A Regular Session of the Carver County Board of Commissioners was held in the County Government Center, Chaska, on February 2, 2016. Chair James Ische convened the session at 10:05 a.m.

Members present: James Ische, Chair, Gayle Degler, Vice Chair, Tim Lynch, Randy Maluchnik and Tom Workman.

Members absent: None.

Degler moved, Workman seconded, to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

Maluchnik moved, Lynch seconded, to approve the minutes of the January 19, 2016, Regular Session. Motion carried unanimously.

Community announcements were made by the Board.

Degler moved, Workman seconded, to approve the following consent agenda items:

Approved the annual Carver and Scott Crisis grant award in the amount of \$971,405.

Approved the reduction of contract retainage to 1.5% of the completed work for the CSAH 10 reconstruction project (SP 010-610-046) to Mathiowetz Construction Company.

Approved CY 2016 Adult Mental Health Grant in the amount of \$481,855.

Approved issuing a premises permit to the Delano Youth Hockey Association for pull-tabs and tipboards for one year.

Contract with Great River Energy, in the amount of \$40,956, pending finalization of the contract review process.

Extended and allocated \$50,000 of CCWMO project funds for the City of Mayer Wetland Restoration Project to the end of 2016.

Approved the amendment to CCWMO Water Management Plan.

Accepted the Board of Water and Soil Resources 2016 Natural Resource Block Grant in the amount of \$106,239 pending the contract review process and related Public Services budget amendment.

Adopted the Carver County Groundwater Plan, 2016-2025.

Adopted the Findings of Fact and to issue Order #PZ20150060 for the issuance of the Conditional Use Permit, Ron Hilk/Lake Waconia Solar, LLC, Waconia Township.

Approved out of state travel for Nate Kabat.

Reviewed January 26, 2016, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$585,333.32 and reviewed February 2, 2016, Community Social Services' actions/Commissioners' warrants in the amount of \$212,994.28.

Motion carried unanimously.

Rod Franks, Health and Human Services, requested the Board approve FTE changes and additions. He explained this was due to a number of factors in Health & Human Services that related to the Olmstead Plan, Child Protection Legislative recommendations and increased Crisis Team staffing needs and reporting requirements.

He clarified no County levy dollars would be required to make these changes, pointing out increased grant revenue, increased revenue sources and increased federal financial participation.

Workman moved, Lynch seconded, to approve FTE changes and additions as outlined in the executive summaries and related Health & Human Services budget amendment. Motion carried unanimously.

Lynch moved, Maluchnik seconded, to go into closed session as provided by Minnesota Statute to discuss the County Administrator's 2015 performance. Motion carried unanimously.

The Board adjourned the closed and Regular Session at 10:50 a.m.

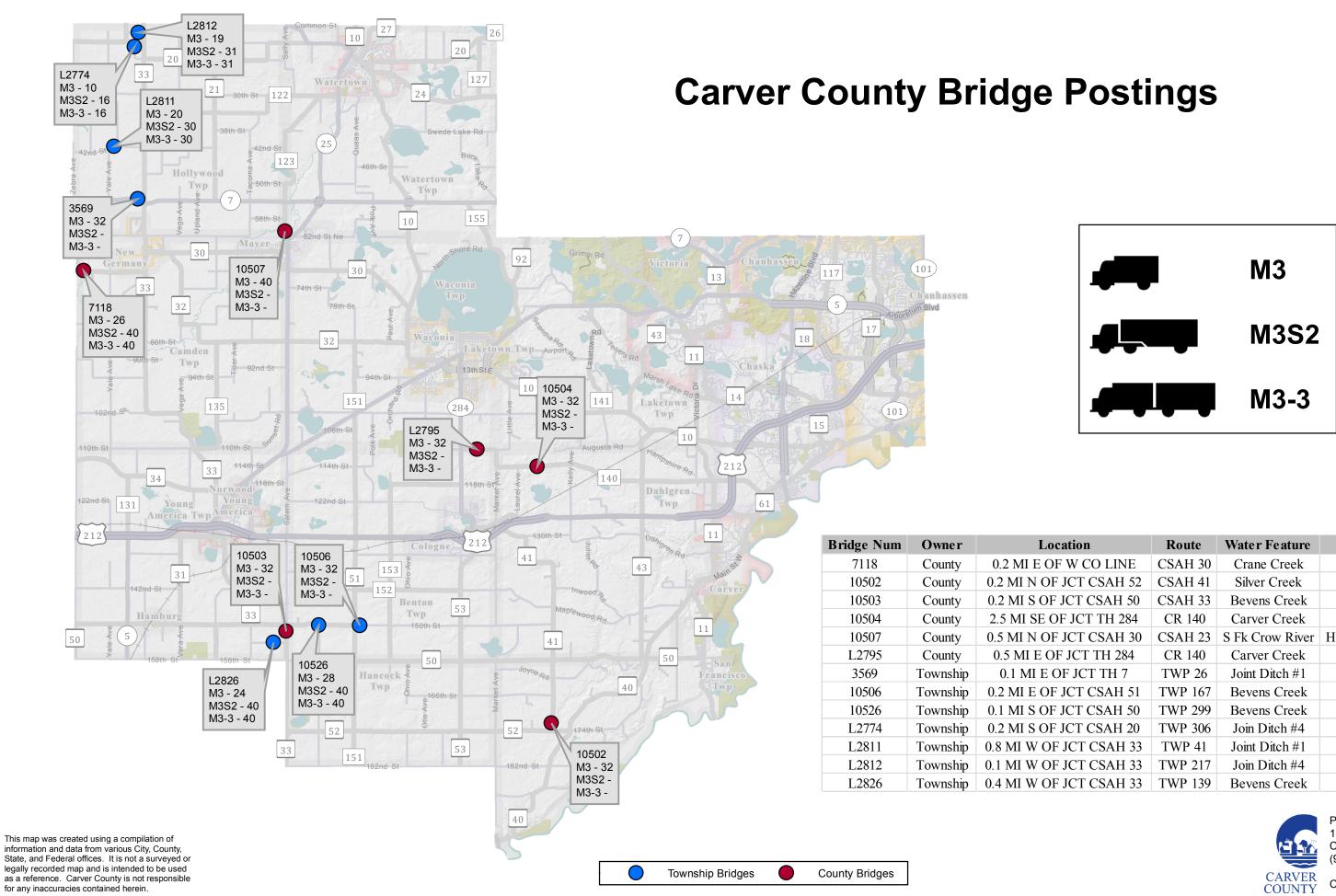

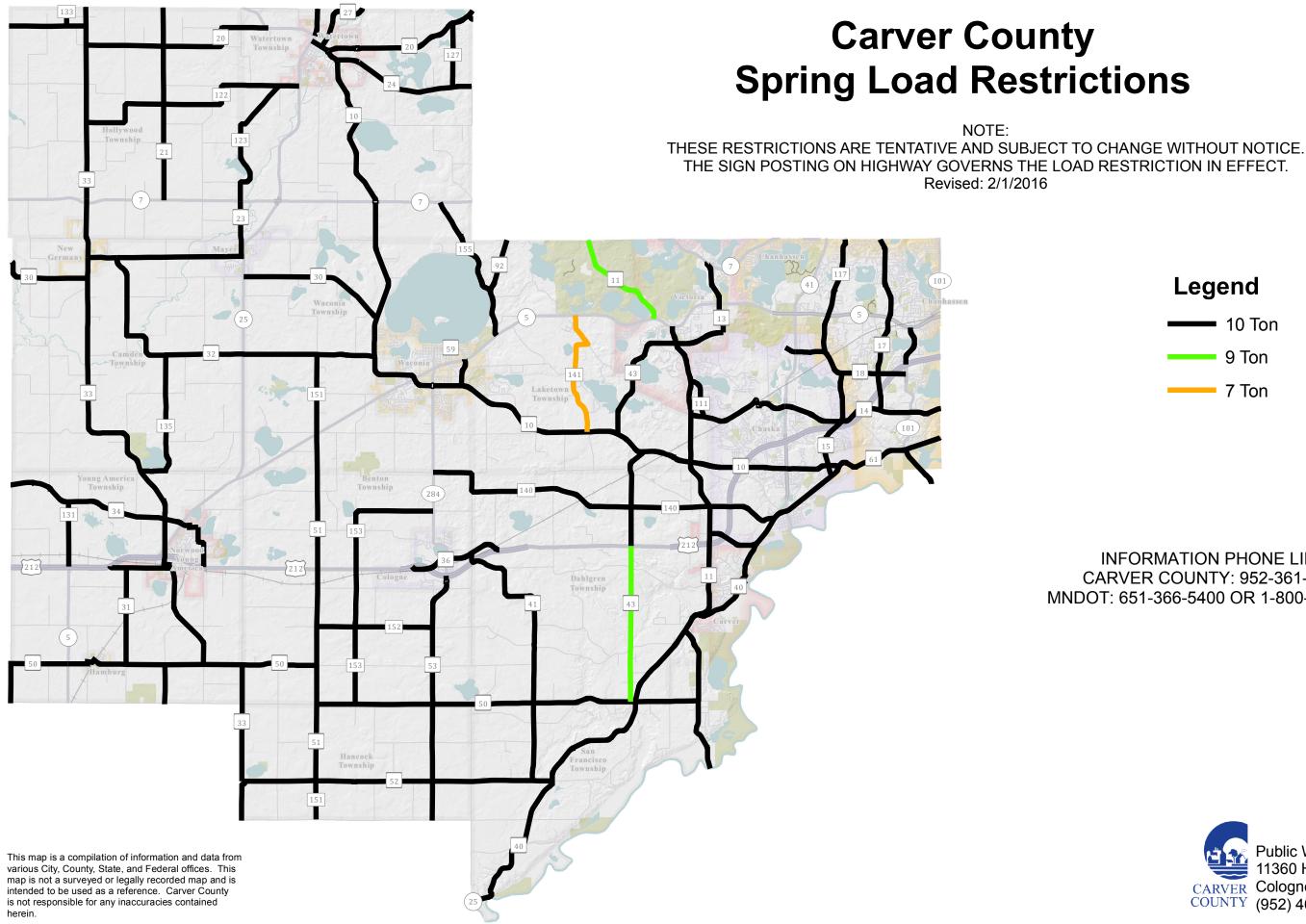

Supporting Principles for Reform of the Metropolitan Council

WHEREAS, regional planning and local government cooperation is vital to the continued success of the Minneapolis-St. Paul Metropolitan Area; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council is, by statute, the regional planning agency for the Minneapolis-St. Paul Metropolitan Area, with broad authority, including the ability to levy taxes, charge fees and set regional policy; and

WHEREAS, cities and counties are the entities most directly affected by policies and financial decisions of the Metropolitan Council, making them the primary constituents of the Metropolitan Council; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council's scope of authority and involvement in regional issues has expanded significantly over the years; and

WHEREAS, a governmental entity, particularly one with taxing authority, to be effective, must be credible, and responsive and accountable to those it represents; and

WHEREAS, the appointment of Metropolitan Council members resides solely with the Governor, effectively making the Governor the primary constituent of the Metropolitan Council; and

WHEREAS, many cities and counties believe that the Metropolitan Council lacks accountability and responsiveness to them as direct constituents; and

WHEREAS, many cities and counties believe that the authority to impose taxes and set regional policy should be the responsibility of local government elected officials; and

WHEREAS, reform is necessary to ensure that the Metropolitan Council is an effective, responsive, and accountable partner for regional development and progress.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Metropolitan Council, due to its taxing and policy authority, should be accountable to a regional constituency of those impacted by its decisions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Metropolitan Council should not operate as a state agency answerable to only one person, the Governor, as it does in its current form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Carver County Board of Commissioners supports reform of the Metropolitan Council that adheres to the following principles:

I. A majority of the members of the Metropolitan Council shall be elected officials, appointed from cities and counties within the region;

- II. Metropolitan cities shall directly control the appointment process for city representatives to the Metropolitan Council;
- III. Metropolitan counties shall directly appoint their own representatives to the Metropolitan Council;
- IV. The terms of office for any Metropolitan Council members appointed by the Governor shall be staggered and not coterminous with the Governor;
- V. Membership on the Metropolitan Council shall include representation from every metropolitan county government;
- VI. The Metropolitan Council shall represent the entire region, therefore voting shall be structured based on population and incorporate a system of checks and balances.

Metropolitan Governance Reform

Twin Cities' Local Government Coalition

-Statement of Objectives-

A coalition of local governments throughout the metropolitan area has joined together to develop a position statement and a set of principles for improving metropolitan governance in the Twin Cities.

The Coalition supports the need for regional planning, collaboration and coordination, but seeks to expand local government representation on the Metropolitan Council.

The Coalition's objectives for its collective effort to improved governance are:

- 1. To articulate a vision of responsive and effective metropolitan governance—as represented by a Statement of Belief and Principles for Reform of the Metropolitan Council
- 2. To align local government interests behind a reform effort—through formation of a broad coalition of metropolitan Cities and Counties —and a common position.
- 3. To be prepared for any efforts—legislative and otherwise—to reform the governance structure and functioning of the Metropolitan Council.

Attached is the Coalition's Statement of Belief and Principles for Reform.

Twin Cities' Local Government Coalition Principles for Metropolitan Council Reform

The following principles were developed by a coalition of cities and counties in the metropolitan area, a coalition created to advocate for reform of the Metropolitan Council. The group believes that an effective Metropolitan Council should reflect the following principles, which were developed based on the group's core Statement of Belief (printed below).

STATEMENT OF BELIEF:

The Metropolitan Council, due to its taxing and policy authority, should be accountable to a regional constituency of those impacted by its decisions. It should not operate as a state agency—as it does in its current form—answerable to only one person, the Governor.

Principles for Metropolitan Council Reform:

- I. A majority of the members of the Metropolitan Council shall be elected officials, appointed from cities and counties within the region.
- II. Metropolitan cities shall directly control the appointment process for city representatives to the Metropolitan Council.
- III. Metropolitan counties shall directly appoint their own representatives to the Metropolitan Council.
- IV. The terms of office for any Metropolitan Council members appointed by the Governor shall be staggered and not coterminous with the Governor.
- V. Membership on the Metropolitan Council shall include representation from every metropolitan county government.
- VI. The Metropolitan Council shall represent the entire region, therefore voting shall be structured based on population and incorporate a system of checks and balances.

Background and Justification of Position

The Metropolitan Council was created to provide for the orderly and economic development of the Twin Cities metropolitan area. It has the responsibility and authority to guide the region's growth and to provide important regional services. The Counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, and Scott support the concept of a regional approach, and have no wish to abolish the Council or diminish the importance of regional collaboration.

However, the Council's management of growth, and in particular the coordination and delivery of regional services has changed dramatically. At the same time, the role of counties has evolved. Increasingly, Counties have undertaken direct provision of regional services including: hazardous and solid waste management, transit funding and transitway development, regional parks, regional highways, water resources planning and watershed management, greenway and bikeway development, farmland and open space preservation, the regional library system, fiber communications networks, and the 800 MHz radio network.

The Council's recent focus on reducing poverty and disparities makes it even more essential that within the governance structure there is understanding and improved coordination with county programs----which exclusively provide economic assistance, social services, workforce development/employment, counseling, public health, nutrition and family "home visiting" services, workforce and specialized housing programs and many other anti-poverty and human services. In these and many other circumstances, the State, Metropolitan Council and city governments have all looked to counties to provide both the financial and political leadership needed to address key regional issues.

Thus, while a strong regional approach is necessary for many issues, it is necessary for the regional governing body to feature strong county representation, as well as representation from other local elected officials. Currently, the members of the Council are non-elected individuals answerable only to the Governor, an office that has often been elected without majority support from metropolitan-area voters. The Council, which has the ability to levy taxes on metropolitan-area residents, should be answerable to the citizens and taxpayers of the area it represents rather than a single officeholder.

The best way to ensure that the interests of citizens of the metropolitan-area are represented is to have a preponderance of locally elected officials on the Council--individuals that do not serve exclusively at the pleasure of the Governor. This will have the added benefit of allowing the Council to meet federal guidelines to serve as the region's Metropolitan Planning Organization, a move encouraged by Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and Federal Highway Administration (FHA) to make the Council "more directly accountable to its public¹."

Regional governance is vital to the metropolitan area's continued success. However, in order for a regional body to be effective it must be credible, meaning that regional citizens must feel that the body effectively represents their goals and values. Citizens currently feel disconnected from the Metropolitan Council, preventing it from functioning as an effective regional governance body. The coalition of suburban counties is working to join the Metropolitan Council with the people it represents, so the region as a whole can unite for continued growth and prosperity.

Issue #1: Transportation Revenue

Background

Building and maintaining a safe, efficient and effective transportation system is one of the most basic and vital services provided by all levels of government. Counties are a critical element of the state's transportation system. Over 45,000 miles of Minnesota's 143,000 miles of roads and highways are under county jurisdiction.

Counties and other local units of government oversee 14,700 bridges - 75% of all bridges in the state. The 2008 Legislature enacted a comprehensive transportation funding bill that provided new, dedicated revenues for bridges, roads and transit - at both the state and local levels of government. However as MnDOT's projections make clear, much of that new funding will be exhausted by 2016 and what remains will only be available for maintenance of existing roads. That means new transportation projects in both the metropolitan area and greater Minnesota will continue to be delayed.

Minnesota's transportation system is a critical element of the state's economic vitality. It gets people to and from work and school and gets goods and services to markets. With today's justin-time inventory management and Minnesota's expanding role in the global economy, speedy delivery is critical to the state's competitiveness. Unfortunately, much of the state's transportation infrastructure is not up to the task. The time that Twin Cities' commuters and shippers spend trapped in traffic is growing at a faster rate than that in other metropolitan areas. And the financial resources available to expand the capacity of the state transportation system will literally nose-dive in 2016.

There are four major transportation priorities in Carver County that require an increase in transportation funding. Three out of the four priorities involve the state Trunk Highway system which is clearly underinvested in Carver County.

1. Address County Turnback Account shortfall.

5% of the Minnesota Highway Users Tax Distribution Fund (HUTDF) or approximately \$97 million annually is allocated to the Town Bridge, Town Road and Flexible Highway Account. The Flexible Highway Account is allocated 53.5% or approximately \$53 million annually which is used for the restoration of former Trunk Highways turned back to Counties or Cities. The problem is there is not enough funding in the County Turnback Account (part of Flexible Highway Account) to restore these highways which typically become the most travelled county highways and have the most safety and congestion issues. This is a significant problem in Carver County where there are many projects waiting for funding including portions of TH101 (now CSAH 101) and TH212 (now CSAH 61).

The County is the lead agency for the 101 Bridge and 61 "Y" reconstruction project, also known as the Southwest Reconnection Project and is responsible to finance \$18 Million of the State share of the project as the County Turnback Account does not have available funding. The next

segment of highway 61 east of the "Y" is funded; however, there remains \$70 million in unfunded Turnback projects on 101 and 61.

2. Improve deficient MnDOT A-Minor Arterials (TH 212, TH 5, TH 41)

These highways are the most significant trunk highways in Carver County. They carry the most vehicular and freight traffic, yet all are deficient in geometry which has caused significant congestion and safety issues. None of them, however, have been identified for expansion in the 2040 Transportation Policy Plan (TPP) or the State Highway Investment Plan (MnSHIP).

3. Provide flood mitigation funding for highway projects.

Damage to state and local roadways and bridges from flooding is occurring more and more frequently. Carver County, Scott County, MnDOT and other partners have studied options to reduce the impact of flooding in the Minnesota River Valley on the transportation system including highways 101 and 41. The 101 bridge is under construction but TH 41 remains a significant flood risk every year. The benefit to cost ratio for construction of a new TH 41 river bridge is over 3.0. The estimated cost for the flood protection bridge is \$20 million.

4. Increase funding to the Local Bridge Bonding Program

Carver County estimates \$2 million in annual bridge replacement needs over the next 5 years. The local bridge bonding program augments the budgets of counties and cities statewide by supplying between 50% and 100% of bridge replacement construction costs for deficient structures. The program is first come first serve which rewards project readiness; however large earmark projects have recently dominated the program which jeopardizes the funding for smaller ready to go projects. If large earmark projects are funded the program needs to be grow to support all local bridges.

Carver County will assist with these priorities and is already investing significant local funding in the state transportation system but this is not sustainable without the resulting degradation of the local county transportation network and considerable burden on the local tax base.

Requested Position

Carver County urges the legislature to pass a transportation funding bill that includes the following provisions:

- A. Provide trunk highway bonding for highways planned to be turned back to counties like TH 101 and increase funding to the county turnback account for roadways already turned back to the county like CSAH 61.
- B. Provide trunk highway bonding for the Corridors of Commerce program to fund projects like TH 212 between Chaska and Norwood Young America.
- B.C. Provide \$8M in general obligation bonds for the partial interchange at CR140 and TH212.
- C.D. Provide general obligation bonds for the local bridge replacement program at a level to fund all project ready local bridges.
- ₽.<u>E.</u>Provide bonding for flood mitigation projects on state and local roadways.
- E.F. Distribute all the proceeds from the Leased Motor Vehicle Sales Tax 50-50 between Greater MN Transit and the 5 Metropolitan Suburban Counties.
- F.<u>G.</u>Retain the 1/2¢ Local Option Sales Tax for All Transportation Purposes for the Currently Authorized 82 Counties and Expand It to the Five Remaining Counties.

G.<u>H.</u> Oppose any increase in sales tax for transit only.

Issue #2: Improve the Eminent Domain Statute Appraisal Process for Property Owners

Background

Carver County requests revisions to Chapter 117, Eminent Domain, to mitigate the unintended consequences of the legislation which provides procedures, definition, remedies and limitations for condemning authorities when exercising the power of eminent domain for public use or public purpose.

The 2006 revisions to the eminent domain law has resulted in a significant cost increase related to attorney fees and interest payments incurred by agencies implementing public transportation improvements which has put an unreasonable and unintended burden on transportation funding. Wholesale rewrites or challenges will likely be unsuccessful given the political sensitivity with the law. However, discussion and controversy remains in several areas including: attorney's fees, owner appraisals, land commissioner qualifications, response to offers, and timing and schedules. The modest changes proposed below would give condemning authorities a chance to respond to new information that may come to light in the owner's appraisal, possibly totally avoiding the need acquire the property through the exercise of eminent domain authority.

Requested Position

Carver County recommends_-changing the deadline for an owner to provide their appraisal from 5 to 45 days before the Commissioners Hearing. The Condemning Authority shall then have 30 days from the receipt of the Owner's appraisal to provide the Owner a revised last written offer. The MICA Board of Directors also recommends revising Section 117.195 to determine the annual interest on award based on the secondary market yield of one year United States Treasury bills rounded to the nearest one percent. adding a definition to Section 117.025 to define the Last Written Offer (referred to in 117.031 Attorneys Fees) as the last offer for compensation made in writing by the Condemning Authority to the Owner a maximum of 20 days following the receipt of the Owner's appraisal. Carver County recommends revising Section 117.195 to determine the annual interest on award based on the secondary market yield of one year United States Treasury bills rounded to the nearest one percent.



Item #3: Capital Improvement Funding for Regional Parks

Background

Carver County receives Capital Improvement Program (CIP) funds from the Metropolitan Council and State for the Regional Parks it owns and operates. The Metropolitan Council, on behalf of the 10 regional park implementing agencies, has submitted a CIP request to the State. The 2016-17 portion of the Metropolitan Council's Regional Park CIP is based on the issuance of up to \$7.33 million of Metropolitan Council bonds to provide a 40% match to a 2016 State bond request of \$11 million. This results in a 2016-17 CIP total of \$18.33 million for the Regional Park System.

Requested Position

Support legislation which matches \$7.33 million of Metropolitan Council bonds to \$11 Million of State Bonds for a combined total of \$18.33 million for the Regional Parks System Capital Improvement Program. It is anticipated that Carver County would receive \$498,000 for previous land acquisition expenses for Waconia Regional Park if this legislation is passed.



Item #4: Tax Forfeiture Parcel in Watertown

Background

Parcel 85.4450550 located in Watertown was forfeited to the State of Minnesota in Trust on October 13, 2015 for non-payment of taxes. Carver County and the City of Watertown have a desire to acquire the 3.5 acre parcel for a wetland development project.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has determined (according to Minn. Sta. 282.018, Subd. 1), the parcel must be withdrawn from sale because the waterfront exceeds 150 feet. Special legislation will be needed for the county and city to proceed with the acquisition of the parcel.

Requested Position

Carver County supports and encourages the Legislature to pass the special legislation necessary for Carver County and the City of Watertown to proceed with the acquisition of the property.



Item #5: Chaska Library Construction Grant

Background

In Carver County, libraries are a collaborative effort where the city provides the building and the County provides the library service (staffing, books, and furniture). The City of Chaska plans to construct a new library in downtown Chaska to open in 2018.

A bill for a Library Construction Grant program is being proposed for this session of the State Legislature. The Library Construction Grant program is a competitive dollar for dollar matching grant program. The program provides public libraries with funding for renovation, construction, and improvement projects that result in more accessible library facilities. The City of Chaska will be applying for said grant and Carver County supports their efforts.

Requested Position

Carver County encourages support from the Legislature on the Chaska Library Construction Grant.



Item #5: Metropolitan Governance Reform

Background

A coalition of local governments throughout the metropolitan area has joined together to develop a position statement and a set of principles for improving metropolitan governance in the Twin Cities.

The Coalition supports the need for regional planning, collaboration and coordination, but seeks to expand local government representation on the Metropolitan Council.

The Coalition's objectives for its collective effort to improved governance are:

- 1. To articulate a vision of responsive and effective metropolitan governance—asrepresented by a Statement of Belief and Principles for Reform of the MetropolitanCouncil.
- 2. To align local government interests behind a reform effort—through formation of a broad coalition of metropolitan Cities and Counties —and a common position.
- 3. To be prepared for any efforts—legislative and otherwise—to reform the governance structure and functioning of the Metropolitan Council.

The Metropolitan Council, due to its taxing and policy authority, should be accountable to a regional constituency of those impacted by its decisions. It should not operate as a state agency – as it does in its current form – answerable to only one person, the Governor.

Requested Position

<u>Carver County supports changes to legislation which follow the below principles for</u> <u>Metropolitan Council Reform.</u>

- 1. A majority of the members of the Metropolitan Council shall be elected officials, appointed from cities and counties within the region.
- 2. Metropolitan cities shall directly control the appointment process for city representatives to the Metropolitan Council.
- 3. Metropolitan counties shall directly appoint their own representatives to the Metropolitan Council.
- 4. The terms of office for any Metropolitan Council members appointed by the Governor shall be staggered and not coterminous with the Governor.
- 5. Membership on the Metropolitan Council shall include representation from every metropolitan county government.
- 6. The Metropolitan Council shall represent the entire region, therefore voting shall be structured based on population and incorporate a system of checks and balances.
