Aquatic Invasive Species

Aquatic organisms that <u>INVADE</u> ecosystems beyond their natural, historic range.

Not all non-native species are invasive to a particular ecoregion.

Different role than <u>NATIVE</u> species which are established over long periods of time.

Why so Invasive?

ADAPTABLE, COMPETITIVE, ECOLOGICALLY DISRUPTIVE

- Fast growth
- Rapid Reproduction
- High dispersal
- · Lack of predators
- Ability to adapt to environmental changes Generalists
- Displace native species by utilizing limited resources more









Impacts

Biodiversity

- Second major contributor to biodiversity loss
- Reduce plant, fish, and animal populations
- Degrade ecosystems

Economic

- Reduce property values
- Damage boats & equipment

Human Health

- Toxin production
- Parasites







Local Impact

- Decline in native mussel & snail populations
- Displacement of native vegetation
- Impact on fish populations
- Reduction in zooplankton diversity
- Decline in native frog species
- Alteration of wetland ecosystems

ALL LEAD TO BIODIVERSITY LOSS & ECOLOGICAL IMBALANCE

AIS Program History - Watercraft Inspections



2011 - 2013

MN DNR extends Watercraft Inspection Authority to LGUs. Start of AIS Program in Carver County - Parks Department

Inspections at Waconia, Mwashta, Bavaria, Eagle, Hydes, Reitz



2015

City of Chanhassen (and partners) request inspections at 3 lakes.

Inspections at Waconia, Mwashta, Bavaria, Eagle, Rietz, Parley, Wasserman, Piersons, MN River, Lotus, Susan, Ann

Start of AIS Decontamination



2017 - 2019

Various changes to watercraft inspection program due to shifts in funding and priorities. Adoption of 5 year AIS Plan.

MCWD begins to slowly decrease inspection funding

Respond with Roving inspection at Piersons, Wasserman, Parley

Dropped MN River, Eagle, Hydes, Reitz

Dropped Parley & Wasserman in 2019

Start of AIS State Prevention Aid – State funds distributed to Counties.

Inspections at Waconia, Mwashta, Bavaria, Eagle Hydes, Reitz, Parley, Wasserman

County hires FT AIS Coordinator. Program develops to include more AIS prevention and management strategies.

Inspections at same lakes as 2015

Significant reduction of Watercraft Inspection hours due to pandemic challenges & hiring shortage.



Prevention Changes

WATERCRAFT INSPECTIONS

- Fewer inspection hours due to staffing challenges last 3 years
- Reduced dedicated inspections on Lake Bavaria
- Revisiting Roving Inspections
- Fewer lakes with dedicated inspection service but more coverage county-wide

Preliminary Watercraft Inspection Hours

WMO LAKES

• Waconia: 1,500

Bavaria: 280 + Roving

Roving Inspections: 600 hours distributed among County lakes with public boat access

MCWD LAKES

Minnewashta: 1,500

Piersons: 450 + Roving

RPBCWD LAKES

• Lotus: 1,500

• Ann: 280 + Roving

• Susan: 280 + Roving

* Subject to partner budget approvals

*Potentially additional hours on Ann due to 2023 zebra mussel listing if partners agree

Education & Outreach Changes

RE-ALLOCATED FUNDS

- Stakeholders emphasized need for Education as watercraft inspection funds are re-allocated
- Staff will work with Stakeholders and Advisory Committee to brainstorm options for the use of funds
- Hope is to Pilot something 2024

Education & Outreach Changes

RE-ALLOCATED FUNDS

- Options
 - Incorporate more education into Watercraft Inspections
 - Other AIS Priorities?
 - Pet/aquarium trade
 - Docks and lifts
 - Bait shops
 - Pop-up AIS Booth for festivals and community events
 - Other

Management Changes

IN-HOUSE MANAGEMENT

- Staff with non-commercial Pesticide License
- Ability to control some AIS
 populations in-house vs. Contractor
- Starting with Phragmites and Purple
 Loosestrife

RE-ALLOCAETD FUNDS FOR VEGETATION MGMT

- ~ \$20,000
- Stakeholders emphasized veg mgmt as a priority for funds shifting from Watercraft Inspections
- Staff will determine best use for funds in 2024
 - May have different priorities in years to follow.
 - Staff will continue to include Stakeholders and Advisory Committee in development

Management Changes

RE-ALLOCATED FUNDS FOR

VEGETATION

- Options
 - Grant match for larger vegetation control project(s)
 - Pass-through or Cost Share grants to non-profits (lake associations, homeowner associations, etc.)
 - Phragmites & Purple Loosestrife control
 - Public access boat launch clean-up (weeds on and around boat launch area, dock, beach, etc.)
 - Other Ideas?

- Recommendation includes the following changes:
 - Revisiting Roving Inspections
 - Slight reduction of dedicated inspection hours
 - Use of re-allocated Education & Outreach dollars
 - Use of re-allocated dollars for Vegetation Mgmt
 - Staff to perform in-house mgmt. of Purple Loosestrife,
 Phragmites, and/or other introduced species
