A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on September 21, 2021. Vice Chair Gayle Degler convened the session at 9:00 a.m.

Members present: Gayle Degler, Vice Chair, John P. Fahey, Matt Udermann and Tom Workman.

Members absent: Tim Lynch.

Under public comments, Karen Johnson Leuthner, 15735 38<sup>th</sup> Street, Mayer, commented everyone was sitting six feet apart in the Boardroom but since 1999 the Hollywood Township citizens knew they were being impacted by massive rf and no one was paying attention. She stated since November 1999, she has been fighting for people to be safe. She explained at the last Hollywood Township meeting the broadband representative would not talk to the people and did not explain what was going on with the antennas. She stated her next step would be the freedom of information act. Johnson Leuthner pointed out the amount being spent on the Regional Park development, but nothing was being spent on the tower and equipment was being attached.

Workman moved, Fahey seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Fahey moved, Workman seconded, to approve the minutes of the September 7, 2021, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Udermann moved, Fahey seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Reviewed September 14, 2021, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$226,396.01 and reviewed September 21, 2021, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$491,435.41.

Degler, Fahey, Udermann voted aye. Workman voted nay. Motion carried.

Udermann moved, Workman seconded, to recess as the County Board and convene as the Carver County Regional Rail Authority. Motion carried unanimously.

Marty Walsh, Parks, appeared before the Rail Authority to request approval to amend the Veterans Memorial Site Plan. He identified the location of the memorial in the City of Mayer and the development that has taken place. He noted the original plan was to have pads for equipment and the Veterans Memorial Registry was asking to add more equipment pads and connecting sidewalks. He reviewed the existing site plan and proposed changes. Walsh pointed out the next approvals that would need to be obtained.

Stan Heldt, representing Veterans Memorial Registry, explained they have 400 pavers and they were ready to make another order. He stated they have the capacity for 4,000. He explained the recent addition of barcodes to the panels that would allow visitors to access a website with additional identifying information. He believed the memorial and Parks trails have complimented each other. Heldt explained the proposal to add equipment and identified the proposed locations.

The Board recognized the Veterans Memorial Registry group had done an impressive job in developing the site.

Workman moved, Fahey seconded, to approve the amendment to the site plan with the Veterans' Memorial Registry. Moton carried unanimously.

Udermann moved, Fahey seconded, to adjourn as the Rail Authority and reconvene as the County Board. Motion carried unanimously.

Kate Probert, HH&S, requested the Board adopt the Governor's Proclamation to name September as Workforce Development Month. Probert shared statistics on the number of job postings and unemployment in the County, noting the County has been struggling to fill the jobs available. She explained the Work Force Center offers services to close the gap to help employers find workers and to make sure workers have jobs.

She explained the pandemic effects on childcare, home schooling and transportation and services they have been able to offer. Probert indicated they continue to host virtual events and restarted the youth program. She thanked staff, employers and community members for their support and the Board for their continued investment in workforce development.

Workman moved, Udermann seconded, to adopt the Governor's Proclamation and proclaim September as Workforce Development Month and to acknowledge the outstanding work of the HHS Workforce Development staff and its partners in Carver County. Motion carried unanimously.

David Frischmon, Finance, requested the Board approve the repurchase application for a tax forfeited property. He reviewed the Statutes related to tax forfeited parcels and process to repurchase. He explained on January 10, 2020, Statewide Auto Salvage forfeited to the State and the County took over. In May, 2020, the property owner submitted a request to repurchase and the Board approved the request with three conditions.

He displayed a visual of the before and current condition of the property. Frischmon stated the cars had been removed and all three conditions met.

Workman moved, Fahey seconded, to approve the repurchase of forfeited property by the previous property owner. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 10:00 a.m. Motion carried unanimously.

# Resolution Authorizing Settlement of Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interests Needed for Highway 24 Project

- WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Carver County is the official governing body of Carver County ("County"); and
- WHEREAS, the County, acting by and through its Board of Commissioners, is authorized by law, and pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, § 163.02, subd. 2; §117.012; and § 117.042, to acquire land and other real property interests in Carver County which the County needs for a public use or public purpose; and
- WHEREAS, the County proposes to construct highway and related improvements in Carver County for shoulder widening as part of the Highway 24 Project ("Project"); and
- WHEREAS, to complete the Project, the County must acquire the real property interests described in Exhibit A, attached hereto, from the Owners of the real property interests identified in said Exhibit A; and
- WHEREAS, the County obtained either an appraisal(s) from a licensed real estate appraiser when the estimate of the damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A exceeds \$25,000, or the County obtained a minimum damage acquisition report from a qualified person with appraisal knowledge, in lieu of an appraisal, when the estimate of the damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A is under \$25,000; and
- WHEREAS, County must determine and submit an initial written offer of just compensation to the Owners of said needed real property interests covering the full amount of damages caused by the County's proposed acquisitions; and
- WHEREAS, the Owners of said real property interests may obtain an independent appraisal by a qualified appraiser of the real property interests which the County proposes to acquire for the Project; and
- WHEREAS, the Owners of said real property interests are entitled to reimbursement for the reasonable costs of the appraisal from the County up to a maximum of the limits stated in Minn. Stat. §117.036, provided the Owner submits to County the information necessary for reimbursement; and
- WHEREAS, the Carver County Board of Commissioners authorized the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, to make initial written offers of just compensation to the Owners within the Project from whom property interests are required; and

- WHEREAS, the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, have negotiated settlement(s) with the Owners impacted by the Project as described in said Exhibit A.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that County's acquisition of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A and the construction of highway and related improvements of shoulder widening as part of the Highway 24 Project constitute a valid public use or public purpose; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that based upon the estimate of damages from the County's proposed acquisitions of the real property interests described in said Exhibit A which the County obtained either from an appraisal(s) or a minimum damage acquisition report(s) and the negotiations between said Owner(s) and the Public Works Division Director or agents under his supervision, County shall make a payment of compensation to the Owners within the Project from whom the County must acquire needed real property interests, in the amounts as described in said Exhibit A; and

### BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

The County Board of Commissioners has the authority to establish and revise benefits for non-bargaining employees.

Core benefits for full-time benefit eligible non-bargaining employees currently include life insurance, long-term and short-term disability insurance, and dental insurance. A monthly cafeteria contribution is provided based on the employee's election of health insurance. In addition, County contribution amounts to the Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA)/VEBA Trust or for employees electing the Health Savings Account (HSA) Health Plan option are provided when applicable based on health plan election. Elective benefits include additional short-term disability coverage, supplemental life insurance, medical and dependent care flexible spending accounts, and vision insurance.

It is recommended that the monthly cafeteria contribution be provided to full-time benefit eligible non-bargaining employees based on the employee's election of health insurance, with 2022 monthly County contribution for single at \$855.48; employee + spouse at \$1,393.20; employee + child(ren) at \$1,048.70; family at \$1,772.79, and \$150.00 for waiver. For non-bargaining employees budgeted at least half-time, but less than 0.8 FTE, provide \$250.00 per month toward the cost of single health insurance. It is recommended that the Board provide the same opportunity for non-bargaining employees to receive the employer contributions consistent with those provided for bargaining units that negotiated to accept the cafeteria contributions.

For full-time benefit eligible non-bargaining employees selecting the High Deductible Health Plan with an HRA, in 2022 it is recommended that the County provide a quarterly contribution to the Health Reimbursement Arrangement through a VEBA trust. For eligible employees participating in the plan over the course of the year, it is recommended that an amount of \$750.00 be provided for those with single insurance, and for those with family insurance it is recommended that a contribution of \$1,500.00 be provided. This is no change from the 2021 HRA arrangement.

For full-time benefit eligible non-bargaining employees selecting the High Deductible Health Plan with Health Savings Account Health Plan option, in 2022 it is recommended that for eligible employees participating in the plan over the course of a year, the County provide a contribution of \$1,100.00 for those with single insurance, and \$2,000.00 for those with family insurance. This is no change from the 2021 HSA arrangement.

The motion requested is to approve the 2022 benefits for non-bargaining employees to participate in the benefits package with County contributions as outlined above effective January 1, 2022.

### **ACTION REQUESTED:**

Motion to approve the 2022 benefits for non-bargaining employees as outlined above including 2022 monthly cafeteria contribution amounts for full-time benefit eligible non-bargaining employees based on the employee's election of health insurance with \$855.48 for single, \$1,393.20 for employee + spouse, \$1,048.70 for employee + child(ren), \$1,772.79 for family, and \$150.00 for waiver; maintaining the \$250.00 per month toward the cost of single health insurance for employees budgeted at least half-time but less than 0.8 FTE; and providing HRA/VEBA contributions in the amounts of \$750/\$1,500 and contributions for those electing the HSA High Deductible Health Plan option in the amounts of \$1,100/\$2,000 as described above.

### BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Carver County Personnel Policy and certain collective bargaining agreements require the County to contribute to County-sponsored health insurance for certain retirees. Personnel Policy further requires the Board to set the amount the County will contribute to each retiree's insurance for 2022. In order to qualify for this benefit, retirees must meet the following criteria:

- Must have been hired as a regular employee prior to June 1, 2010,
- Must be retiring from a non-bargaining position covered by this policy or from a position covered by a collective bargaining agreement referring to this policy,
- Must have been employed by Carver County with uninterrupted full time service of twenty (20) years or more,
- Must have attained age 60, but not yet be Medicare-eligible,
- Must have maintained County-sponsored insurance since retirement,
- Must accept coverage offered by the provider of health insurance coverage to Carver County non-bargaining employees, and the terms of coverage being offered to non-bargaining employees,
- And must maintain health coverage through the County.

The recommended monthly cafeteria contributions for active employees are \$855.48 for single, \$1,393.20 for employee + spouse, \$1,048.70 for employee + child(ren) and \$1,772.79 for family, based on employee health insurance plan election. The County's contribution shall not exceed the coverage tier level provided at the time of separation. In past years, the County Board has set the contribution for eligible retirees at an amount consistent with the cafeteria contributions. Retirees selecting family coverage would receive \$1,772.79 per month toward their insurance, employee + spouse would receive \$1,393.20, employee + children would receive \$1,048.70, and those electing single coverage would receive the lesser of the single premium amount or \$855.48 per month.

### **ACTION REQUESTED:**

Set health insurance contributions for eligible retirees as follows, not to exceed the coverage tier level provided at the time of separation: Retirees selecting family coverage would receive \$1,772.79 per month toward their medical insurance premium, employee + spouse would receive \$1,393.20, employee + children would receive \$1,048.70, and those electing single coverage would receive the lesser of the single premium amount or \$855.48 per month.

WHEREAS, said application was duly considered at a public hearing held by the Carver County Planning Commission at its regular meeting of September 21, 2021; and,

WHEREAS, the Carver County Planning Commission finds as follows:

- 1. Heidi Dalbec owns an approximate 20.14-acre parcel in the North Half (N½) of the Southwest Quarter (SW¼) of Section 12, Watertown Township. The parcel is improved with a single-family dwelling with an attached garage, and a 64'x 33' pole building. This property is located in the Agricultural Zoning District and the CCWMO (Crow River watershed).
- 2. The applicant is requesting a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to operate a Contractor's Yard pursuant to Section 152.079 C (10) of the Carver County Zoning Code.
- 3. Ms. Dalbec purchased the subject property in 2014 and is now requesting to use a portion of the subject property for a Contractor's Yard (HD Landscape, Inc) with the potential for outside storage on the existing graveled pad area.
- 4. Ms. Dalbec stated in her letter, dated August 24, 2021, that she would use the existing 64' x 33' pole barn (approximately 2,112 square feet) for the new Contractor's Yard business. She also stated that in addition to herself, there are 1-2 other seasonal employees of the business who would be on-site Monday-Friday, 7am-5pm, April-November. There would no employees on-site December-March. Employees reporting to the property would park their personal vehicles in a designated area within the operational area, gather equipment and take work vehicles to the job sites. The operation would consist of four (4) business-related vehicles and three (3) trailers. The number of trips generated to the site would total approximately 2-4 per day, with access from County Road 127. The applicant has indicated a portable toilet on-site would be utilized and serviced once per week from April-November for employee use.
- 5. The submitted site plan identifies an area west and south of the existing building for temporary outside storage of materials. In addition to this storage area, commercial vehicles associated with this business would also be kept outside. Because there are only four vehicles related to the business and no customers would visit the subject location, no additional parking areas have been included in this proposal. The applicant has indicated she does not have plans to place screening vegetation at this time but would be willing to do so if required along the outdoor storage area. The applicant appears to meet the minimum standards for a Contractor's Yard CUP.

- 6. The applicant is not proposing any signage at this time, although if signage is proposed in the future, it would be required to meet the standards of Chapter 154 of the County Code; not to exceed 32 square feet of surface area. The size of a two-sided sign shall be calculated based on the surface area of only one of the sides, provided the sign surfaces are completely flush.
- 7. On September 7, 2021, this request was reviewed by Senior Environmentalist, Joe Enfield. Mr. Enfield stated that the applicant would be required to provide a copy of the current signed contract for the portable toilet use.
- 8. On September 10, 2021, this request was reviewed by Angie Stenson, Senior Transportation Planner for Carver County Public Works. Ms. Stenson stated that the access location for the proposed use and traffic is consistent with County policy, and the applicant should coordinate with Public Works for required driveway specifications.
- 9. The Watertown Board reviewed the request at their September 7, 2021, Town Board meeting and recommended approval with no additional conditions being requested.
- 10. During the Planning Commission public hearing on September 21, 2021, the board determined screening would not be required along the north property line. At the time of the CUP application request, no existing house has been constructed to warrant screening measures. The adjacent property to the north currently consists of a farm field (approx. 8.5 acres) and a wooded meadow area (approx. 5 acres). The Board determined in lieu of a fence or vegetation screening, a 15-foot buffer between any commercial activity and the north property line be maintained. Personal storage may not cross property line and is not restricted to the 15-foot buffer.
- 11. The Planning Commission has considered all the factors required by Section 152.251 of the Carver County Code and finds that all are either true in this case or can be mitigated by conditions placed on the permit.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT** the Carver County Planning Commission hereby recommends the issuance of Conditional Use Permit #PZ20210052 for a Contractor's Yard (HD Landscape, Inc) on the land described in Exhibit "A" of the conditional use permit application The Planning Commission further recommends that the following conditions be attached to the permit:

- 1. The permit is subject to administrative review. The Permittee shall maintain homestead status on the property. A change in ownership, operations or operator shall be cause for the permit to be reviewed by Land Management for a determination as to whether an application for an amendment or similar consideration is necessary. Proposed owners and/or operators are encouraged to contact Land Management as early in the timeline of the proposed change as possible.
- 2. The operation shall be substantially in accordance with the submitted operational plan and site plan (dated: 8/24/2021). These plans shall be requirements of this permit. Any proposed expansion of the submitted site plan shall be cause for the permit to be reviewed by Land Management for a determination as to whether an application for an amendment or similar consideration is necessary.
- 3. Any future remodeling or improvements of the proposed accessory structure shall require staff review and possible CUP review by the Carver County Planning Commission and Board of Commissioner's. Future construction of any new structure(s) to be utilized as part of the business, shall require a review of the CUP by the Carver County Planning Commission and Board of Commissioner's.
- 4. The Contractor's Yard must comply with the Subsurface Sewage Treatment System requirements of MN Rule 7080-7083 and Chapter 52 of the Carver County Code of Ordinances. The applicant shall provide the Carver County Environmental Services Department a copy of current signed contract for portable toilet use and annually submit a copy thereafter.
- 5. Permittee shall comply with all road authority (Carver County Public Works) requirements and coordinate a field visit to determine if existing driveway is adequate for described contractor's yard activities.

- 6. A maximum of four (4) business vehicles (including, but not limited to: commercial trucks utilized to supply the service) and 3 trailers may be stored and/or permitted on the site. All outside storage shall be reasonably screened from view of neighboring properties and the public road and all business-related trucks, equipment and supplies shall be stored within existing structures and/or the approved operational area. The permittee that maintain a 15-foot setback between any commercial activity and the north property line. Personal storage may not cross property line and is not restricted to the 15-foot setback.
- 7. The permittee shall obtain and maintain a Non-generator's Certificate or contact the Environmental Services Department to obtain a Hazardous Waste Generator's License, if required.
- 8. The permittee shall submit a Certificate of Workers' Compensation Insurance and/or proper affidavit to the Land Management Department.
- 9. The entire operation shall comply with all local, state and federal regulations.

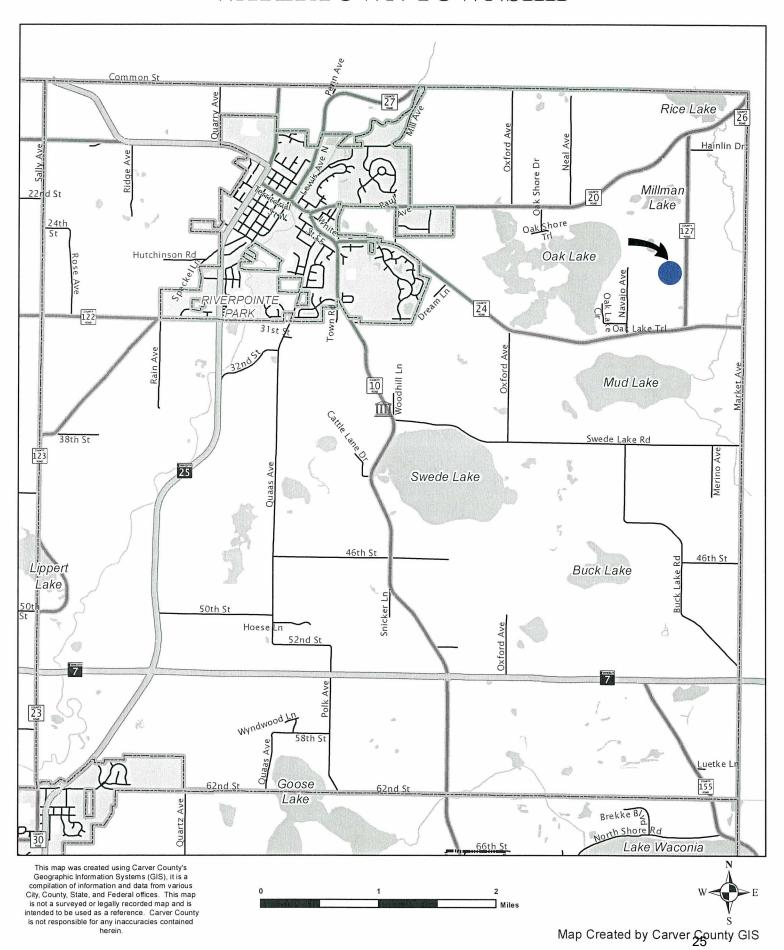

Dear Chair Hovland and TAB Members,

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the 2022 Regional Solicitation application language and funding guidance for the distribution of federal transportation funds to local initiated projects for regional transportation needs. Carver County recognizes and appreciates the work put in by the members of the Policy Work Group, the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), the TAC Funding and Programming Committee, and the Metropolitan Council staff in this important area.

According to the 2020 Census, Carver County is the fastest growing County in the State with a 17.4% increase in population. The County's GDP grew 18.5% from 2012-2015, compared to 5.7% statewide, and accounts for 1.6% of the state's total GDP share (Bureau of Economic Analysis). Population and economic growth in Carver County directly benefits the Twin Cities Metro Area. Continued and increased investment in regional roadway and multimodal infrastructure is needed to serve population and economic growth and address critical safety, freight, and capacity needs of the highway system.

Carver County reviewed the proposed major changes, recognizes the potential crucial impact of these changes on future funding awards, and respectfully requests consideration of the following for incorporation into the 2022 Regional Solicitation application language and funding guidance:

### **Requests for Policy Action**

1. Restore the mid-point funding ranges for the Road & Bridge Category and Bicycle & Pedestrian Category that were decreased in the 2020 Regional Solicitation by \$4 million and \$1 million, respectively. This change took away at least one project from each of these funding categories and negatively impacted the implementation of regional goals for safety, preservation, multimodal, and equity investments on the regional highway system. At a minimum, no additional funding decreases to the Road & Bridge or Bicycle & Pedestrian funding categories should be considered.

- 2. Lower the maximum award for the Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities category from \$5.5 million to \$3.5 million or limit the number of projects that can receive \$5.5 million. The high maximum award limits the number of projects that are funded, which limits the regional and geographic impact of the funding. The midpoint of this funding category is \$26 million. At a maximum of \$5.5 million per project, this illustratively is only funding a minimum of 4.7 projects in the region. This funding category historically has the highest amount of application funding requests. In 2020, 37 funding applications were submitted in the Multiuse Trails & Bicycle Facilities and 10 projects were funded. Three projects received over half of the available funding (\$14.2 million).
  - a. The Regional Solicitation scoring structure is set up to benefit larger projects located in Urban and Urban Center communities (See Request for Technical Revision 3.a). In 2020, 76.8% of the funding for the Multiuse Trails & Bicycle Facilities category was awarded to Urban or Urban Center communities. When large projects are funded at or near the maximum of \$5.5 million, less funding is available for smaller projects outside of Urban and Urban Center communities, which creates a regional disparity in the funding and implementation of regional bicycle and pedestrian projects to Suburban and Rural areas.
- 3. Prioritize local agency projects to receive federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funding. In 2020, MnDOT selected to fund six (6) of their own projects as part of this funding solicitation while eighteen (18) projects from counties and cities were unfunded. MnDOT receives a separate allocation of HSIP funding apart from this funding solicitation.

### **Request for Technical Revisions**

- 1. Major revisions were made to the Pedestrian Safety measure in the Roadway applications. The changes to this measure do not reflect a priority to score major investments in pedestrian infrastructure with a higher score. The majority of the score is now based on 'Location-Based' risk and exposure factors such as nearby transit and pedestrian generators. Location-based attributes of a project are currently scored elsewhere in the application. The proposed pedestrian safety facilities and the associated roadway type, characteristics, and risk factors being mitigated by the proposed improvements should be the basis for the score.
  - a. The proposed 'Location-Based' risk factors only consider existing roadway configuration and not the proposed roadway facility. The scoring guidance includes an assumption that roadway projects should create an environment for vehicles to drive slower regardless of the pedestrian infrastructure being implemented with a project: "Regardless of the speed limit, score projects more highly if they include design elements to help motorists drive slowly."
  - b. The selected 'Location-Based' risk factors exclude the evaluation and prioritization of pedestrian safety investment along high-speed corridors. The selected threshold for scoring purposes is 30 MPH or above. This is not consistent with the extensive technical research and policy guidance that defines higher speed limits of 40-45 MPH+ as higher risk environment for pedestrians (MnDOT, FHWA, LRRB). In

- addition, assigning the points for this risk factor based on a 30 MPH threshold means this measure will have little to no impact on a project's score. Eligible roadways are A-Minor Arterials, which are highly likely to be at least 30 MPH.
- c. The proposed Pedestrian Safety measure language does not include a recognition and subsequent prioritization of risks of a higher rate of severe and fatal pedestrian crashes in rural and suburban areas. Instead the revised measure focuses a priority on urban pedestrian infrastructure based on the measurement of proximity to people.
  - i. The scoring structure was developed based on the Regional Pedestrian Safety Plan conducted by Metropolitan Council in 2020-2021. The study concludes that "Pedestrian crash severity is higher in Rural and Suburban THRIVE Community types; Urban Center crashes are less likely to be severe than those in other parts of the region." The study also states: "Most crashes and most severe crashes occurred in urbanized areas; a higher proportion of pedestrian crashes occurring in rural areas resulted in death or serious injury." Likewise, as part of County Roadway Safety Plan work, MnDOT has identified Pedestrian crashes as the top area above baseline for severe crashes in Rural areas, with an increase of 35% compared to an increase of 12% for all rural crashes.
  - ii. **Request for Revision:** Change Sub-measure 2: Existing Location-Based Pedestrian Safety Risk Factors for the check box regarding the existing road design speed, posted speed limit, or speed study to at least 40 MPH. Change Sub-measure 3: Existing Location-Based Pedestrian Safety Exposure Factors to include Suburban and Rural highway severe and fatal crash risk factor in addition to or as an alternative to the other factors.
- 2. The Regional Solicitation Introduction includes the following direction in #14: "If there is a high-scoring outlier on a particular measure, the TAC F&P Chair, TAB Coordinator, and Council staff will need to approve prorating the other scores based on the second highest scoring project instead of the top project or similar approach."
  - a. Metropolitan Council staff presented information to the Technical Advisory Committees to show the varied interpretation of this guidance and how it has disproportionately negatively impacted higher scoring projects with often little impact to the distribution of scores.
    - i. **Request for Revision:** Change this guidance to mitigate the negative impact to the top scoring project. Add language that clarifies at what threshold the outlier approach should be implemented and how to implement it in order create a simplified and consistent approach to changing original project scores. Use a technical statistical analysis to determine if a score (or scores) would be outlier(s). In statistics, outliers are typically 2 to 3 standard deviations from the mean, with 2 standard deviations used for smaller sample sizes such as this case. A project's score would be used to determine

its percentile rank of all of the scores on a 0 to 100-point scale. By using this calculation, the highest scoring project would receive 100 points and the second place score would be adjusted upwards due to its percentile rank of all of the projects submitted. This statistical analysis is simple to compute and eliminates the subjectivity of determining an outlier like in past regional solicitations.

- 3. Project impacts are inaccurately measured by applying standardized buffer areas for all THRIVE Community Designation types. Standardized buffer measurements are incorporated throughout the Regional Solicitation and disproportionately disadvantage Suburban, Rural, and Rural Center communities by assuming all projects impact the same standard distance of area regardless of Community Designation and nearby roadway network.
  - a. Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities Category: Criterion 2A. Potential Usage Existing population and employment within 1-mile
    - i. Using a standardized buffer area of 1-mile to measure potential usage measure does not accurately capture facility usage in Suburban, Rural, or Rural Center communities. It does not capture usage for bicycle and pedestrian facilities that serve as the primary connection between communities or where the facility may serve as the only bicycle and pedestrian option for many miles. Likewise, it overestimates usage in Urban and Urban Center project locations that likely have multiple available bicycle and pedestrian facility options within 1-mile.
  - b. Roadway Categories: Equity and Affordable Housing
    - i. This measure uses a standardized buffer area of ½ mile of the proposed project to measure a project's impact on equity and affordable housing. The ½ mile buffer area assumption is based on a project in an Urban Center or Urban THRIVE Community Designation area where the roadway network is dense and people more than a ½ mile away from a project are likely to use a different roadway. Projects in THRIVE Community Designations of Suburban, Rural, and Rural Center, however, impact people more than a ½ mile from the project area. With the buffer area limited to a ½ mile for these communities, many impacted by the project are excluded from being assigned value. The result is equity and affordable housing populations are not counted, even though the proposed project is likely to have a major impact on their community.
      - 1. **Request for Revision:** Revise criteria that use a standard buffer distance across all THRIVE Community Designations to calculate a project's impact. Incorporate more accurate buffer distances based on the project location and THRIVE Community Designation. Use the buffer spacing from the Regional Bicycle Transportation Network and Regional Bicycle Barrier Study as an interim solution for the subject

solicitation: ½-mile for Urban Center communities, ¾-mile for Urban communities, 1-mile for Suburban communities, and 2-miles for Rural and Agricultural areas.
