REGULAR SESSION September 6, 2011

A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on September 6, 2011. Chair Randy Maluchnik convened the session at 9:15 a.m.

Members present: Randy Maluchnik, Chair, Tim Lynch, Vice Chair, Gayle Degler, James Ische and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to approve the minutes of the August 23, 2011, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Community announcements were made by the Board.

Ische moved, Degler seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Contract with Michel Masonry Construction in the amount of \$88,000 and related Facilities budget amendment.

Resolution #48-11, Support of Maintaining Current Levels of Federal Funding for Highways and Transit.

Approved Public Health Preparedness and Cities Readiness Initiative grant award from the Minnesota Department of Health, as the Community Health Board, and related budget amendment.

Awarded contract to Bituminous Roadways, Inc., in the amount of \$767,555.55 for County Overlay Project CP 11 MR and, after review and approval by the County Attorney's Office and Risk Management, approve the contract with Bituminous Roadways.

Approved request for renewal of on-sale and Sunday liquor license for Island View Golf Club, Inc.

Authorized Public Health Emergency Preparedness Planner to attend the Center for Disease Control and Prevention Public Health Emergency Preparedness Evaluation meeting October 25-26, 2011, in Atlanta, GA.

Motion carried unanimously.

Marcee Shaughnessy, Public Health and Environment, requested the Board adopt a Proclamation that recognizes the five City Level Senior Commissions sponsoring the CarFit events.

Katy Boone, Public Health Planner, introduced the representatives of the Senior Commissions in attendance. She explained the CarFit program and pointed out the dates for future events.

Commissioner Degler read the Proclamation that recognized the contributions of the five City Senior Commissions

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to adopt the Proclamation in recognition of the Five City Level Senior/Aging Commissions Sponsoring CarFit events. Motion carried unanimously.

Chair Maluchnik requested the Board adopt a Resolution encouraging residents to participate in a Moment of Remembrance on September 11<sup>th</sup> and read the proposed Resolution into the record.

Ische offered the following Resolution, seconded by Lynch:

Resolution #49-11
Carver County Joining the National Moment of Remembrance of the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of September 11<sup>th</sup>.

On vote taken, all voted aye.

Melissa Brechon, Library Director, requested the Board approve a contract to completely redesign the Library's website. She explained they had been looking at existing websites for a number of months and have determined they needed to update the Library's website. Brechon highlighted the standards that needed to be met. She indicated funding for the project would be provided through the use of MELSA technology funds and confirmed the Library Board had recommended the project.

Degler moved, Ische seconded, to approve contract with Jack Frost Design to completely redesign the Library website for a not to exceed cost of \$47,938.00. Motion carried unanimously.

Dave Hemze, County Administrator, requested the Board set the 2012 preliminary County property tax levy. He noted this needed to be set by September 15<sup>th</sup> and cannot increase. Hemze recognized the Board's previous direction to come up with a levy that reduced taxes on an average valued home. He explained the State's Homestead Market Value Credit that was eliminated by the State.

Dave Frischmon, Finance, highlighted the services provided by the County and what citizens receive for the County dollars paid. He pointed out the County tax impact on an average value home over the last several years and stated they have reduced taxes while at the same time market values have been decreasing.

Frischmon summarized the 2012 budget strategy that included a wage freeze and 2.9% targeted budget reduction by Division. He explained the new recommendation to lower the levy by one million to make up for the elimination of the State market value credit and shifting one million in County program aid from one time capital improvement projects to the operations budget. Frischmon

stated 2012 capital outlay primarily related to road and bridge projects and not funded by tax levy. He identified proposed capital projects and funding sources.

The Board discussed the impact of the State eliminating the market value credit on County property taxes and decision to absorb this and not pass it on to taxpayers. Hemze stated they were still trying to unravel the impact of this and will be working with the Taxpayer Services Division on the impact to an average valued home and business.

Ische moved, Lynch seconded, to approve a 2012 preliminary tax levy of \$45,179,720 (net of \$1,455,284 State CPA) and setting the 2012 budget public hearing for Thursday, December 1, 2011, at 6:00 p.m. Degler, Ische, Lynch, Maluchnik voted aye. Workman voted nay. Motion carried.

Julie Frick, Community Development Agency, requested the Board adopt a Resolution approving the CDA's 2012 proposed budget and payable 2012 tax levy. She stated they did a significant amount of work on their budget and made program cuts.

Degler offered the following Resolution, seconded by Ische:

# Resolution #50-11

Approving the 2012 Proposed Budget and Payable 2012 Tax Levy of the Carver County Community Development Agency and Certifying said Levy to the County Auditor

On vote taken, Degler, Ische, Lynch, Maluchnik voted aye. Workman voted nay.

Paul Moline, Public Health and Environment, requested the Board set the 2012 preliminary water level and noted the levy was the same as 2011. He pointed out there was now only one CCWMO taxing district and that change was approved through the adoption of the water management plan.

Ische moved, Lynch seconded, to set the preliminary 2012 Carver County WMO levy at \$524,984. Motion carried unanimously.

Lynch moved, Degler seconded, to recess as the County Board and convene as the Carver County Regional Rail Authority. Motion carried unanimously.

Dave Frischmon, Finance, requested the Rail Authority set the 2012 preliminary levy and noted the amount requested has remained unchanged since 2008.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to set the CCRRA's 2012 preliminary tax levy at \$120,000.00. Motion carried unanimously.

Degler moved, Lynch seconded, to adjourn as the Carver County Regional Rail Authority and reconvene as the County Board. Motion carried unanimously.

Kathy Paulson, Employee Relations, updated the Board on the Telework pilot program. She noted the pilot program ran from March through May. She explained they collaborated with eWorkPlace to plan and implement the program.

Paulson stated 24 employees participated and summarized the results of the program. She explained the recommendation to completely implement the use of virtual desktop images before expanding the program due to the demands on IT.

Workman moved, Degler seconded, to adjourn the Regular Session at 10:45 a.m. Motion carried unanimously.

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

This is a request for Board Action to approve the purchase of a new and upgraded IBM iSeries server to replace two near end-of-life servers currently in both County's data centers. The 3-year cost of the new server hardware, operating system, licensing and migration services is for Carver and Scott County is \$195,649.60 for an approximate savings of \$16,829 over a 3 year period. The cost savings is achieved by investing in current technology thereby reducing our ongoing maintenance costs. While from a direct savings standpoint, the joint payback for this project is not significant: however, as illustrated below, there are a host of other benefits that both Counties will benefit from.

The iSeries is used to host various software solutions for divisions that include; Assessor CAMA, Finance Payroll, Public Health PHDOC, Recorders Land Records, and, a few other small miscellaneous software applications.

The replacement and upgrade of the iSeries is part of a collaboration project with Scott County, that leverages the direct fiber connection between each County's data center. Scott County is planning on purchasing a matching iSeries platform.

Collectively, the two counties are consolidating four iSeries boxes down to two. The two new machines, will be shared: one in our data center and one in Scott County data center. We will collaborate to provide each other with disaster recovery services, while retaining our respective in-house production platforms.

Ongoing maintenance of the iSeries equipment will be outsourced. Carver County already is outsourcing part of our iSeries maintenance function and plans to add some additional services. The cost of this service will be shared between Scott and Carver County.

# Benefits and Key Value Points for iSeries Collaboration

# **Both Counties:**

- > Consolidated, standardized iSeries platform running matching operating systems and software.
- > Identical replicating software used by both counties for Disaster Recovery (DR) operations.
- > Single vendor for ongoing maintenance and applications support.
- > Frees up in-house resources at both Counties for other network support activities.
- > Leverages the direct fiber connection for DR operations provided by each County.
- > Increase collaboration in technical service delivery and support across both Counties.

# Scott County:

- > Cost reduction in licensing and a lower cost provider for outsourced support services
- > Current and timely security patching and fixes to software, operating systems

> Reduced footprint of hardware at the Jordan DR site, lowering cost for HVAC & power

# **Carver County**

> Back-up routines for Carver to be performed by Scott County

# Cost and Savings;

- Requests for Quotes (RFQ) were received from two separate vendors offering State Contract pricing.
- Carver County purchase cost is \$63.454.80 resulting in three year direct savings of \$1,443.
- Scott County purchase cost is \$147,580.80 resulting in three year direct savings of \$69,761.07. Savings for Scott County is greater because Scott County equipment is several revisions older than Carver County. New equipment and maintenance contract significantly lowers maintenance costs at Scott County.

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Minn. Stat 471.6161 requires a public employer to request proposals for health and dental insurance at least once every five years. The County was required to request proposals for the 2012 plan year since 2006 was the last year we completed the process. Dan Proulx of Envision Benefit Consultants conducted the RFP process for the County. The County received fully-insured proposals for health insurance from Blue Cross Blue Shield, Health Partners, Medica, and Preferred One, all of which were better than our 2011 rates. A summary of their proposals is attached. Mayo Clinic Health Solutions also submitted a self-insured proposal.

Mr. Proulx, our health insurance broker, has agreed to reduce his commission, which is included in the health insurance premium, from the customary 2% (estimated at \$112,500 for 2012) to \$90,000. He will provide the Mayo Wellness program, Embody Health, through Wellvation at no cost to the County (a value of approximately \$45,000 and 2011 cost of approximately \$32,500). It is recommended that Employee Relations prepare a personal services contract with him for 2012 outlining the services he provides and the above terms.

Analysis of the proposals included a number of factors: plan matches to specifications, history with the carriers, premium costs, rate cap guarantees, additional benefits, and degree of disruption in an area where there has been a great deal of change over the past several years. Based on the analysis, the Insurance Labor Management Committee (LMC) recommends staying with Health Partners for health coverage for 2012. Their proposal matches specifications perfectly, reduces 2012 premiums by 7%, offers five years of rate cap guarantees, provides \$30,000 biannually for biometric screenings and provides no disruption for employees and their families in receiving care. Health Partners has provided the County with health insurance and good service over the past five years.

The County has collective bargaining agreements through 2011 which include monthly cafeteria contributions of \$1,150 for employees selecting family health insurance, \$650 for employees selecting single health insurance and \$150 for those who are eligible, but choose to waive coverage. Based on the attractive 2012 rates, the LMC also recommends Employee Relations seeking Memoranda of Agreement with each of the bargaining units to avoid the potential of employees who do not need the County-sponsored insurance selecting Single Plan D rather than waiving coverage and saving the County's cost by increasing the Waiver amount to \$195.00, which exceeds the difference between the Single cafeteria contribution and the cost of Single Plan D by approximately 10%.

The LMC further recommends continuing to escalate the premium cost for Plan A (\* as indicated below) to encourage further movement to the plans that engage employees more actively in assessing their needs for care and modifying their lifestyles where it may improve their health.

2012 Health Partners Monthly Health Insurance Rates, modified as recommended by the LMC: Health Plan A\*:

Single - \$900.00 (employee pays \$250.00),

Family - \$2,350.00 (employee pays \$1,200.00)

# Health Plan B:

Single - \$526.27 (employee pays \$0.00, has \$123.73 for other benefits, and receives \$750 annual HRA contribution),

Family - \$1,594.90 (employee pays \$444.90 and receives \$1,500 annual HRA contribution)

# Health Plan C:

Single - \$554.00 (employee pays \$0.00 and has \$96.00 for other benefits)

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Minn. Stat 471.6161 requires a public employer to request proposals for health and dental insurance at least once every five years. The County was required to request proposals for the 2012 plan year since 2006 was the last year we completed the process. Dan Proulx of Envision Benefit Consultants conducted the RFP process for the County. For dental insurance, the County received proposals from Health Partners, Delta Dental, Sun Life, United Health Care, and Reliance Standard. The proposals all included major rate increases over our 2011 rates, as outlined on the attached document. The proposal from Health Partners is the most economical, but reflects a 30% increase over the 2011 rates (which were in place since 2009) for the County-covered portion of the cost. The Insurance Labor Management Committee (LMC) recommends staying with Health Partners for dental coverage for 2012. Their rates were the best among the proposals received for dental insurance.

# 2012 Health Partners Monthly Dental Insurance Rates:

Single Preventive Care, covered by the County: \$18.06 he total cost and employee share of each option is listed below:

Single Buy-up Coverage: \$49.84 with employee cost \$31.78; Family Preventive Care: \$55.86 with employee cost \$37.80; and Family Buy-up Coverage, \$153.65 with employee cost \$135.59.

And, in hopes of seeing better rates in the future, the LMC recommends altering the Dental Buy-up coverage to be a biannual election, and include a one-year waiting period for major restorations (e.g. crowns). This will not negatively impact those who currently have buy-up coverage, but will have affect those who have not had buy-up in 2011.

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Carver County Personnel Policy and some collective bargaining agreements require the County to contribute to County-sponsored health insurance for certain retirees. Personnel Policy further requires the Board to set the amount the County will contribute to each retiree's insurance for the coming year. In order to qualify for this benefit, retirees must have:

- been employed prior to June 1, 2010,
- had at least 20 consecutive years of benefit-eligible service prior to retirement,
- attained age 60, but not yet be Medicare-eligible,
- maintained County-sponsored insurance since retirement, and
- refrain from full-time employment.

The current monthly cafeteria contributions are \$1,150 for employees selecting family health insurance and \$650 for employees selecting single health insurance. In 2010, the County Board set the contribution for these retirees at an amount consistent with the cafeteria contributions: retirees selecting family insurance receive \$1,150 per month toward their insurance and those selecting single insurance receive the cost of the single premium, not to exceed \$650 per month. Employee Relations is recommending the same contributions for 2012. The qualified retirees for 2012 include two with family insurance and 13 with single insurance, for a maximum County cost of \$129,000.

Historically, Carver County has not charged an administrative fee for processing insurance continuations through COBRA or other programs. Employee Relations is recommending initiating the two-percent administrative fee, as authorized by COBRA, for prior employees and families who continue coverage through the County. The total revenue from this fee would be approximately \$1,600.00.

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

Flooding from snow melt and rainfall often closes the Trunk Highway ("TH") 101, TH 41 and County State Aid Highway ("CSAH") 11 Minnesota River crossings, which has a detrimental effect on traffic in the region.

Closures of these roadways affects approximately 40,000 vehicle trips every day, and detouring these vehicles puts a massive burden on the area's economy by increasing congestion on TH 169 and TH 494 and other highways and significantly extending the commute for many travelers. Having these roads impassable is also a severe strain on emergency response access between Scott and Carver Counties.

The Minnesota of Transportation (MnDOT) has prepared a Minnesota River Flood Mitigation Study ("Study") which modeled the effect of the 10-yr, 50-yr, 100-yr, and 500-yr flood events at the TH 101 and TH 41 river crossings, modeled the impact to traffic with current volumes and expected 2030 volumes, prepared alternatives to construct new bridges at TH 101 and TH 41 to keep the highways open during the 10-yr and 50-yr flood events, and calculated the Benefit to Cost ("B/C") ratio of constructing these bridges as well as capacity improvements on the TH 169 river crossing.

This Study is independent of the Tiered Environmental Impact Statement to select a new TH 41 alignment and river crossing and preserve the corridor for future construction, which is ongoing and will be completed.

The Study estimates the costs of closing TH 101 and TH 41 due to flooding is \$670,000 per day for existing traffic and \$1,675,000 for 2030 traffic.

The Study shows the B/C ratio to construct the TH 101 bridge is 3.81 with a construction cost of approximately \$22,300,000 and the B/C to construct the TH 41 bridge is 3.06 with a cost of approximately \$13,800,000. With a B/C greater than 1.0 the new bridges will provide great benefit to the travelling public and investing in the improvements is clearly warranted. The proposed bridges will not provide 100 percent flood relief but will protect travelers from the majority of flood events at a reasonable cost.

The study, design, and programming of flood mitigation projects for TH 101 and TH 41 was a 2011 Legislative Priority for Carver County, as was bonding for highway improvement projects and in particular state trunk highway turnback projects. TH 101 is planned to be turned back to Carver County which would include a portion of the river crossing.

The Study was funded by MnDOT and involved Scott, Carver, and Hennepin County, the Cities of Shakopee, Chaska, Chanhassen and Bloomington, the townships of Louisville and Jackson, and the Metropolitan Council. A public open house was held on May 24 at the Chaska Community Center.

MnDOT has set aside \$50,000,000 for trunk highway flood mitigation projects in the state, of which a portion has already been allocated. MnDOT will be soliciting statewide for flood mitigation projects in the Fall of 2011 to utilize the remaining

funding. MnDOT Metro District intends to submit either the TH 101 or TH 41 bridge project for funding consideration.

The Study will be finalized by the end of September at which point senior staff at the MnDOT Metro will decide which river crossing project to submit for funding consideration. The Study does not recommend a particular crossing but the local government entities have been asked to submit a preference if they choose to do so.

Both bridges need to be built but It is recommended that Carver County request funding for TH 101 first for the following reasons:

- 1. It is a future county road.
- 2. The 101 bridge floods more often now as it is lower than TH 41.
- 3. The existing and projected traffic volumes on TH 101 are higher than TH 41.
- 4. The proposed TH 101 bridge can be built to protect against more flooding events than TH 41. The proposed bridge would have remained open for all previous floods of record except the 1965 flood. The proposed TH 41 bridge is constrained by the existing new structure in Chaska. It would have been closed in 1965, 1969, 1993, and 2001. It would protect all other events including the 2010 and 11 floods.

# Other items to note:

- 1. Both bridges are proposed to be 2-lanes with trail.
- 2. TH 101 will require a 12-month total closure.
- 3. TH 41 can be built under traffic but will take 18 months.
- 4. The resource agencies (DNR and US Fish and Wildlife) are in support of the projects.

# BACKGROUND/JUSTIFICATION:

On May 3rd, 2011 the County Board signed the Donation and Purchase and Sale Agreement with Union Pacific Railroad for the Chaska Industrial Lead. This is a 5 mile stretch of railroad corridor extending from United Sugars in Chaska, across the Minnesota River at Carver and south into Scott County. Union Pacific Railroad executed the agreement on August 9th, 2011.

Union Pacific conducted a site inspection and testing report on ballast material in the railroad corridor. The report identified the railroad corridor has having contaminants of lead and arsenic in the ballast material.

Union Pacific has requested and prepared an amendment to the Donation and Purchase Agreement. The amendment places a restrictive covenant on the property. This condition limits the uses of the railroad corridor such that the corridor could not be used for schools, residential housing, and institutional care or daycare facilities.

The requested amendment is acceptable. The Carver County Regional Railroad Authority intends to preserve the railroad corridor for transportation purposes, as well as utilize the corridor for regional trail, utility lines, preservation of levee and road right of way.
