A Special Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was conducted via video teleconference due to COVID-19 concerns on June 9, 2020. Vice Chair Gayle Degler convened the session at 9:00 a.m.

Members present: Gayle Degler, Vice Chair, (present in County Board Room), James Ische, Randy Maluchnik and Tom Workman (present via video teleconference).

Members absent: Tim Lynch due to technical difficulties.

Vice Chair Degler explained the Government Center and Boardroom were currently closed. He stated he was speaking from the Boardroom but the other Board members would be videoconferencing in to ensure everyone's safety. He pointed out public comments related to this meeting could be submitted either through email or voice mail.

Under public comments, Vice Chair Degler acknowledged the receipt of comments from Karen Johnson Leuthner, 15735 38th Street, Mayer, regarding the 100,000 FM broadcasting communication tower.

Workman moved, Maluchnik seconded, to approve the agenda. On a roll call vote, Maluchnik Workman, Degler, Ische voted aye. Motion carried.

Ische moved, Maluchnik seconded, to approve the minutes of the June 2, 2020, Regular Session. On a roll call vote, Maluchnik, Workman, Degler, Ische voted aye. Motion carried.

Ische moved, Workman seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Created a 60-day grace period by extending the penalty waiver for late payment of 2020 first half property taxes to July 15th.

Reviewed June 9, 2020, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$201,244.84.

On a roll call vote, Workman, Degler, Ische, Maluchnik voted aye. Motion carried.

Vice Chair Degler explained today they would be recognizing Bill Anderson who had been videotaping Board meetings since 2001. He explained Anderson had been serving as the man behind the screens since that time. Vice Chair Degler read a proclamation into the record thanking Anderson for his dedication and expertise.

Bill Anderson stated he initially retired after working 36 years at the Star Tribune and later found the help wanted ad to video record meetings. He pointed out the numerous changes in technology over the years and the current practice of videoconferencing due to Covid 19 which lead him to decide to retire again. He recognized there were some difficult subjects discussed at meetings and noted Commissioners have been patient listening to the citizens.

The Board concurred that Anderson did an excellent job for the County, was a pleasure to work with and opened up the meetings to the public. The Board expressed their sincere thanks and appreciation for Mr. Anderson's service and wished him well in the future.

Commissioner Lynch joined the videoconference meeting at 9:22 a.m.

Lyndon Robjent, Public Works, requested the Board award the contract for the TH Regional Trail Arboretum Connection project. He pointed out this was a very complex project but would be a very rewarding.

Marty Walsh, Parks, concurred this was a very challenging and exciting project. He referenced the initial 1.2M federal grant awarded in 2015 and Master Plan created in 2016. He reviewed the existing trail and future trails to be constructed and connected to other trail systems. He explained the agreements that were reached with the City of Chanhassen and the Arboretum. He stated cost participation would be 50% County and 25% each from the City and Arboretum. Walsh pointed out both Lifetime Fitness and the Arboretum donated easements at no additional cost.

He highlighted the trail through the Arboretum. He explained the complex permitting issue regarding the wetland and the need to work with multiple agencies that ended up with the boardwalk requirement. He noted the increased costs due to the boardwalk and underpass and the tight timelines to move forward in order to not lose federal funds. An aerial image of the TH 41 underpass and boardwalk was displayed. Walsh indicated the boardwalk was a substantial structure and would carry light maintenance equipment.

Walsh stated they did review options to reduce costs. He reviewed bid results and stated all were over the engineer's estimate. He suggested the overall engineer's cost undervalued the project and believed all three low bids were competitive.

Robjent stated they looked closely at the engineer's estimate and actual bids and identified items that were dramatically different. He pointed out cost savings they would be hoping for in the future. He reviewed project budget of 7.9M and project financing. He indicated the City agreed to the budget increase with the stipulation that the County help them out with the cash flow. He stated the Arboretum agreed to pay their share over ten years and the City asked the County if they would cash flow with a five-year payment. He indicated both would be interest free and noted the use of sales tax funds toward the project.

Walsh pointed out the significance of the trail and benefits of the project.

The Board recognized the Chanhassen City Mayor's request, submitted via email, for a ten year pay back. Robjent clarified the City voted on a five year pay back at their meeting last evening. The Board discussed the option to approve the action today to include a five year pay back from the City and the potential to extend that pay back to ten years after obtaining additional information.

Maluchnik moved, Workman seconded, to adopt a Resolution to award a contract to Veit & Company, Inc., in the amount of \$6,745,464.22 and to authorize the Board Chair and County Administrator to execute the contract upon receipt of concurrence from the City of Chanhassen and the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum, with a five year payback from the City of Chanhassen and direction to staff to come back to the Board with a ten year pay back option.

Resolution #47-20 Awarding of the Trunk Highway 5 Regional Trail Connection Project (SP010-090-008) Carver County Contract (20-181) On a roll call vote, Degler, Ische, Lynch, Maluchnik, Workman voted aye. Motion carried unanimously.

Dave Hemze, County Administrator, requested the Board approve updates to the strategic plan. He pointed out this as an important piece given what is going with Covid 19, the economy and civil unrest. Hemze noted the challenges and opportunities these times create and the potential for telecommuting to continue in the future to alleviate space issues as well as to leverage technology issues. He indicated the County's vision and mission remain the same and updates were added to the goals.

Workman moved, Maluchnik seconded, to adopt Carver County's 2020-2021 Strategic Plan. On a roll call vote, Ische, Maluchnik, Workman, Degler voted aye. Lynch absent for vote due to technical difficulties. Motion carried.

Hemze requested the Board adopt update #2 to the phase 1 reopening plan. He indicated they were nearing the end of phase 1 but it was difficult to predict when doors would be reopened. He stated they would rely on health data to guide decisions.

He referenced the Order issued by the Judicial Branch and proposed changes in the service counter at Court Administration. He stated they we were working on protocols for jury trials. He clarified, in addition to the changes outlined, appointment only services would now include child protection family visitation and urinalysis appointments in HH&S. He stated they would also be coming back with more details for absentee voting. Hemze added they are also looking at getting all Board members back into the boardroom to meet and working on a lay out for physical distancing.

Ische moved, Lynch seconded, to adopt Covid-19 Phase 1 Reopening Update #2 with HH&S service appointments as outlined. On a roll call vote, Lynch, Maluchnik, Workman, Degler, Ische voted aye. Motion carried unanimously,

Workman moved, Lynch seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 10:35 a.m. On a roll call vote, Maluchnik, Workman, Degler, Ische, Lynch voted aye. Motion carried unanimously.





About This Program

The Minnesota State Legislature in 2010 created the Council on Local Results and Innovation to develop standard performance measures to aid residents, taxpayers, and state and local elected officials in determining the efficiency and effectiveness of counties and cities in providing services and measuring residents' opinion of those services. The Council released a standard set of 10 performance measures for counties and created a comprehensive performance measurement system for counties to implement.

Carver County voluntarily agreed to participate in the state's Performance Measurement Program in 2011 and has participated each year since that time. The County follows the guidelines sent out by the Council and receives Local Government Aid reimbursement for its participation in the program. Carver County is one of 26 counties in the state (30 percent of all counties) that participate in the Performance Measurement Program.

The Performance Measurement Program reinforces Carver County's work to achieve its vision, mission, and goals listed and described as follows:

Vision: Where the future embraces the past in keeping Carver County a great place to live, work and play for a lifetime.

Mission: To meet the service requirements and special needs of our residents in a fiscally responsible and caring way. We will plan the county's growth to preserve its uniqueness and will encourage rural and urban compatibility. We will protect our history while planning for a dynamic future.

Goals and Outcome/Output Measures: Carver County's Strategic Plan outlines five goals designed to serve as the foundation for all future strategies, work, and priorities of the County. Each year, the County Board works with County staff to develop an Implementation Plan that outlines outcome/output measures that address the following five goals:

- **Communities Goal**: Create and maintain safe, healthy, and livable communities.
- **Connections Goal**: Develop strong public partnerships and connect people to services and information.
- Finances Goal: Improve the County's financial health and economic profile.
- **Growth Goal**: Manage the challenges and opportunities resulting from growth and development.
- **Culture Goal**: Provide an organizational culture which fosters individual accountability to achieve goals and sustain public trust and confidence in County government.

Within this Performance Measurement and Indicators Report, the County's goal statements related to Communities, Connections, Finances, and Growth are listed with one or more performance measures or indicators listed under the goal. No performance measures or indicators for the Culture goal were included in this report since none of the state standards for performance measures align with the County's goal statement related to Culture.







Public Safety Standard Measures

Crime Rates and Response Times: One aspect of public safety is reflected in data submitted by the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehensions on Part I and Part II crimes committed in Carver County. Part 1 crimes include: homicide, rape, aggravated assault, burglary, robbery, auto theft, theft, and arson. Part II crimes include: other assaults, forgery, fraud, stolen property, vandalism, weapons, prostitution, other sex offenses, narcotics, gambling, family/children crime, driving under the influence (DUI), liquor laws, disorderly conduct, and other offenses. In 2016 a government mandated change in classification for crimes was released, Group A and Group B. Group A crimes include: animal cruelty, arson, assault, aggravated assault, bribery, burglary, counterfeiting/forgery, property damage, drugs, embezzlement, extortion/blackmail, fraud, gambling, homicide, human trafficking, kidnapping, theft/larceny, motor vehicle theft, pornography, prostitution, robbery, sex offenses (forcible and non-forcible), stolen property offenses, and weapons. Group B crimes include: bad checks, curfew/loitering, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence (DUI), drunkenness, family offenses (non-violent), liquor law violation, peeping tom, runaway, trespassing, ordinances, and all other offenses. The following table indicates Part I, Part II, Group A, and Group B crime rates for Carver County and the Carver County Deputy average response times for these types of crimes. The average response time is indicated in minutes from the time the call was dispatched to the first squad on the scene for a top-priority call for Part I, Part II, Group A, and Group B crimes:

Adult Offenders with New Felony Convictions: The recidivism rate for felony offenders is another measure of public safety. Data from the Minnesota Sentencing Guidelines Commission is used to determine the percent of adult offenders with a new felony conviction within three years of discharge. Pre-trial supervision cases were excluded as these cases are not formal supervision, and different results are expected for cased placed on supervision post-adjudication.





Public Health/Social Services Standard Measures

Tobacco and Alcohol Use: In assessing the health of the County, areas of focus for the Public Health Department have included tobacco use and excessive alcohol use by County residents. The department uses the County Health Rankings to obtain information on tobacco and alcohol use by County residents.

Elections Standard Measures

Accuracy of Post-Election Audit: One measure of a livable community is participation in elections and confidence in the accuracy of election results. Minnesota counties perform a post-election audit of election results returned by the optical scan ballot counters used in state general elections. The review is a hand count of the ballots for each eligible election in the precinct compared with the results from the voting system used in the precinct. The following table indicates the percentage of accuracy for the past three state elections.




Environment Standard Measures

Social Services Standard Measures

Workforce Participation Rates: The Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) is the state's welfare reform program for low-income families with children. It helps families work their way out of poverty by expecting, supporting, and rewarding work. Direct benefits include food support and cash assistance. MFIP clients also receive Medical Assistance (MA), child care help, and employment services. When most families first apply for cash assistance, they will participate in the Diversionary Work Program, or DWP. This is a four-month program that helps parents go immediately to work rather than receive welfare. Connecting MFIP/DWP participants to services and information so they can become self-sufficient through employment is one measure of strong public partnerships.

The table below reflects data from the Minnesota Department of Human Services on the percent of MFIP/DWP adult residents of the County who are working 30 or more hours per week or are off cash assistance three years after beginning the program.

The following table reflects the number of Library visits using County records to compare the total population, total number of visits per year, and the number of visits per 1,000 residents.








Financial Standard Measures

Bond Ratings: One indication of a county's financial health is its bond rating. Bond ratings are expressed as letters ranging from "AAA," which is the highest grade, to "C," also referred to as "Junk," which is the lowest grade. An issuer that is rated AAA has an exceptional degree of creditworthiness and can easily meet its financial commitments.

Carver County's ratings shown in the table below were issued by Standard and Poor's (S&P) Rating Services. Carver County is one of six Minnesota counties that received an "AAA" rating. Carver County's rating is also higher than Minnesota's rating of AA+.

Taxation Standard Measures

Level of Assessment Ratio: Carver County is among the fastest growing counties in the state. As the number of households in the County increases along with population growth, the challenge is to provide accurate property value assessments. The level of assessment ratio is an indication of the quality and accuracy of the County's property value assessments. It is based on the difference between a property's assessed value and the actual sale price of the property. If the ratio falls between 90% and 105%, the level of assessment is determined to be acceptable. The following table shows the level of assessment ratio for all property types.

Reopening Carver County - Phase II - Update #2

Proposed June 16 June 9, 2020

Recommended Phase I recommendations are attached with a proposed implementation date of Monday, May 4. Recommended Phase I updates are also shown with a proposed implementation of Wednesday, June 3. The main objective of the phased plan is to keep our citizens and employees safe and healthy while gradually reopening County services. Related strategies include the following.

- 1. All buildings remain closed to general walk-in traffic during Reopening Phase I.
- 2. Service by appointment is offered for certain services that cannot be completed via other methods or are difficult to complete online due to lack of an electronic solution, complexity of transaction, or customer barrier to accessing the service online.
- 3. Electronic processing of documents and applications, and delivery of services via virtual methods are continued and increased where possible. Methods for effective virtual service delivery are refined. Innovations are continued into the future when appropriate.
- 4. Physical spaces are appropriately prepared (room arrangements to support social distancing, protective barriers installed, enhanced cleaning protocols continued, etc.).
- 5. Employees continue to telework where effective service delivery can be provided through remote work arrangements.

Protocols related to services that are reopened will be guided by the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) recommendations. Reopening Carver County - Phase II and Phase III will be recommended to the Board later based upon health data and trends, with the goal of incrementally reopening all Carver County buildings and services.

Continuing to strategically enhance the County's ability to quickly convert to effective service delivery in the event of renewed social distancing or stay at home guidance will remain an ongoing area of focus. It is the County's goal to be prepared and responsive to current and future challenges, while maintaining employee and community health, safety, and wellbeing as top priorities.

- 4. <u>Parks recreation services:</u> Continues with development of new programs and service delivery models. Work continues to implement household size/members up to 25 participants into various programs, continue with virtual and self-guiding programming and marketing and outreach. Some seasonal instructors are utilized as needed.
- 5. <u>Right of way negotiations:</u> One-on-one meetings with property owners occurs as necessary. Physical distancing and PPE protocols in place.

<u>Park amenities:</u> Large events continue to be cancelled including 4th of July Fireworks.

<u>Highway Operations:</u> Continue as is with staff split in 3 locations (Cologne, Hollywood, and Chaska) with 5-6 people in each. Crews separated except on larger projects that require more than 6 people, in which case they are split into small sub-groups and practice physical distancing. Seasonal staff added.

<u>Highway Construction:</u> Continues as planned. Field crews trained in prevention of infectious disease spread in highway work zones. Portable wash stations added.

<u>Parks Maintenance:</u> As workload increases, seasonal staff are added.
