A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on November 17, 2020. The building remained closed due to the health pandemic but was webcast live. Chair James Ische convened the session at 9:00 a.m.

Members present: James Ische, Chair, Gayle Degler, Vice Chair, Randy Maluchnik, Tim Lynch and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Under public comments Chair Ische read a letter from Frederick Schaefer with a request that the Board initiate an investigation related to public safety concerns in the Sheriff's Office.

Also, under public comments, Chair Ische read comments into the record from Karen Johnson Leuthner, Mayer, regarding an CUP solar request that was placed on the consent vs regular agenda two weeks ago. She stated due diligence was not done related to that request and the concerns of the CUP were never addressed. She believed this proves another pattern of unfair treatment and an abuse of power.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Maluchnik seconded, to approve the minutes of the November 3, 2020, Regular Session. Chair Ische clarified he would not be voting as he did not attend the November 3rd meeting. On vote taken, Degler, Lynch, Maluchnik, Workman voted aye. Ische abstained. Motion carried.

Maluchnik moved, Degler seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Contract 20-344 to allow the County to use hotel rooms at the Holiday Inn for shelter until the end of 2020.

Approved professional services agreement with Children's Behavioral Solutions not to exceed \$75,000 to provide children's psychological and residential placement services, pending finalization of the contract review process.

Resolution #79-20 Approving Mining Activity on the Identified Parcel as a Certificate of Zoning Compliance.

Resolution #80-20 Approving the Final Plat of Miller Farm.

Resolution #81-20 County Board Acknowledgment Highway 41 Project-Jonathon Area Final Payment.

Resolution #82-20 Authorizing Settlement Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interested Needed for US 212 Project-Dahlgren Township.

Resolution #83-20 Authorizing Settlement Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interests Needed for Jonathan Carver Parkway Project-Phase 1.

Contract with Tierney Brothers, Inc., pending finalization of the contract review process and related Public Services budget amendment.

Approved the application for renewal of the on-sale and off-sale liquor license including Sunday for Hollywood Roadhouse LL dba Hollywood Roadhouse once the property's delinquent taxes have been paid.

Adjusted Library's job classifications to reflect current position duties as follows: 0.5FTE Chanhassen/Victoria Librarian adjusts to a 0.7FTE Associate Librarian and a 0.6FTE Chaska Librarian position adjust to a 0.7FTE Associate Librarian and add 0.14FTE to STOC.

Contract with NEOGOV for eforms and OnBoard products.

Contract for boiler maintenance with Daikin Applied pending contract finalization.

Contract with Waste Management, pending final approval of contract 20-368 through contract review process.

Reviewed November 10, 2020, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$640,394.74 and reviewed November 17, 2020, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$688,151.84.

Jen Romero, Housing Unit Supervisor and Dan Tengwall, Veterans Services, appeared before the Board for an update on ending veteran homelessness. Romero stated the County was part of a five county region that has declared an end to veteran homelessness. She explained if any veteran is identified as being homeless going forward, it will be rare, brief and non-recurring.

Dan Tengwall, Veterans Services, indicated the State has been a leader in trying to identify and create solutions to eradicate homelessness. He explained the involvement of the State of Minnesota, Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans and area housing authorities. He pointed out the assistance from Commissioner Maluchnik and collaboration with the CDA, Chaska Lions, Chaska Beyond the Yellow Ribbon and others that made this happen.

Chair Ische thanked them for the report and expressed the Board's appreciation for the work done.

Lynch moved, Degler seconded, to recess as the County Board and convene as the Carver County Ditch Authority. Motion carried unanimously.

David Frischmon, Finance, requested the Ditch Authority approve the 2021 payable ditch assessments., He explained this was an annual process to pay for any ditch maintenance through the year. He clarified expenses are paid for by the benefitting property owners.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the following 2021 ditch assessments:

Lynch moved, Maluchnik seconded, to adjourn as the Ditch Authority and reconvene as the County Board of Commissioners. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to go into closed session for labor negotiations strategy. Motion carried unanimously

The Board adjourned the closed session and Regular Session at 10:40 a.m. Motion carried unanimously.

The City of Carver and Carver County have been jointly working together on the Jonathan Carver Parkway Project, which includes the expansion of Highway 11 from 2 to 4-lanes from 4th Street to Highway 61. Additional improvements include a roundabout at Dahlgren Road/6th Street, a new pedestrian underpass by Carver Elementary School and trail, City utilities, and pedestrian crossing improvements along the entire corridor. The construction plans have been completed and approved by the county and city staff and the Minnesota Department of Transportation. Bids are currently being requested for this project and a bid opening has been set for December 17. This joint powers agreement includes the cost sharing and maintenance responsibilities for Carver County and the City of Carver. The City of Carver is expected to approve of this agreement at their December 7 regular city council meeting. This joint powers agreement follows the intent of the Carver County Cost Participation Policy. Construction is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2021 once weather conditions allow work to occur and all work will be complete by late fall 2021.

On November 17, 2020, the Carver County Planning Commission recommended approval of Eldon Young's request for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for an Equestrian Facility (i.e. Personal Indoor Riding Arena), on his 8-acre property located in Section 32, Waconia Township. In October of 2020, a Variance (#PZ20200040) was approved to allow Mr. Young to locate an equestrian facility structure on a parcel less than 10 acres (i.e. allowed on 8 acres). The structure would consist of a 60' x 120' indoor riding arena to be utilized by family for personal use. The proposed structure would meet all applicable setback requirements. The structure would need to meet the applicable State Building Code, Carver County Zoning Code (Chapter 152) requirements. The Permittee would need to comply with the County standards as detailed in Chapter 54 – Feedlot Management requirements and/or appropriate permit(s) required by the Environmental Service Department. Waconia Township recommended approval of the request.

WHEREAS, said application was duly considered at a public hearing held by the Carver County Planning Commission at its regular meeting of November 17, 2020; and,

WHEREAS, the Carver County Planning Commission finds as follows:

- 1. Eldon Young owns an approximately 8-acre parcel located in the Southeast Quarter (SE¼) of the Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of Section 32, Waconia Township. The 8-acre parcel is improved with a single-family dwelling (w/attached garage), two outbuildings (i.e. personal storage & CUP #10165 business activity), personal ground mounted solar array, and wind turbine. The subject parcel is also surrounded by trees and a large open grassland area on the east end. The property is located within the Agricultural Zoning District and the CCWMO (Carver Creek Watershed).
- 2. In October of 2020, a Variance (#PZ20200040) was approved to allow for an equestrian facility on a parcel less than 10 acres (i.e. allowed on 8 acres). The property owner is now requesting a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to construct a Personal Riding Arena (approximately 60' x 120') pursuant to Section 152.079 C (5) of the Carver County Code.
- 3. The applicant is requesting to construct an approximate 60' x 120' indoor riding arena which would be located to the east of their existing house and as indicated in their operational and site plan(s) (dated: August 24, 2020). The proposed structure would meet all applicable setback requirements.
- 4. The applicant has indicated in his narrative, that the indoor riding arena would be built to allow his daughter the ability to ride year-round. This riding arena would be strictly for personal use and would not include commercial business activity. Any additional buildings associated with the equestrian facility (or change from personal use to commercial use) would require a discussion with the Land Management Department to determine whether a new Conditional Use Permit would be required.
- 5. The Carver County Feedlot Officer has reviewed the application and does not have any concerns at this time. Until such time the animal units on the property meets or exceeds 10 animal units, no feedlot requirements apply.
- 6. Based on the intended use, the structure on the property would not increase traffic, water use, manure generation or septic requirements as the structure is specifically for personal use. As part of the CUP request and as shown on the site plan, the applicant would need to construct a second access off of 106th Street to service the indoor riding arena structure. The access location would be allowed pursuant to Section 152.036 (B) of the Zoning Code through an approval by the road authority (i.e. permit approval required) and must meet the standards of this chapter.

- 7. The Waconia Town Board reviewed the request at their August 10, 2020, Town Board meeting. At the conclusion of that meeting, the Township recommended approval of the request and asked that the future indoor riding arena be limited to 60' x 120' and be strictly for personal use.
- 8. The Planning Commission has considered all the factors required by Section 152.251 of the Carver County Code and finds that all are either true in this case or can be mitigated by conditions placed on the permit.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the Carver County Planning Commission hereby recommends the issuance of Conditional Use Permit #PZ20200049, for a Personal Riding Arena on the land described in Exhibit "A" of the permit application. The Planning Commission further recommends that the following conditions be attached to the permit:

- 1. The permit is subject to administrative review. A change in ownership, operations (i.e. personal or commercial), or operator shall be cause for the permit to be reviewed by Land Management for a determination as to whether an application for an amendment or similar consideration is necessary. Proposed owners and/or operators are encouraged to contact Land Management as early in the timeline of the proposed change as possible.
- 2. The structure shall be used only by the occupants of the residence and their guests. The structure shall be utilized for: a personal riding arena, keeping of animals and appurtenant equipment and supplies, personal storage, hobbies, recreation, entertainment, family uses, private maintenance and repair activities, and as otherwise permitted as an accessory structure. Guest quarters and/or additional dwelling units are strictly prohibited. No products or services shall be offered for sale, pay or similar remuneration except as permitted for a home occupation or as otherwise regulated by the Code.
- 3. The equestrian facility shall be operated in accordance with the Site Plan (dated 10/08/2020). This plan shall be attached to and become part of this permit. No public or commercial activities shall be permitted on the site.
- 4. Any required building permit(s) must be applied for and issued prior to construction. Any future remodeling or construction shall be reviewed by the Zoning Administrator to determine if an amendment to the CUP is necessary. All structures shall meet the applicable State Building Code, Carver County Zoning Code (Chapter 152) requirements.
- 5. Where applicable, the Permittee shall comply with the County standards as detailed in Chapter 54 Feedlot Management requirements and/or appropriate permit(s) required by the Environmental Service Department.
- 6. The permit is subject to any/all Township (or appropriate road authority) standards.



BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Carver County, MnDOT and the Southwest Corridor Transportation Coalition have been working together to improve US 212 between the Cities of Chaska and Carver to the City of Norwood Young America for many years. Carver County has led or assisted in many activities along the corridor in the last several years including:

- Corridor Safety and Phasing Plan (Complete)
- Official Right of Way Map from Carver to Cologne (Complete)
- Federal grant applications: TIGER, FASTLANE, INFRA, BUILD
- State grant awards: \$15 million in MHFP for Dahlgren Township Phase
- Regional Solicitation grant awards: \$1 million in SRTS in Norwood Young America, \$7 million in Roadway Expansion for Dahlgren Township Phase, \$3.5 million in Spot Mobility & Safety
- Construction Plans and Land Acquisition for Dahlgren Township Phase (Complete in January 2021)

A March 2021 bid opening is planned for the Dahlgren Township Phase. The goal is to complete the construction of the 4-lane expansion in Dahlgren Township from the City of Cologne to the City of Carver by November 2022. Preliminary design work is continuing on the Benton Township Phase from the City of Norwood Young America to the City of Cologne, which includes a 4-lane expansion and safety improvements as necessary along the corridor, which will complete the vision for the corridor. SRF Consulting Group has completed conceptual engineering layouts for the Benton Township Phase. Completing the NEPA environmental documentation, preparing preliminary design layouts/plans and determining construction and land acquisition impacts are the next steps to continue to move this phase of the project forward. SRF Consulting Group has submitted a work plan to update the environmental documentation and prepare preliminary engineering plans, cost estimate and environmental documentation in support of the project. The work plan has been reviewed by MnDOT and county Public Works staff and is considered acceptable. MnDOT has agreed to share equally in the cost of this work. A separate board action will be prepared to approve this cost split with a joint powers agreement between MnDOT and Carver County.

This past summer, Carver County led a project that added the flashing yellow left turn arrows at all of the interchange ramps along US 212 in Carver County, except for the Highway 11 interchange. The US 212 and Highway 11 interchange required more extensive work which required additional funding and coordination as compared to the other interchanges along US 212, which is why is was not completed with the rest of the US 212 interchanges. Carver County applied for Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) Local Partnership Project (LPP) funding for the addition of flashing yellow arrows and pavement markings at the US 212 and CSAH 11 interchange. MnDOT awarded Carver County \$136,100 in funding for this work that will be included in the project scope of the Jonathan Carver Parkway Project. This cooperative agreement specifies the requirements to receive the LPP funds and assigns the maintenance responsibilities for the included improvements. The MnDOT LPP funds are capped and any additional costs will be split in accordance with a separate joint powers agreement with the City of Carver.



Program Concepts

Program A: Emergency cash infusion for local businesses

This program would be set up similar to the SBEA program where it's a grant to businesses after appropriate documentation.

• Grant amount: up to \$15,000 or \$20,000

If you received a \$10,000 grant in the SBEA program you would be eligible for up to an additional \$5,000 or \$10,000 depending up the final amount decided upon.

- Financial impact:
 - Anticipate 150-175 businesses requesting these funds, with 125 responding for additional documentation and qualifying. Of these, 50 are likely to be repeats from the SBEA program.

At \$15,000 this would be: \$1,375,000

- At \$20,000 this would be: \$2,000,000
- For perspective on amounts:
 - Most counties are at \$10,000 for award amounts
 - Hennepin, Kandiyohi, Ramsey, Waseca and Washington counties are going up to \$15,000
 - Others above \$15,000
 - Meeker County-up to \$50,000
 - St. Louis County-up to \$25,000 or \$50,000 depending upon FTE
 - Wright County-up to \$20,000
- If we wanted a program administrator to help similar to the SBEA program, we would need to add additional funds for this. This would likely be too big of a lift for the CDA to do on their own. The CDA however would be responsible for marketing the program, answering questions, etc.
- Business eligibility:
 - o Up to 75 FTEs
 - Up to \$5M in annual revenue
 - o If received state funding would still be eligible
- Priorities (in rank order):
 - 1. Businesses effected by EO 20-99 (bars, restaurants, fitness centers, event centers).
 - 2. Businesses not previously funded by the SBEA or SBRG programs
 - 3. Businesses not previously funded by the SBEA program
 - 4. Businesses previously funded by the SBEA program

Program B: Shop Local campaign

In addition to the emergency cash infusion, a longer term, Shop Local campaign, will continue to direct people to the restaurants, retail and other businesses within the community to help build resiliency.

Why?

- When shopping from a local business, 68% of the profit stays in the community, versus 43% from a non-local/national chain.
- 86% of our businesses employ less than 20 people
- Nearly 1/3 of the businesses in the county are either retail businesses or leisure/hospitality
- The CDA has heard from businesses that if we can't support them with money, then helping to market them and get people in is the next best thing. In fact—at a recent Carver Business Alliance meeting some of the businesses were already talking about how they can do something similar between all of them. We know that we can't give grants to all of our businesses—so how else can we help? This is a longer term effort to help build resiliency. CDA staff has run the concept by a couple of people throughout the county and they are intrigued with this program and that it could be helpful for all of our businesses.

A campaign would be done in coordination with the Chambers of Commerce as well as a steering committee of local businesses and business associations.

Local Control Policy

The Carver County Board of Commissioners supports local decision-making authority and opposes legislation that removes the ability for local elected officials to respond to the needs of their businesses and constituents or that restricts local decision-making authority.

Locally elected decision-makers are in the best position to determine what health, safety and welfare regulations best serve their constituents. Like state and federal legislative leaders, local elected officials are held accountable through Minnesota's robust elections process. Ordinances at the local level are enacted only after a comprehensive, legal, and open process.

The public's access to local officials is much easier, as is attending local county board and city council meetings.

Counties are often laboratories for determining public policy approaches to the challenges that face residents and businesses. Preserving local control in our state has yielded widespread benefits such as the 2007 Freedom to Breathe Act, and an amendment to the Minnesota Clean Indoor Air Act.

Top Priorities

- Provide funding for safety improvements on Highway 212
- 2. Revise the eminent domain appraisal process for property owners
- 3. Provide funding for 82nd Street reconstruction
- 4. Parks and trails legacy funding
- 5. Parks and trails legacy project

Issue #1: Provide Funding for Safety Improvements on Highway 212

Background

US Highway 212 is part of the National Highway System and is one of the most important economic and freight corridors in the state, connecting the Twin Cities to greater Minnesota and points beyond. US Highway 212 provides a critical connection for businesses throughout the state. US Highway 212 serves freight traffic from 74 of 87 counties in Minnesota on any given day.

Approximately 1,900 trucks per day use the two-lane, undivided roadway in Carver County. The two-lane highway is a significant bottleneck for freight and poses many safety issues because of narrow shoulders, no passing lanes, and limited turn lanes. The two-lane bottlenecks in Carver County witnessed 10 fatal crashes since 2009, with four in the last two years.

Carver County and MnDOT designed a solution to expand both two-lane segments between Chaska and Norwood Young America. The road doesn't need to be a freeway but needs to be safe. This innovative and cost-effective proposal utilizes atgrade reduced conflict intersections to save lives.

The first phase (east gap) from Carver to Cologne costs approximately \$50 million. This fully funded segment begins construction in 2021. The County provided \$9 million in local option sales tax to help fund the project.

The second phase (west gap) from Cologne to Norwood Young America costs approximately \$65 million. Carver County committed \$12 million in sales tax, leaving a funding gap of \$53 million for this phase.

The County continues to pursue federal and state funding opportunities for US 212. The County submitted several federal discretionary DOT grants including FASTLANE, INFRA, and BUILD. The latest request was for \$25 million.

With the high fatal and injury crash rate, particularly at the US 212 and Highway 51 intersection (4 fatal crashes in 10 years), the County requests immediate funding to enhance the safety of the highway.

Requested Position

Carver County requests that the legislature provides \$38 million in Trunk Highway Bonds for the expansion of US 212 to a four-lane expressway between the Cities of Cologne and Norwood Young America for engineering, right-of-way acquisition and construction costs.



Issue #2: Revise the Eminent Domain Appraisal Process for Property Owners

Background

Carver County requests revisions to Chapter 117, Eminent Domain, to mitigate the unintended consequences of the legislation which provides procedures, definition, remedies and limitations for condemning authorities when exercising the power of eminent domain for public use or public purpose.

The 2006 revisions to the eminent domain law resulted in a significant cost increase to taxpayers related to attorneys' fees and interest payments incurred by agencies implementing public transportation improvements. This placed an unreasonable and unintended burden on transportation funding. It also prevented public authorities from responding with a new, higher offer to legitimate issues raised by the property owner's appraisal in a timely manner that avoids the property owner incurring unnecessary or additional litigation costs. Wholesale rewrites or challenges will likely be unsuccessful given the political sensitivity with the law.

However, discussion and controversy remain in several areas: attorneys' fees, owner appraisals, land commissioner qualifications, response to offers, timing and schedules. The modest changes proposed below would give condemning authorities a chance to respond to new information that may come to light in the property owner's appraisal, possibly totally avoiding the need to acquire the property through the exercise of eminent domain authority.

Requested Position

Carver County recommends changing the deadline for a property owner to provide their appraisal from 5 to 45 days before the Commissioners' hearing. The condemning authority shall then have 30 days from the receipt of the property owner's appraisal to provide the property owner a revised last written offer.



Issue #3: Provide Funding for 82nd Street Reconstruction

Background

Carver County, along with its partners, completed a transportation plan for all roadway corridors around the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum. The Arboretum Area Transportation Plan identified \$200 million in roadway, trail, utility, and water quality infrastructure investment needed in the next 20 years for Highway 5, Highway 7, Highway 41, Rolling Acres Road, and 82nd Street in the Cities of Victoria, Chaska and Chanhassen. These connections serve as a vital part of the ingress and egress to the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum.

The study's implementation plan describes potential phased individual projects potential funding sources. The County plans to use the local option sales tax for many of these projects. However, Cities require assistance to pay for its portion of the improvements. Given the unique location of 82nd Street, which lies on the southern boundary of the Arboretum and on the northern limit of Chaska green belt, very little opportunity exists for the Cities to generate revenue. The plan shows 82nd street providing an additional entrance to the Arboretum to serve future master plans, with the University expressing support for the proposed upgrades to the roadway and trail system. The

total cost to upgrade 82nd Street to a two-lane county highway totals approximately \$20 million.

Requested Position

Carver County requests that the legislature provide \$10 million in General Obligation Bonds for engineering, right-of-way acquisition and construction of 82nd Street between Bavaria Road and Highway 41.



Issue #4: Parks and trails legacy projects

Background

In April 2012, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources contracted with the Environmental Initiative to manage and facilitate a nine-member working group to develop consensus recommendations and accompanying rationale to serve as a model for parks and trails funding allocations for the FY 2014-2015 biennium and beyond. The Parks and Trails Legacy Funding Committee reached consensus on an interim agreement for parks and trails legacy funding allocations to the majority state and regional providers.

The proposed funding breakdown for Parks and Trail legacy funding is for FY 2014-2019. This funding formula currently continues.

The breakdown is as follows:

- .25% off the top for coordination among partners for marketing and promotional efforts for all parks and trails of state or regional significance.
- .25% off the top to fund resources to establish criteria to allocate Legacy funding

The remainder to be split:

- 40% Minnesota Department of Natural Resources
- 40% Metropolitan Regional Parks and Trails
- 20% Greater Minnesota Regional Parks

Requested Position

Funding from SFY 2022 and 2023 legacy funding shall be no less than 40% to Metro Regional Parks and Trails after the .5% allocation for coordinated marketing and establishment of criteria to allocated Legacy Funding. It is preferred that the allocation of Parks and Trails Legacy Funding for Metro Regional Parks and Trails be equal to the amount of sales tax proceeds generated in the Metropolitan area. Alternatively, the funding would be based on the annual usage of the Metro Regional Park and Trail System in relation to the State Park and Trail System and Greater Minnesota Regional Parks and Trails System.



Issue #5: Parks and trails legacy projects

Background

Implementing Regional Park Agencies submitted prioritized project requests to the Metropolitan Council to be funded by the State with Parks and trails Legacy Funds for fiscal years 2022 & 2023. These projects are consistent with the Regional Parks Policy Plan and individual regional park and trail master plans.

Requested Position

Parks and Trails Legacy Funds shall be dispersed to Regional Park Implementing Agencies by established formula for submitted projects during fiscal year 2022 & 2023.



Issue #6: Maintain Operations and Maintenance Funding for Regional Parks

Background

Carver County receives a portion of its operations and maintenance (O&M) funding for the regional parks it administers. This funding comes from the State General Fund and Metropolitan Council.

Carver County supports the request of the Metropolitan Council of \$9,140,000 in State Funds for operations and maintenance of Regional Parks. The amount is the same as requested in 2019.

In past years regional park implementing agencies received approximately 9% of their operations and maintenance expenditures from the State.

Benefits

- Reduces County property tax to maintain its regional parks
- Continues a satisfactory levels of park services
- Helps off-set cost of by users outside of Carver County

Requested Position

Support legislation for operations and maintenance expenditures for Regional Parks.



Issue #7: County Cost Shifts for State-Mandated Health Care and Social Services

Background

For many years, the Legislature's response to the absence of adequate resources at the State level shifted various health and human services costs to counties. With little exception, the savings accruing from the county assumption of these programs' costs are returned to the State's General Fund; therefore, it rarely supports the operations of the corresponding programs or facilities.

Example: When a person no longer meets hospitalization criteria at the Anoka Metropolitan Regional Treatment Center (AMRTC) or a Community Behavioral Health Hospital (CBHH), counties pay 100% of the cost of care until the person is released to the county.

These cost shifts are paid by county property taxpayers. To illustrate the problem, relative to AMRTC, counties were billed for 13,846 non-acute days, totaling \$18.55 million in 2016 and 10,660 non-acute days, totaling \$14.7 million in 2017. For Carver County, this equated to approximately \$209,000 in 2016 and \$241,000 in 2017. For the CBHH facilities, counties were billed for 3,115 non-acute days totaling \$4.789 million in 2016; in 2017, counties were billed for 2,461 non-acute days totaling

\$3.975 million. For Carver County, this equated to approximately \$53,000 in 2016 and \$47,000 in 2017. As identified, the potential for serious budgetary issues for Carver County exists.

Counties recently experienced operational challenges surrounding the placement of individuals at State Competency Restoration Programs (CRPs). In previous years, individuals who were court ordered to be "treated to competency" following a competency evaluation would be transferred to one of the State's two programs to receive this service. Recently, as part of a process to improve timeliness and access to the State programs, individuals in the program are being discharged prior to being "restored to competency." In some situations, the person is discharged to the community, while in many instances the person is transferred back to jail. Minnesota's statute surrounding responsibility for competency restoration is silent. The lack of clarity as to which entity is responsible is creating confusion for human service entities, courts, jails, and community providers, as individuals are released from State programs with no adequate plans to address the individual's competency needs. Counties are concerned that the lack of clarity in statutes could result in significant and unnecessary cost shifts to the County, as "treatment for competency" may be seen as a form of mental health treatment—which it is not.

Like many other states, the State of Minnesota should be responsible for assuring that an inpatient and community-based competency restoration program be developed and funded.

Example: MN DHS has for many years underfunded services that offer safety to families resulting in a cost shift of those supports and services to the county. They have also underfunded services that assist foster care youth with entering adulthood

successfully and have provided no funding for the 2020 legislated mandate known as the "24-hour call".

In child protection, when a child/family qualifies as a Family Assessment Response (FAR) case, MN Statute §626.556 determines the need for services to address the safety of family members and the risk of subsequent maltreatment. In 2004, Minnesota Department of Human Services issued guidance to support statewide implementation of, FAR, as a demonstrated best practice in child protection. In that same year, MN DHS issued up to \$38,340 in funds to Carver County to provide expanded family support and preservation services. They created BRASS codes 164X and 192X for counties to claim reimbursement for this work. In 2020, Carver County qualified for up to \$36,109 in Family Assessment Response funds. In more than fifteen years MN DHS has not increased that allocation. As a result, counties have covered the cost through local tax levy for the dollars associated with addressing and resolving the child's presenting risk of harm. In 2018, Carver County spent \$113,975 and in 2019 spent \$166,149 to resolve presenting child protection maltreatment concerns and prevent subsequent maltreatment or out-of-home placement for children.

MN DHS underfunds the SELF (Support for Emancipation and Living Functionally) program. This program, started in 1999, is designed to help youth prepare for the transition out of foster care and to independent living. The program initially allowed funds to be paid for children up to age 18. In 2018, the State renamed the program, STAY (Successful Transition to Adulthood for Youth) and expanded the service age to 26 but did not provide any additional funding to serve more young persons. In 2018, Carver County received 3,000 and served 15 young persons and in 2019 we received \$4,500 and served roughly 10

persons. Any dollars beyond the MN DHS allocation were supplemented by the County.

Legislated this year, per MN Statute §260C.219, subd. 6, effective November 1, 2020, is the requirement that a Child Protection social worker assist the foster family with conducting an initial call between the child and the child's family as soon as possible, within 72 hours, after placement. There were no additional dollars granted to counties by the legislature for this new mandate. Additional training, professional determination that the call is in the child's best interest, efforts to locate the parent/legal guardian and coordinate date/time of the call, monitoring, and documentation all take extra time and tracking for the social worker on each case where a child is in out-of-home placement.

Example: Community First Services and Supports (CFSS) is a new self-directed home and community-based service being developed by the Minnesota Department of Human Services. It scheduled for a phased implementation in July 2021 and will replace two current programs, Personal Care Assistance (PCA) and Consumer Support Grant (CSG). Currently, PCA is funded through a random-moment time study process through the State and for CSG Carver County receives 5% of the client's CGS budget for coordination of services. CFSS will have more paperwork requirements than PCA and will require a professional-level staff to manage compared to CSG where a para-professional can administer the program. CFSS is mandated under Minnesota Statute §256B.85. There not a clear pathway yet on how counties will be reimbursed for the assessment and coordination work associated with this program.

Requested Position

Carver County requests the Legislature:

- 1. Reverse the legislative trend of balancing the budget by transferring the cost of State-mandated health care and social services to County property taxpayers.
- 2. Refrain from imposing further unfunded mandates.
- 3. Restore funding previously withdrawn from existing mandates.

Further, when counties are not able to influence the time in which a person is transferred from one State-operated facility to another State-operated facility, counties shouldn't be billed for inpatient and community-based systems for competency restoration—the State should ensure they're billed and appropriately funded.



Issue #8: Sensible Maintenance of Effort Policy

Background

There has been an increasing legislative awareness of the deficiencies of the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) concept, and some progress toward easing the counties' MOE burden was made during the 2009, 2010 and 2011 legislative sessions. In 2010, the Legislature agreed to eliminate the county chemical dependency MOE, effective July 1, 2010. Passage of the legislation increased transparency and budget predictability in an area that was formerly governed by a complicated formula. In 2011, the Legislature agreed to a 10% permanent reduction in counties' mental health MOE.

Despite this limited progress, additional change is needed. Counties remain subject to a childcare MOE that requires a fixed local match equal to their contributions made in calendar year 1996. Also, while counties did receive a 10% reduction to the mental health MOE in 2011, counties are still required to maintain a level of expenditures that are at least 90% of the average expenditures for services for calendar years 2004 and 2005. This type of mandate on counties is no longer necessary because the Affordable Care Act mandates coverage of mental health and substance abuse as one of ten essential benefit categories. Individual and small group health plans will also now be required to provide these services.

Carver County Health and Human Services has become more efficient in delivery of mental health services covered under the MOE. The utilization of technology investments has been a central driver in this increased efficiency, along with more advanced business processes this technology has allowed. Carver County can deliver a higher quality experience to our end users for a reduced cost to local taxpayers. It is this type of innovation that that the current MOE system penalizes.

Requested Position

Carver County proposes that the Legislature repeal the mental health MOE altogether and, further, abandon the MOE system as a whole and rely on performance reviews during the budgeting process and regulation oversight by the state agencies involved with the service providers. Finally, place an emphasis on services that effectively produce intended outcomes for clients, lessen the likelihood of unnecessary cost increases, and allow for on-site flexibility.

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Issue #9: Strengthen the Local Public Health system to protect the health and safety of County residents

Background

Financial support for Local Public Health consists of a complex set of funding sources, including categorical grants, fees/donations, local tax levy and the Local Public Health Grant (LPHG). This myriad of funding sources makes the response required by Public Health to community needs, as mandated, difficult. The LPHG is a critical funding source that provides for the foundation of the system across the state to meet mandated services.

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought to light the shortfalls of the current funding structure to address the statutory role of local Public Health jurisdictions in meeting the needs of the public in times of a health emergency.

Adequately funding the LPHG not only represents the Community Health Board's (CHB) key funding source, but also relieves the increasing demand on the local tax levy dollars. Without an increase in the local public health grant at the state level, local jurisdictions, like Carver County, must continue to fill the gap with local tax levy.

The Carver County Board urges the Legislature to reaffirm the state's commitment to the local public health system, that is

focused and flexibility at the local community level, by increasing its statewide investment in Local Public Health to meet basic requirements outlined in statute.

Requested Position

The Carver County Board encourages the Legislature to strengthen its commitment to local public health by increasing statewide funding for the Local Public Health Grant, and allowing local Public Health jurisdictions the local flexibility to use those funds to fulfill mandates as required in Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 145A, especially during times of public health emergency.



Issue #10: Provide additional funds for mental health/behavioral support for students

Background

Across all K-12 education, administrators see a trend of increased challenges and concerns related to anxiety and depression in students, and at younger ages. The COVID-19 pandemic increased the trajectory of this trend. Through a collaboration with Carver County Behavior Health's School Linked Mental Health Program, all Carver County school districts currently make Carver County therapists available in their schools. More are needed. The School Linked Mental Health Program is funded through insurance, a State grant received by Carver County, and contracts with school districts. Additional State funds are sought to maintain this successful partnership and to make sure that every school within each district has the access to this service as student needs increase.

Some of the primary benefits to increased funding for the School Linked Mental Health Program are:

- Additional staff time to collaborate with school staff to increase early identification and intervention, resulting in better outcomes and decreased special education referrals.
- Training of school staff in early identification and referral through programs such as ACES and Mental

- Health First Aid training empowers more school staff to identify and support student mental health needs.
- As economic struggles increase in our communities, school-based therapy becomes more crucial—more students who are uninsured or underinsured will get services.
- 4. Students who struggle academically and/or parents who struggle economically do not have to miss a ½ day of work and school to attend therapy and telehealth services provide additional resources for overwhelmed families and increase access.
- Increased staff time to collaborate on assessment and intervention both at school and at home yields more effective outcomes. Building bridges between home and school is shown to increase school success.
- 6. Access: Data show most students in school-based programs are experiencing first contact with mental health services even though they have significant symptoms indicating that they would not likely get services without the program. As first responders for many children's mental health needs schools need the teaming and support of mental health professionals.

Requested Position

Carver County requests the Legislature provides additional support for mental health/behavioral health support for students in light of challenges during the pandemic and beyond.



Issue #11: Metropolitan Governance Reform

Background

A coalition of local governments throughout the metropolitan area has joined together to develop a position statement and a set of principles for improving metropolitan governance in the Twin Cities.

The coalition supports the need for regional planning, collaboration and coordination, but seeks to expand local government representation on the Metropolitan Council.

Cities in Carver County that have formally adopted this position include Chanhassen, Chaska, Cologne, Hamburg, Mayer, New Germany, Norwood Young America, Watertown, and Victoria. Other metropolitan local governments formally supporting this position include Andover, Anoka County, Bethel, Blaine, Coates, Columbus, Centerville, Crystal, Dakota County, Elko New Market, Farmington, Forest Lake, Greenwood, Ham Lake, Hampton, Jordan, Lino Lakes, Loretto, Mendota Heights, Mound, New Prague, Nowthen, Oak Grove, Plymouth, Prior Lake, St. Francis, Scott County, and Shakopee. This list is growing as we continue to discuss this critical issue with others.

The coalition's objectives for its collective effort to improved governance are:

- To articulate a vision of responsive and effective metropolitan governance — as represented by a Statement of Belief and Principles for Reform of the Metropolitan Council.
- To align local government interests behind a reform effort — through formation of a broad coalition of metropolitan cities and counties — and a common position.
- To be prepared for any efforts legislative and otherwise — to reform the governance structure and functioning of the Metropolitan Council.


The Metropolitan Council, due to its taxing and policy authority, should be accountable to a regional constituency of those impacted by its decisions. It should not operate as a state agency — as it does in its current form — answerable to only one person, the Governor.

Requested Position

Carver County supports changes to legislation which follow the below principles for Metropolitan Council Reform. Specific legislation has been proposed by the local government coalition on this topic.

- A majority of the members of the Metropolitan Council shall be elected officials, appointed from cities and counties within the region.
- 2. Metropolitan cities shall directly control the appointment process for city representatives to the Metropolitan Council.

- 3. Metropolitan counties shall directly appoint its own representatives to the Metropolitan Council.
- 4. The terms of office for any Metropolitan Council members appointed by the Governor shall be staggered and not coinciding with the Governor's term.
- 5. Membership on the Metropolitan Council shall include representation from every metropolitan county government.
- The Metropolitan Council shall represent the entire region, therefore voting shall be structured based on population and incorporate a system of checks and balances.
