

# **CARVER COUNTY ADULT PROTECTION PRIORITIZATION GUIDELINES**

### ADULT PROTECTION ETHICS AND GUIDING VALUES

- Actions taken by Adult Protective Services balance the duty to protect the safety and honor selfdetermination rights for a person who is vulnerable.
- Respect cultural values and treat people with care, honesty, equity, and respect while promoting safety, independence, and quality of life.
- > Carver County utilizes a team approach in reviewing all MAARC reports.

### MINNESOTA ADULT ABUSE REPORTING CENTER (MAARC)

Adult protection reports are made through the Minnesota Adult Abuse Reporting Center (MAARC). To make an Adult Abuse report, call the toll-free number, **1-844-880-1574**. MAARC serves as the central entry point for all adult abuse reports in the state.

### **ADULT PROTECTION POLICY**

As outlined in the Vulnerable Adult Act, adults who are vulnerable are defined as:

- **Categorical:** An adult who is a resident or inpatient of a facility, or who receives home and community-based services licensed by the MDH or DHS, or who receives personal care assistance (PCA) / community first services and supports (CFSS) from a person or organization that exclusively offers, provides, or arranges for PCA/ CFSS services under the medical assistance program (MN Statute 626.5572, Subd. 21[a] [1–3]).
- **Functional:** An adult who has impaired ability (mental, physical, or emotional) to provide adequately for his/her own necessary food, shelter, health care or supervision without assistance AND because of this condition has an impaired ability to protect themself from maltreatment (MN Statute 626.5572, Subd. 21[a][4]).

Maltreatment allegations may be in one or more of the following areas:

- 1) Physical, emotional, or sexual abuse
- 2) Caregiver and/or self-neglect
- 3) Financial exploitation

To support statewide consistency, a standardized tool is utilized and required to determine which adults are accepted for Adult Protective Services.

## CARVER COUNTY SPECIFIC AGENCY PRIORITIZATION GUIDELINES:

Reports may result in no Adult Protection assessment based on the agency specific prioritization reasons below. Examples include but are not limited to:

- Self-neglect can be resolved, and the adult's health and safety addressed through case management.
- Abuse, neglect, or financial exploitation has stopped; risk of maltreatment reoccurrence is reduced, and the adult's needs, health, and safety are met independently or through services or supports.
- > Adult is deceased at time of report.
- Adult is no longer in Minnesota.
- Adult is incarcerated.
- > APS is unable to engage in assessment or service intervention at time of report.
- > Alleged maltreatment will not be addressed by APS based on informed choice.
- > APS lacks resources for assessment and other reports have a higher level of need/priority.
- > APS receives duplicate report referencing the same alleged maltreatment and vulnerable adult.
- Existing agency prioritization guideline that does not match any above rationale and based on individualized reports received.
