A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on June 7, 2011. Chair Randy Maluchnik convened the session at 9:15 a.m.

Members present: Randy Maluchnik, Chair, Tim Lynch, Vice Chair, Gayle Degler, James Ische and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Lynch moved, Ische seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Degler seconded, to approve the minutes of the May 24, 2011, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Community announcements were made by the Board.

Degler moved, Ische seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Lynch seconded, to open the public hearing on the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program for Carver County. Motion carried unanimously.

Paul Moline, Public Health and Environment, entered into the record the Affidavit of Publication of the public hearing, the Carver County Management Storm Water Plan, Carver County annual report and the MS4 permit for 2010.

He explained the County is required under the Clean Water Act to have a federal permit for stormwater pollution prevention. He pointed out the area covered and indicated an annual report is required. Moline stated the activities were similar to what the County is already required to do under the County's water management plan.

Moline stressed the need to do education and pointed out the water column and the large audience reached. He stated they collaborate with other watershed partners on TV ads and have held workshops for professionals on storm water techniques. He indicated they also needed to report on construction site management and have reached an agreement with Chaska and Chanhassen on educational activities.

No public testimony was received.

Degler moved, Ische seconded, to close the public hearing. Motion carried unanimously.

Ische moved, Workman seconded, to authorize the Chair to sign the Carver County NPDES Phase II permit 2010 annual report and approved submittal of the report to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Motion carried unanimously.

Doris Krogman, Employee Relations, appeared before the Board to recommend the 2011 Early Retirement Program to begin to address the 2012 budget challenges. She stated the program was modified from last year based on what they learned.

She outlined the eligibility requirements and financial incentives. Krogman noted other metro counties have offered similar incentives and by comparison, Carver County was conservative. She indicated potential savings include a reduction in salaries, the elimination of some positions, reorganization and the anticipation of paying lower wages to the new employees. Krogman estimated a savings of \$300,000 in 2012. She reviewed the program deadlines and her recommendation to not offer a program like this again for at least three years. Krogman noted there would be no promise of avoiding layoffs.

She stated employees would be advised to speak with an attorney and financial advisor and a list of eligible employees would be created. Krogman stated union business representatives are interested if this is adopted and memorandum of agreements would be signed.

Ische offered the following Resolution, seconded by Lynch:

Resolution #36-10 Establishing the 2011 Early Retirement Program

On vote taken, all vote aye.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 9:56 a.m. Motion carried unanimously.

This agreement is for the spraying of county road right-of-way for noxious weeds, thistles and brush. Quotes from Philip's Tree Care (Robbinsdale, MN), 4 Control (Menomonie, WI), DeAngelo Brothers (Albert Lea, MN), and Ag Enterprises (Chaska, MN) were obtained. Staff has evaluated the four quotes and is recommending a contract/professional service agreement with Philip's Tree Care. They provided the lowest labor and material quote and have done this type of work for other counties in the past and are familiar with control along the county roads where weed, thistle and brush problems exist. Staff also is of the opinion that the chemical prices are in line with what is needed for this work. Philip's Tree Care is also going to provide Carver County with GPS Data of weed location. County staff already track several performance measurements in several areas so the State's new program to standardize these measures across counties seems to be a logical next step. Model Performance Measures for Counties

The following are the recommended model measures of performance outcomes for counties, with alternatives provided in some cases. Key output measures are also suggested for consideration by local county officials.

Public Safety:

1. Part I and II crime rates (Submit data as reported by the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension. Part I crimes include murder, rape, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Part II crimes include other assaults, forgery/counterfeiting, embezzlement, stolen property, vandalism, weapons, prostitution, other sex offenses, narcotics, gambling, family/children crime, D.U.I., liquor laws, disorderly conduct, and other offenses.)

OR

Citizen's rating of safety in their county. (Citizen Survey: very safe, somewhat safe, neither safe nor unsafe, somewhat safe, very unsafe)

Output Measure:

Deputy Response Time (Time it takes on top-priority calls from dispatch to the first officer on scene.)

Probation/Corrections:

2. Percent of adult offenders with a new felony conviction within 3 years of discharge

Public Works:

- 3. Hours to plow complete system during a snow event
- 4. Average county pavement condition rating

OR

Citizen's rating of the road conditions in their county. (Citizen Survey: good condition, mostly good condition, many bad spots)

Existing work loads in the tax area of the Taxpayer Services Department have increased substantially. This position will be responsible for a portion of the tax calculation process, collection and settlement, abatement, report generation and research in the tax area. This hire will create additional stability in the tax area as we continue to reassess organizational changes within the Divisions Departments and consider cross training staff when appropriate. We will reallocate salary dollars within the Property Records Taxpayer Services Division to fund the Tax Clerk hire. The elimination of the Property Records Manager and reallocation of dollars to the Tax Clerk hire will result in a net decrease (savings) of approximately \$53,000.00. BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

In March 2010 the Board approved the submission of an application for round two ARRA funding for the Carver County Open Fiber Initiative (CCOFI). In August 2010, the County was notified that the CCOFI project had been awarded federal funding of \$5,995,600, which covers 80% of the project cost, with the County responsible for a 20% match of \$1,498,900 of the overall project budget of \$7,494,500.

The CCOFI project consists of an 89 mile fiber optic ring that runs through every city in the County along with 33 miles of laterals which connect 55 sites including city, county and township governments, schools, fire departments, public safety towers, law enforcement agencies, community support organizations and healthcare providers. Additionally, the project provides an open network, which means it is designed to allow one or more private service providers to sell broadband services on this network to private businesses and residents.

In April, the County received bids for the four areas of work including: a) Fiber Ring Construction, b) Lateral Construction, c) Fiber Optic Cable, and d) Fiber Splicing. Staff has spent significant time analyzing the bids which included discussing and clarifying bid documents with contractors in order to provide the Board with the best recommendation. Further, staff has met with the Broadband Infrastructure Taskforce (BIT) to obtain feedback and consensus on the bid recommendations and we plan to meet periodically with the Taskforce to provide project updates.

In parallel, staff have been working with the County Attorney's office to amend the original Jaguar Communications contract to secure their construction management services, assume maintenance responsibilities of all base ring and select lateral fiber and to provide a long term lease for the fiber utilized by Jaguar in the ring through a lease contract used in the fiber industry called an Indefeasible Right to Use (IRU). These documents are in final review by both parties and includes language which will provide for ongoing County operating, maintenance and equipment replacement costs.

The project calls for 192 strands of fiber to be installed with the following utilization planned: the County piece (including schools, cities, townships etc.) would utilize 96 fiber, Jaguar will utilize the other 96; of these 96, Jaguar has an open access requirement for 24 of the 96 fiber to be provided at market rate.

Staff recommends the following budget be adopted with the expectation that construction will be completed Dec 2012, with substantial completion June 2013.

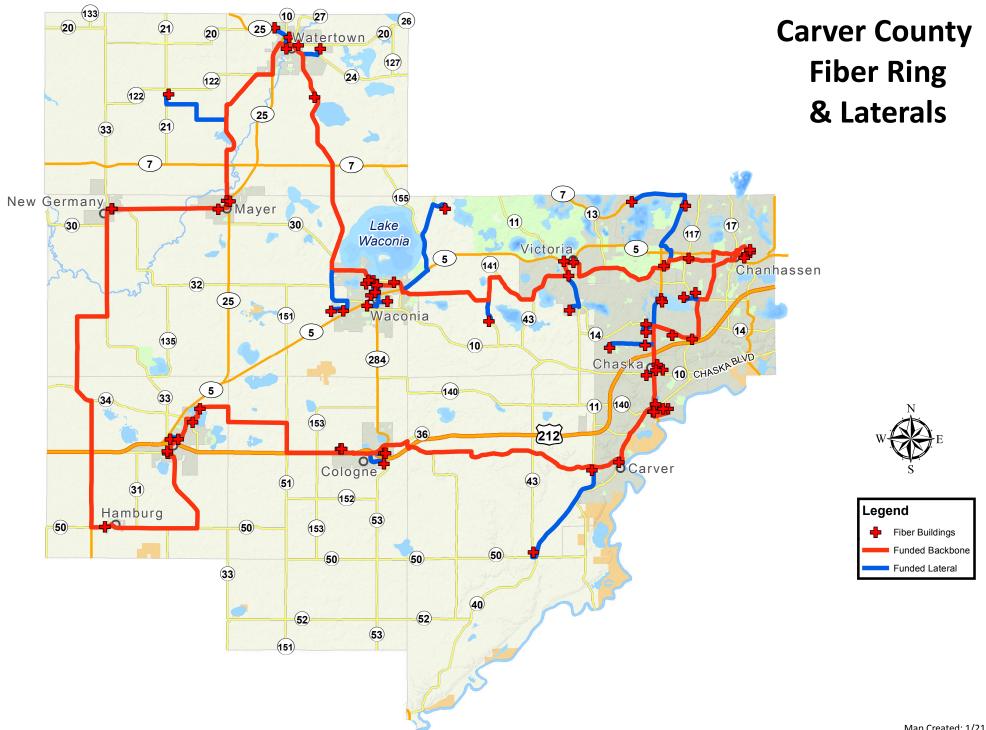

Related Financial/FTE Comments:

The County match of 20% or \$1,498,900 was part of the 2011 budget funded through reserves designated for working capital.

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CCOFI Background since Receipt of Award

In July 2010 the County was notified by the US Dept of Commerce that we were one of a number of grantees of the over \$7 billion set aside in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act for broadband infrastructure improvement projects throughout the US. Since receiving this notification Carver County Open Fiber Initiative (CCOFI) staff have been working on three primary components of the project which comprise the equivalent of what we have come to call our three legged stool. The three legs of the stool consist of the Environmental Assessment (EA), Construction Bid and Jaguar Contract for Services and Indefeasible Right to Use (IRU) lease agreement.

<u>Environmental Assessment</u> – The environmental Assessment (EA) was not originally identified by the US Dept of Commerce as a requirement for the project. After project awards were issued, this new requirement was shared. The addition of the EA requirement halted all initial shovel ready projects that had not completed this new step, which consisted of most of the projects awarded. The EA process involved a number of components, the first of which was finalizing the anchor institution locations included in the project as well as finalizing our construction route.

There were a number of agencies in which the County was required to consult with and receive project sign off, which included MN Pollution Control, MN State Historic Preservation Office, US Fish and Wildlife, MN Department of Natural Resources and the Carver County Soil and Water Conservation District, to name a few. Along with these agencies, we were also required to consult with a number of tribal governments that may have potential areas throughout the project that may have significance. Over the past 6 months CCOFI staff have worked on receiving the various approvals and determinations and sign offs from the various entities and tribes in which communication was required. Along with these efforts the actual environmental assessment document was being drafted, with an initial draft being submitted in late January for US Dept of Commerce review.

In late February the County received a response from Commerce regarding our EA, noting that it was in good order with only a few minor changes requested. Subsequently, at approximately the same time this response was received, Commerce changed the method in which they identified tribal governments that project grantees needed to contact, which then added additional tribal governments that we needed to communicate with. Since February, CCOFI staff have been following the process to meet the communication requirements of these additional tribes, which were completed at the end of May. Afterwhich, CCOFI staff proceeded to finalize the EA documentation and submitted the final EA to Commerce in late May. On June 13th CCOFI staff received the official Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) was issued for our project, which is the acceptance of our EA, thus allowing us to start construction of our project and start drawing down any needed funds.

<u>Construction Bid</u> – In January, CCOFI staff began drafting the Request for Bid (RFB) for the construction component of the project, which is budgeted at approximately 75% of the project total. In mid February the RFP was issued and over the next several weeks two vendor conferences and question and answer sessions were held along with one day of site visits to the various base ring anchor sites. Bids were due April 5th and were read in a public bid opening in the County Board Room on that date. Since this time,

CCOFI staff have been analyzing and reviewing the bids including meeting with several vendors and clarifying their documentation, operations and experience so staff are able to provide their best recommendation on appropriate vendors to the Board. The bid was drafted into four sections in which vendors could bid some combinations or all of the sections, thus allowing the County the greatest flexibility to select the most appropriate and cost effective construction vendor possible. The four sections of the bid consisted of Base Ring Construction, Lateral Construction, Fiber Optic Conduit and Cable with the final section being Splicing. In reviewing the submitted bids, staff have evaluated the vendors based on the defined qualifications in the RFB, which for construction section bidding vendors, included having the "experience in successfully managing installation of networks with similar scope, size, and complexity". Based on this requirement the low bidder for the combined Base Ring Construction and Lateral Construction, Crowley Construction, is not a qualified bidder and as such, their bid is not valid and is not recommended. Staff completed considerable review to validate and confirm that vendors met the requirements and qualifications as defined in the RFB and after review; the currently defined low bidder does not meet the experience requirement. As such, staff are recommending the second lowest bidder MPNexlevel for the Base Ring Construction and Lateral Construction. For the third section of the bid, Fiber Optic Conduit and Cable, staff recommends selecting the low bidder PowerTel. The Splicing section of the bid is not being awarded as this service is no longer needed, as it is included in the construction management duties performed by Jaguar Communications.

Jaguar Agreement and IRU – In 2008, the County issued an RFB for fiber optic ring construction to hook up all primary County facilities. At that time, the County competitively selected Jaguar Communications to work with on the project. As the economic environment of the country changed in 2009 and the inception of the ARRA and available grant funding for fiber optic projects, through the combined efforts of the County and Jaguar, the County was awarded funding for the CCOFI project. Jaguar continues to play a major role in the project acting as our first anchor service provider on the network with the fiber they are allowed to use, provided through a standard fiber lease agreement called an indefeasible right to use. Over the past months CCOFI staff have been working on the contracts to secure the services of Jaguar Communications for construction management of the project. Along with this service, Jaguar is also assuming the cost of the maintenance responsibilities for the base ring and a number of appropriate laterals. They will also assume responsibilities for the ARRA requirement associated with all ARRA funded projects of providing an open access, open interconnect network, which in simple terms, means that if a service provider has a desire to utilize this network to provide services, fiber or capacity will be made available at market rates to allow them to do so. Finally, as part of their services, Jaguar will perform splicing and testing of the fiber once it is installed.

Fiber usage in the fiber ring is comprised of three components. The first component is the County and Public use fiber, which consists of 96 strands. This fiber will be managed by the County and utilized by all the public anchor institutions. The second component is the fiber utilized by Jaguar Communications, which consists of 96 strands. This fiber will be used by Jaguar to provide services to end users and businesses as best fits their business model. The third component is the ARRA required open access, also called open interconnect fiber. We are having Jaguar Communications assume the responsibility for meeting our requirements of the open interconnect fiber as defined for all ARRA funded projects. We

have defined a count of 24 fiber to meet this requirement, which when they are needed, will be used from the 96 strands that are being provided to Jaguar through the IRU.

The ARRA funding is for onetime expenses and as with any communications infrastructure there will be ongoing recurring expense. Staff have designed the project to be self sustaining and have worked through a pro forma to review the opportunities for cost recovery to sustain the fiber optic ring for years to come, and anticipate the avoidance of any additional expenses for the County for the fiber ring.

There are many functional benefits that the CCOFI project will allow to anchor institutions including:

- Data sharing
- Shared staffing for similar types of anchor institutions performing similar functions.
- Enhanced data backups, as the County explores the possibility of providing data backup and storage and disaster recovery capabilities at the County Public Works facility in Cologne.
- Shared software licensing with entities buying as a group instead of individually
- Voice Over IP telephone and communications opportunities
- Shared purchasing of internet bandwidth for reduced costs.

There are also many community benefits that the CCOFI project will allow, including:

- Business Development Many businesses are looking to build at locations that have the
 availability of a high-speed network and internet. Economic development programs through the
 Carver County Community Development Agency, local Chambers of Commerce, and other
 similar entities, will be able to market the high-speed capabilities of the fiber ring to prospective
 business.
- Residential Development A recent study found one of the most sought-after items in new
 residential real estate was the availability of high-speed internet. With the CCOFI fiber ring
 running through each city in the county, developers will be able to take advantage of the
 opportunity for fiber build-outs in each community.
- Competitive Marketplace Having a competitive marketplace typically means consumers can
 find lower cost, higher service offerings for the products they are looking to purchase. Fiber and
 the services and speeds it offers are no different. With the fiber running through each city and
 the open network design of this project, competition should be readily available, and that will
 lower costs.
- **Telecommuting** Many small cities throughout the U.S. have fought to keep their young talent in their communities. With the majority of high-paying jobs being created in larger city centers, many young people choose to go where the money is. With fiber in place, telecommuting opportunities are available, and smaller communities will be able to keep people in their towns.
- Healthcare Enhancements The CCOFI ring will enable healthcare providers, clinics, and the
 county's regional medical center to utilize the latest in technology. They will be able to pass
 electronic medical records and share needed data with other medical institutions to improve
 patient care. High-speed capabilities will be possible for them to take advantage of advanced
 medical technology such as remote doctor visits and telesurgery.
- Educational Opportunities In addition to connecting all of the school districts that serve Carver County students, the CCOFI ring will provide connection opportunities with higher education facilities, including the University of Minnesota, Crown College, and Dunwoody Institute. It will open up opportunities for remote education and the use of remote classrooms.
