connections with the natural environment, as well as maintaining the quality of that environment. Some

expressed concern over our collective investment in maintaining healthy, high quality water, land, and air; particularly with the continued growth and development of the county, as well as the effects of climate change.

Outdoor Recreation

Some individuals interviewed felt that access to local amenities by those with limited income is sometimes an issue due to geographical location and cost barriers. The CHA findings also indicated that transportation issues impact healthy connections to the natural environment. Some people expressed concerns about accessing the outdoors through more active modes of transportation such as walking or biking, due to safety or infrastructure concerns. Residents from Western Carver were more likely to report a lack of access to public space for no-cost recreational use (44.0%) than those from Eastern Carver (27.4%).


Air quality

Outdoor air pollution includes ozone and fine particles, which can trigger asthma and contribute to pneumonia, bronchitis, and heart attacks. Top contributors to outdoor air pollution in Carver are motor vehicles followed by agricultural equipment and home heating. Carver County residents expressed concerns about how things like motorized transportation is impacting air quality, road salt impacting water quality, and how the impact of a variety of transportation issues are impacting

animal, bird, insect, and fish habitat.

Source: Minnesota Department of Health Indoor Air Unit Radon Test Data, 2010-2016 Indoor air pollutants and allergens include asbestos, carbon monoxide, dust mites, formaldehyde, lead dust, mold, fine particles, radon, tobacco smoke, and volatile organic compounds. About 40 percent of Carver County homes have elevated levels of radon. The average radon level in Carver soil is more than three times higher than the average U.S. radon level. Statewide, 500-700 lung cancer deaths are caused by exposure to radon annually, four times as many deaths as homicides (2015).

Food

Food is connected to the ways that people choose to use land and water and the effects these decisions have on the natural environment. Food also connects people. Residents with limited income spoke about their lack of opportunity to obtain food, especially healthy food, which is affordable. This is especially true in communities with limited food distribution locations (from grocery stores, to food shelves, and more). Western Carver County residents report purchasing food from gas stations or convenience stores more often (29%) than Eastern Carver residents (17%).


Belonging

When people feel that they belong, they can use their voices to help shape the conditions in the community that affect their lives and their health. Healthy, positive relationships and lifelong inclusion in society interact to prevent disease, disability, injury, and premature death. They also create a high quality of life.

Excessive Drinking

People binge drink for many reasons, including to feel they belong, to feel more self-confident, to forget their problems, and to avoid negative emotions. Family history and the availability of alcohol are also factors

in binge drinking. Problematic drinking or alcoholism among a household member can be an adverse experience for children. For men, binge drinking is defined as having five or more drinks in a sitting; for women it is four or more.

The percent of Carver County residents who report excessive drinking (26%) exceeds the statewide average (23%) and is more prominent in higher income households. Many focus group participants noted a pervasive culture of drinking in the county.

Isolation

People who are physically or socially isolated are at greater risk of abuse, loneliness, depression, and injury. As people grow older and lose life partners or family members they may become more isolated. The proportion of older persons who are expected to be living alone is anticipated to increase significantly among baby boomers, partly because they have fewer children than preceding generations. In 2010, almost 10 percent of Minnesotans aged 65+ lived alone. This number is expected to rise to over 13 percent by 2030. For rural elders in the western side of the county, the risk of isolation is compounded by distances to family, communities, or needed services. A disability at any age also increases the potential for physical and social isolation.

"People suffer socially, emotionally, and physically when they do not have access to interaction with others, opportunities for affordable recreation and physical activity."



Immigrants and refugees who lack English language skills and cultural knowledge face additional hurdles to belonging. The loss of a shared culture, lack of access to familiar foods, and missing the companionship of friends and loved ones contributes to isolation. Focus group participants noted the importance of having a culturally-relevant food retailer in the community, along with events to create a sense of community.

Suicide

Suicide can reflect a deep sense of hopelessness and lack of belonging. Historical trauma, experiences of racial and other prejudice, physical, sexual, or emotional abuse, being addicted to drugs or alcohol, chronic pain, mental illness, or an immediate crisis can all lead to suicidal thoughts or actions. In Carver County those who have considered suicide is highest among residents aged 45-54 years. Numbers of suicides have slightly increased over time, with 17 occurring in 2017. Mental health was identified as a top health concern by Carver County residents, along with e-cigarette use and distracted driving.

Tobacco

Tobacco use is the primary cause of preventable disease in Carver County, causing one in seven deaths. 11,220 adults (11.2%) smoke cigarettes in the county, costing \$32 million in excess medical costs, or \$753 per household.⁶

Adverse experiences in childhood increase the risk of adolescents turning to nicotine, alcohol, and drugs. Use of e-cigarettes is on a very dramatic rise – primarily among teens and young adults, both statewide and in Carver County. In 2018, half of Minnesota high school seniors reported having tried e-cigarettes at least once.⁷

Students who use tobacco are more likely to also binge drink, experience economic hardship, and have suicidal thoughts.⁸

Communicating and Connecting

The CHA findings brought to light many situations where a lack of awareness, enlightenment, and understanding created barriers for people to attain the opportunities needed to pursue optimal health for themselves and their families.

"There are a lack of avenues to be heard, perpetuating the continuation of unmet needs."

We heard from many people who stated that a lack of understanding around specific needs, by service and resource providers, lead to missed opportunities to meet those needs. This included issues around physical, mental, or financial capacity, as well as race, culture, language, or faith. We also heard of instances where different providers of services and resources are not having efficient communication between themselves, leading to opportunities to effectively serve the public not being realized.

While we heard from some people of color or people with disabilities feeling welcomed in their community, we also heard of many cases where a lack of understanding about their differences from the mainstream population lead to exclusion from opportunities.

What's next?

This community health assessment looked at a broad range of indicators of health and conditions that shape health. The assessment is the first in a series of steps within a process that identifies key issues, prioritizes among those issues, and then develops a community wide plan of action (Community Health Improvement Plan or CHIP) to address the county's most pressing health concerns. At its most basic level, the assessment provides the foundation for the Public Health Advisory Council to develop a five-year strategic plan to improve the health of Carver County. At another level, the assessment provides a framework for anyone in the county to identify issues of concern and focus their own efforts on those areas where they can make a difference, individually or collectively.

No single person or organization can possibly address all the health concerns identified in this assessment. Collective action, focused on policies and systems, can lead to multiple avenues of change.




