A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on March 1, 2022. Chair Gayle Degler convened the session at 9:00 a.m.

Members present: Gayle Degler, Chair, John P. Fahey, Vice Chair, Tim Lynch, Matt Udermann and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Dave Hemze, County Administrator, acknowledged the public comments received from Karen Johnson Leuthner, 15735 38th Street, Mayer, Minnesota and indicated they would be posted on the County's website under the County Commissioners agenda page.

The following amendment was made to the agenda: Move 9.1 County Administrator report to 8.0.

Lynch moved, Udermann seconded, to approve the agenda as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Fahey seconded, to approve the minutes of the February 15, 2022 Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Udermann moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Contract with PLM Lake and Land Management, Blue Water Science and Waterfront Restoration for professional services for rapid response and management of AIS pending the contract review process.

Resolution #16-22 Awarding of the Countywide 2022 Pavement Marking Contract Carver County Contract 22-062 (PR #228016).

Approved purchase of dock, mini marina, ADA kayak/canoe launch docking station from MINNCOR.

Approved the one day to four day temporary on sale liquor license application for St. Peter Lutheran Church, Watertown for May 22, 2022.

Approved the annual renewal of the Consumption & Display Permit for Marsh Lake Hunting Preserve, Inc.

Approved the purchase of two new Trimble R12i and one-used Trimble R10 GNSS GPS Units from Frontier Precision for the Public Works Program Delivery Department.

Approved out of state conference and travel for the IT Security Manager to attend the 2022 KB4-CON Conference April 20-22, 2022, in Florida.

Approved the settlement agreement between Carver County and AFSCME Council 65 representing Leah Neudorff in the amount of \$8,631.50.

Resolution #17-22 Authorizing Settlement of Compensation to Owners for Acquisition of Real Property Interests Needed for Jonathan Carver Parkway Project-Phase 1.

Approved a purchase agreement for the acquisition of land for the Highway 212 Project-Benton Township at PID #11.0130500.

Resolution #18-22, Authorizing Execution of Agreement, Office of Justice Programs Pathway to Policing Reimbursement Grant 2022 and related Sheriff's Office budget amendment.

Reviewed February 22, 2022, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$365,518.85 and reviewed March 1, 2022, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$245,727.11.

Motion carried unanimously.

The Board considered a Board appointment to Joint Ditch #1 to replace Commissioner Lynch due to a conflict of interest. Lynch explained his conflict related to living in the area that was being considered for a redetermination.. Workman moved, Fahey seconded, to appoint Matt Udermann to Joint Ditch #1. Motion carried unanimously.

Rod Franks, HH&S, requested the Board adopt a Resolution in support of senior care and long-term care communities within Carver County. He noted, as a result of the pandemic, national guard troops were activated to support some long-term facilities as a temporary solution to a long-term problem.

Mike Senden, Auburn Homes and Services President and CEO, explained he was asking for the Board's support in any way possible and pointed out the difficulties the industry has faced over the last two years. He noted the long history of Auburn Homes within the County, the number of residents serve and the number of employees. He explained the pandemic, regulatory issues and inflation costs all came to bear at one time and have contributed to their staffing crisis.

He stated there were over 23,000 open positions throughout the State and they were looking for 37 FTEs within their organization. He pointed out organizations are limiting admissions and they have had to leave beds empty to ensure the care for those they do serve. He reviewed the number of nursing assistants, home health aids and nurse positions unfilled. Menden indicated nursing assistants perform a lot of hands-on work and there is a 27% vacancy in Minnesota. He noted the effects of the pandemic to their occupancy rates and the need for staff to bring residents and create the revenue.

Senden indicated they have 45 units throughout their organization empty and they have received calls from all over the state to find placements for families. He pointed out the rates set by the State are not covering costs and the rates need adjustments.

He stated SF 3195 addresses many of their issues and asked the Board to contact legislators and support the proposed changes. He stated he has never seen this crisis within their industry and, if it doesn't change, they will see a deterioration of services they can provide.

The Board recognized this was an important issue and they would also talk to their legislators.

Fahey offered the following Resolution, seconded by Workman

Resolution #19-22 Supporting Senior Care Communities

On vote taken, all voted aye.

Paul Moline, Planning & Water Management, pointed out the Board's previous direction to draft a 5-year AIS Strategic Plan and indicated they would be reviewing that with the Board today.

Andrew Dickhart, AIS Coordinator, noted the County has had an AIS program since 2011 that begin in the Parks Department that was primarily a water inspection program. Subsequently the program shifted to Planning & Water Management and expanded to include early detection, rapid response and outreach, with watercraft inspections remaining a high priority. Dickhart stated the County receives annual funds from the State and a Board approved plan is required annually by the DNR. He indicated the long-term plan would be used as a guide when determining an annual plan.

He explained the importance of AIS control in water management. He stressed it was important to integrate AIS management activities with other water management activities. Dickhart reviewed the AIS plans and goals. He indicated the objectives were prioritized by staff, stakeholders and the WMO Committee. He noted their number one priority was still watercraft inspections and decontamination. Dickhart stated if the Board approved the 5-year plan they would contract with the City of Chanhassen for watercraft inspections. He also noted promising research that was being done on zebra mussels.

Lynch moved, Workman seconded, to approve the 5-year Aquatic Invasive Species Strategic Plan. Motion carried unanimously.

Darin Mielke, Public Works, requested the Board approve the joint powers agreement and turnback agreement for the Highway 117 project with the City of Chanhassen. He identified the location and the proposed improvements. Over the years, they have received a number of speed and safety concerns and they have been in discussions with the City of Chanhassen about the potential turnback. He identified the locations for the roundabouts and indicated the City approved the turnback agreement at their last meeting. Mielke explained the County would maintain the road through one more season. He believed the project should be done in one construction season unless additional work was added by the City.

He reviewed the proposed schedule with bid opening in 2023. He clarified the City of Chanhassen would take the lead on the project.

Mielke reviewed estimated costs and, following the County's cost sharing policy, the County's share would be 75% and City 25% of the preliminary \$10 million cost estimate. If additional work were added, that would be the City's costs.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to approve a joint powers agreement and Resolution #20-22, Revocation and Turnback of County Road No. 117. Motion carried unanimously.

Andrew Engel, Public Works, requested the Board approve a Resolution to award the Watertown area projects. He reviewed the work to be done for the Highway 10 – North Area, Highway 24 Project, Highway 10 Resurfacing and Highway 127 Resurfacing project. He identified the location for each project and public outreach that was done.

He stated favorable bids were received and Valley Paving came in under their estimate. He pointed out funding for the projects and indicated they applied for and were successful in getting a \$1,250,000 local road improvement program grant for a portion of improvements on Highway 24.

Engel stated they did review the Valley Paving bid and included a few more completion dates for the work to be completed and keep projects moving.

Lynch offered Resolution #21-22 Awarding the Highway 24 Project, Highway 10 Project-North Watertown and Highway 10 and 127 Resurfacing Projects, Carver County Contract 22-070, Projects #s158793/158794/208883/218897 and Resolution #22-22, Agreement No. 1049522 with Minnesota Department of Transportation for the Highway 24 Project, seconded by Degler. On vote taken, Degler, Fahey, Lynch, Udermann voted aye. Workman voted aye. Motion carried.

Under County Administrator reports, Hemze stated he would be recommending that the Board go back to the pre-pandemic seating arrangements in the Boardroom given the trends. The Board concurred with this recommendation.

Lynch moved, Workman seconded, to go into closed session pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 13D.05, subd. 3(c) to discuss confidential settlement negotiations related to PID #04.0160600. Motion carried unanimously.

The Board adjourned the closed and Regular Session at 11:15 a.m.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Communities: Create and maintain safe, healthy, and livable communities

Carver County is moving forward with construction of the Highway 10 Project - North Watertown and Highway 24 Project which are in and around the City of Watertown. Highway 10 work includes pavement rehabilitation and shoulder widening between Highway 25 and the Wright County Line. Highway 24 work includes pavement rehabilitation and shoulder widening between Highway 10 and the Hennepin County Line. Highway 127 is also being included and will be resurfaced. Also, Highway 10 between Jefferson Ave SW and Lewis Ave N will be resurfaced. These projects will start in spring of 2022 and be completed by fall of 2022.

This contract is for on call material testing for all four of these projects. Testing services include but not limited to soils, concrete, and bituminous. Public Works does not have staff available to fully perform material testing. This will be on an as needed not to exceed basis.

Request for Proposals were sent to three different Consulting Firms on February 9th, 2022, and returned on February 28th, 2022. Bids were reviewed by a three person panel within Public Works to determine the best value based on the consultants providing a material testing quote for minimum fees and most likely fees based on project quantities and testing types required to complete the work. WSB was selected as the best value based on unit pricing per test, and overall best cost for most likely testing scenario.

Carver County has worked with this testing consultant with great success in the past.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Every two years the Metropolitan Council solicits funding applications for the Regional Solicitation to distribute federal transportation funds to locally initiated projects serving regional transportation needs. The Metropolitan Council estimates approximately \$180 million in federal transportation funding is available for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 and 2027.

Eligible projects compete for funding within three modal categories, each with subcategories: Roadways Including Multimodal Elements; Transit and Travel Demand Management; and Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities. Staff considered relevant projects for each funding category and recommend submitting projects in the following funding categories: Roadway Strategic Capacity, Roadway Spot Mobility and Safety, Roadway Reconstruction/Modernization, Roadway Traffic Management Technologies, and Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities.

The following nine (9) project applications are recommended to be submitted to the Metropolitan Council's regional solicitation process for federal transportation funding:

1. Highway 5 Lake Minnewashta and Arboretum Access and Mobility Improvement

• Reconstruct and expand Highway 5 from a two-lane rural highway to a four-lane divided expressway between Minnewashta Parkway and Highway 41 including a bridge over Lake Minnewashta.

2. Highway 5 Victoria Mobility and Safety Improvement

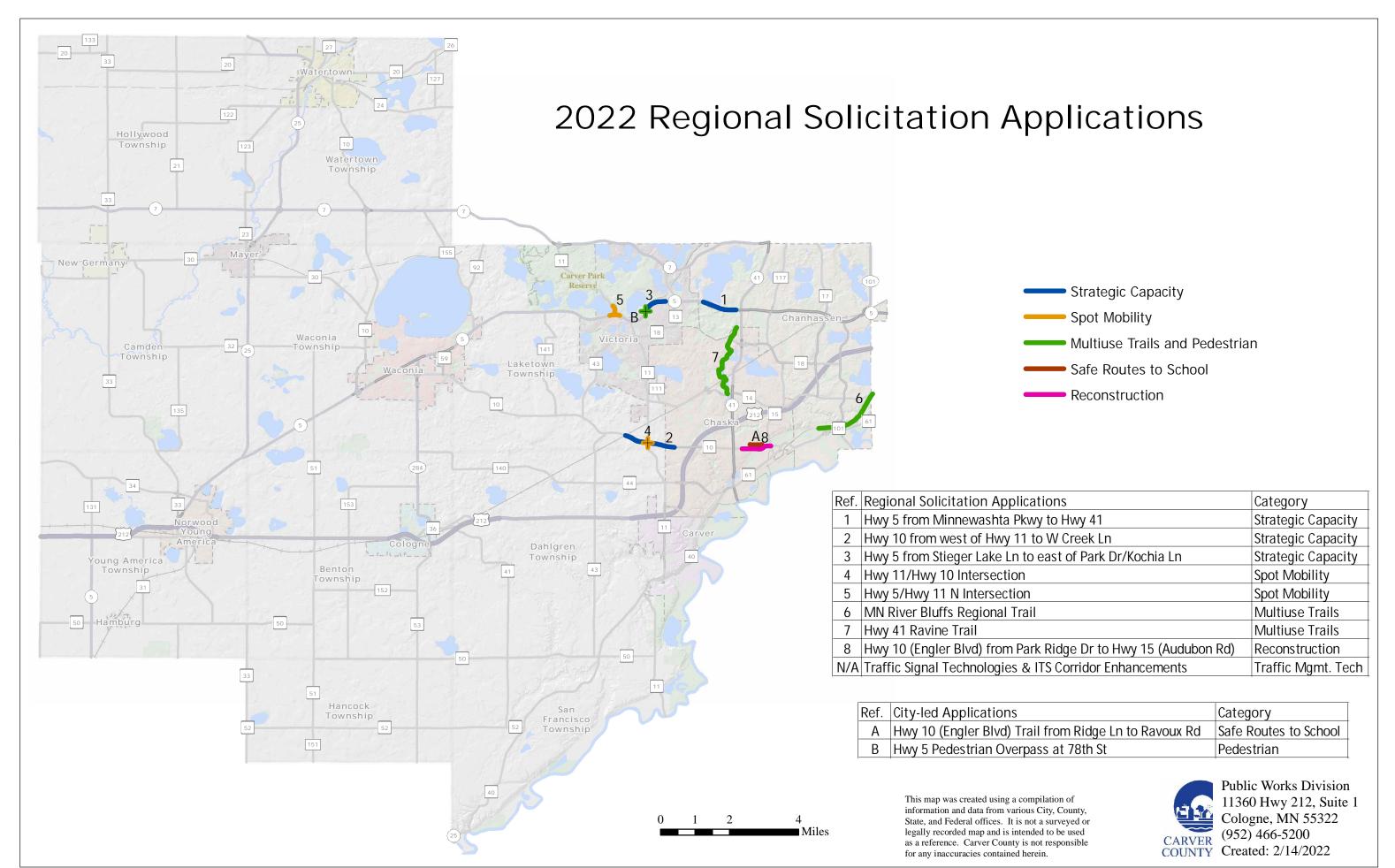

- WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council estimates approximately \$180 million in federal transportation funding is available for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 and 2027; and
- WHEREAS, eligible projects compete for funding within three modal categories, each with subcategories:

 Roadways Including Multimodal Elements; Transit and Travel Demand Management; and Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities and the County has identified competitive, eligible projects to submit in the following funding categories: Roadway Strategic Capacity, Roadway Spot Mobility and Safety, Roadway Reconstruction/Modernization, Roadway Traffic Management Technologies, and Multiuse Trails and Bicycle Facilities; and
- WHEREAS, the following nine (9) project applications are recommended to be submitted to the Metropolitan Council's Regional Solicitation process for federal transportation funding:
 - A. Highway 5 Lake Minnewashta and Arboretum Access and Mobility Improvement from east of Minnewashta Parkway to west of Highway 41
 - B. Highway 5 Victoria Mobility and Safety Improvement from 78th/Stieger Lake Lane to west of Highway 13 (Rolling Acres Road)
 - C. Highway 10 Mobility and Access Corridor Improvement from west of Highway 11 to Creek Lane
 - D. Highway 5/Highway 11 N Intersection Safety and Access Improvement
 - E. Highway 10/Highway 11 Intersection Improvement
 - F. Highway 10 Chaska Corridor Reconstruction Improvement from east of Park Ridge Drive to Highway 15 (Audubon Road)
 - G. Carver County ITS Corridor Enhancements
 - H. Highway 41 Ravine Trail from approximately Highway 14 (Pioneer Trail) to W 82nd Street

- I. Minnesota River Bluffs Regional Trail Connection from Bluff Creek Drive to Highway 14 (Pioneer Trail)
- WHEREAS, these projects are identified in adopted County transportation plans including but not limited to the Arboretum Area Transportation Plan, the Highway 10 Corridor Study, 2040 Comprehensive Plan, and the Capital Improvement Plan; and
- WHEREAS, the County supports the proposed projects and recognizes the local and regional transportation benefits the projects will provide; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners adopted a ½ percent local option sales tax in May 2017 dedicated for transportation projects, of which several of the projects are eligible to utilize as the required local match. County is committed to meeting the local match requirements per this federal transportation grant program; and

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

The county's consultant team of HGA Architects and RJM Construction are finalizing the construction documents and cost estimate for the proposed Waterfront Service Center Building project at Lake Waconia Regional Park. The project is ready to proceed to the bidding phase.

The total project cost, including professional services and construction is estimated at \$8 million.

Public Works is recommending moving ahead with advertising for construction bids as soon as possible given the the current market conditions. In the meantime, the county is seeking additional funding from the legislature to mitigate cost increases and to provide funding for continued development including a new playground, trails and other site amenities.

Staff will present scenarios related to scope and funding with and without additional state bonding.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

County Administrator recommendations for urgent COVID 19 Budget Stabilization Account (BSA) one-time funding requests are listed below. Other pending non-urgent BSA one-time funding requests will be presented to the Board as part of the 2023 budget process.

\$300,000 to continue funding <u>Housing Assistance</u> programs thru December 31, 2023 which are administered by the Carver County Community Development Agency ("CDA") with support from HHS Income Support staff. This program helps residents impacted by the pandemic pay their rent, mortgage and utilities. The CDA has seen an upward trajectory in applications from residents who are at imminent risk of losing their housing or having their utilities disconnected due to the eviction moratorium being lifted in January 2022 as well as the State of Minnesota ending additional enrollment in the State's supported RentHelpMN housing program.

\$162,000 to keep the County's expanded emergency shelter program funded thru the end of 2022. This level of funding will help ensure we have sufficient emergency shelter options to meet the need exacerbated by the pandemic and recovery. By the end of 2022, County staff expect to have right-sized the program to adjust to changing needs and/or explore alternative funding if expanded need should continue.

\$43,000 to allow the <u>Humanity Alliance</u>, a local provider based in Victoria, Minnesota, to continue meeting the need of local families, older adults, children, and individuals that are residents of Carver County and are food insecure due to long-lasting affects of the pandemic and the slow economic recovery. The Humanity Alliance provides fresh, healthy, culturally appropriate, ready-to-eat food that is prepared and delivered directly to the door of enrolled individuals each Friday for weekend meals. This effort began in January 2021 with a \$345,000 commitment from the County Board. As the Humanity Alliance has worked toward program sustainability, the financial need to mitigate any gaps in service caused partially by inflation and higher than expected food costs is \$43,000. It is expected that the program will be fully self-sustainable in 2023. A contract amendment will extend the current contract through December 31, 2022.

\$30,000 for software enhancement to our <u>Credible electronic records system</u> for Behavioral Health. The enhancement is needed to ascertain and analyze data for both mandated reporting and to assist in securing additional funding. The need for this level of data has become more apparent during the pandemic, and will be critical as we continue to transition into an ongoing hybrid environment. Furthermore, this system enhancement will greatly improve efficiency of the data collection process and provide a higher quality of data analysis to inform operational decisions and secure additional funding from both third party payers and grants. \$20K is needed for purchase of business analytic software for Credible, and \$10K for the annual license. Funding for ongoing licensing costs will be integrated into operational budget in future years.

\$28,000 for the purchase and installation of (5) <u>Bradley "Express" Touchless Handwashing Lavatory Systems in the County Jail. The Bradley system would replace the current laminate cabinetry which is no longer an approved Jail product due to the potential for improvised weapons from delaminated pieces while increasing the opportunity for</u>

handwashing in each unit by adding extra faucets and basins.

\$85,375 BSA funded urgent request by the <u>Historical Society</u> to (along with the request describe further below to redirect the \$59,382 Q1 2022 Budget allocation) complete the \$500,000 capital campaign for the <u>Andrew Peterson Farmstead</u> rehabilitation through the Jeffris Family Foundation. The Historical Society's capital campaign was signficantly impacted by the COVID 19 pandemic when potential donors shifted their resources in response to the pandemic and economic recovery. Completing the \$500,000 capital campaign within the established time period means the Historical Society will earn an additional \$250,000 in two-for-one matching grant dollars from the Jeffris Foundation. In addition to the \$85,375 in BSA funds, the Historical Society is requesting a **redirection of Carver County's Q1 2022 allocation in the amount of \$59,382** which is already included in the County's approved 2022 Budget. The Historical Society is balancing its operating budget with a a one-time Federal Employee Retention Tax Credit which can be used to offset the redirection of the Q1 allocation but can not be used for the capital campaign. The total request equates to \$144,757 in BSA and direct County funding allocations to the Andrew Peterson Farmstead project.

BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Redistricting:

Every 10 years an updated Federal Census triggers a voting redistricting process to reflect population changes across the Country. County election staff will present a high-level summary of the various steps, requirements and a proposed schedule to meet statutory deadlines.

Absentee Drop-Off Ballot Boxes for Mailed Out Absentee Ballots:

Voters in 2020 who requested County staff to mail out absentee ballots had the option to return the completed ballot via the US mail or stand in a separate line at the Chaska Government Center to hand off their completed ballot for processing by two election judges. Unlike other MN counties, Carver County did not provide absentee drop-off ballot boxes for voters to return mailed out absentee ballots because the County Attorney's Office felt MN Statutes did not clearly allow for their use. Thus, the County provided a front counter with two election judges who accepted mailed out absentee ballots for the 2020 election. The 2021 Legislature adopted changes which now clearly allow for absentee drop-off ballot boxes when certain requirements are met to ensure voting integrity like adequate lighting, cameras, etc. County staff is recommending installing two absentee drop-off ballot boxes at the Chaska Government Center to eliminate the need for two election judges to staff a separate line for voters to return mailed out absentee ballots.

City In-Person Absentee Precincts:

Counties are required to provide an in-person absentee voting option for all county voters in all County precincts. This requirement creates a relatively complicated process because county election judges must provide ballots for all 35 County precincts at the Chaska Government Center. Since the 2018 election, the City of Waconia has provided in-person absentee voting for the City's 2 precincts at the Waconia City Hall which creates a win-win-win for:

- 1. Waconia voters who conveniently voted in-person absentee at their City Hall
- 2. Waconia City elections judges who had one less voter to process on their busy election day for each voter that voted inperson absentee
- 3. Carver County election judges who had one less absentee voter to process during their busy absentee voting period at the Chaska Government Center for each Waconia voter that voted in-person absentee at the Waconia City Hall.

Carver County's one City Absentee Precinct in Waconia is significantly lower than the number of City Absentee Precincts in other Metro counties which was a driving factor in the 2-3 hour wait for many in-person absentee voters at the Chaska Government Center during the 2020 Election. County election staff have contacted election staff at Chan, Chaska and

Victoria, which is where the vast majority of in-person absentee voters came from in the 2020 election, to encourage them to
also create a win-win-win for their in-person absentee voters by becoming a City In-Person Absentee Precinct for their
respective city precincts.

2022 Election Update Public Presentation:

Since 2021, the County's Election Administrator, Kendra Olson, has been giving high-level presentations to the County Board and various groups about Redistricting and other Election related topics. Kendra will provide an updated presentation on Redistricting and other Election related topics at the Board workshop which she is planning on repeating for various groups like the League of Women Voters, Elected County and City Officials, etc.

Related Financial/FTE Comments:

For the 2018 election, the County offered to reimburse the cities of Chaska, Chanhassen, Victoria and Waconia up to \$3,000 in out-of-pocket costs as a one-time pilot project to be a City Absentee Precinct.
